## W. H. Rigsby Rites Here

Services for W. H. Rigsby, 85, of Roaring Springs, were conducted at 2 p.m. Friday, Feb. 11 in the First United Methodist Church. Officiating were the pastor, Rev. Lloyd Hearn, Rev. Johnnie Williams, pastor of the First United Methodist Church of Crosbyton, and Rev. D. D. Smith, Roaring Springs Baptist pastor.

Burial was in Roaring Springs Cemetery under the direction of Seigler Funeral Home. Due to weather conditions, Masonic rites were conducted at the church, rather than at graveside.

Mr. Rigsby died early Wednesday morning, Feb. 9 in Methodist Hospital in Lubbock after a long illness. He was 85 years, 11 months and one day old.

He was a member of the Masonic Lodge, the Scottish Rite and the Order of the Eastern Star, at Matador, and a member of the United Methodist Church at Roaring Springs.

He operated a rural grocery store and service station east of Roaring Springs, for the past 37 years. He was born William Horace Rigsby, March 8, 1891 at Morganville, Ky., and moved to Dickens County in 1919. He was married to the former Eula Cora Winfield on December 23, 1919 at Roaring Springs.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Othel of Madill, Okla., and Claude of Midwest City, Okla.; two daughters, Lena Mae Wilhite of Lubbock and Louise Brittain of LaPorte; a brother, Arvil Rigsby of Granbury; a sister, Mrs. Gola Powell of Rogers, Ark.; nine grandchildren and 14 great-grandchildren.

## Screwworm Conference Announced

A special campaign is being planned to fight the screwworm pestilence which has plagued livestock owners according to an announcement by County Extension Agent Bill Palmmeier.

A conference is being called by Governor Dolph Briscoe in the Municipal Auditorium in Austin, starting at 9:30 a.m. Thursday, February 24. Called "Mission '77: Stamp Out Screwworms," this program will explore these areas: The cold winter will reduce the number of screwworm flies this spring; the new screwworm plant in Gutierrez, Mexico, which opened last July will double the sterile fly production capacity, and a new strain of sterile flies has been developed which should be a significant improvement over earlier flies.

"Motley County producers are urged to attend this conference as it is planned to alert and remind local producers as to what they can do to help the program succeed," said Palmmeier.

## Former Legislator, Elbert Reeves Dies

Former state representative and Motley County Judge Elbert Paul Reeves, 72, died at 4:15 a.m. Thursday in Plainview, where he had made his home the past five years. He was also a former teacher in the Matador Schools system.

Services were conducted Saturday morning, February 12, at 11 o'clock in Wood-Dunning Funeral Home Chapel in Plainview, with Dr. Carlos McLeod, pastor of the First Baptist Church there, and the Rev. M. O. Evans, assistant pastor, officiating.

Burial with graveside services were at 2 p.m. in East Mound Cemetery, Matador, under the direction of Wood-Dunning Funeral Home.

Mr. Reeves, who farmed and ranched on the South Plains for 34 years, moved to Plainview in 1971 from Matador. The former educator had also taught school for several years in Floydada, Lakeview, Acuff, Becton and Whiteflat.

He was born April 9, 1904 in the family home three miles east of Matador, a son of Motley County pioneers, the late Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Reeves. He passed away on February 10, 1977 after a lengthy illness having attained the age of 72 years, 11 months and 30 days.

He married the former Jewell Castleberry May 20, 1926 in Plainview. After living on the South Plains they returned to Matador in 1937, and both taught in the Matador schools for two years, 1958-1960. After his two terms as county judge, they moved to Floydada where they taught until retiring in 1972, having already purchased their home in Plainview at 906 Itasca Road.

Besides his parents, Mr. Reeves was preceded in death by a brother, Dr. Robert Reeves.

His survivors include his wife, Jewell; two sons, Donald E. Reeves of Oklahoma City and Pat Reeves of San Francisco, Calif.; two sisters, Miss Verlin Reeves of Matador and Mrs. Maisy Shilling of Dallas; a brother, Roy Reeves of Dallas, and three grandchildren.

Due to a stroke which he suffered several years ago, Roy Reeves was unable to attend the services for his brother.

### CowBelles Hear Research On "Meat And Your Heart"

At its regular meeting February 7 at the Roaring Springs depot, the Foothill CowBelles were presented a program by Mrs. Robin Darsey on "Meat and Your Heart."

It was noted that researchers believe that life-style has more significance as a heart disease risk factor than diet. A study by J. N. Morris, M.D., of various occupational groups revealed a two-to-four times higher incidence and greater severity of coronary heart disease in bus drivers who sit all day driving, than in bus conductors who had to do much walking and climbing, even though the eating patterns of these people were essentially the same.

their life patterns," Mrs. Darsey said. "Further evidence of the importance of exercise is shown in studies of African tribesmen by A. G. Shaper, M.D. Even though animal fat provided over 60 per cent of the total calories derived from much of their lives, these tribesmen were shown to have low serum cholesterol levels."

Further work by Dr. Shaper, with other tribes, suggested that a very high fat diet may not raise cholesterol levels if the calories consumed are in balance with caloric needs.

The most extensive population study of cardiovascular disease, the Framingham Study, involved more than 5,000 men and women over a 20-year period. This study concluded that no relationship was found between the incidence of coronary heart disease and diet.

Meat fats have generally been the targets for critics who urge general diet modification to prevent cholesterol build-up. "However," said Mrs. Darsey, "recent studies by W. O. Caster, Ph.D., of the University of Georgia, identify caproic acid as the only saturated fatty acid which raises blood and liver cholesterol. But this particular acid is not present in meat or meat fat."

According to Mrs. Darsey, "further studies indicated that stearic acid, which frequently is referred to as 'the saturated fatty acid of meat fats,' actually lowered blood and liver cholesterol and blood pressure. "Meat itself is low in cholesterol with just 70 milligrams per 100 grams of raw, lean beef, pork, or lamb. Some of the newer non-meat, meat-like foods, which brag about the fact they have no cholesterol or no animal fat, do contain much sodium which is a forbidden ingredient where high blood pressure is concerned."

## Baptists Launch Good News Texas

FORT WORTH - A million dollar mass media campaign to support the evangelistic ministries of 4,400 Texas Baptist churches was unveiled at the denomination's annual Evangelism Conference here Jan. 17.

More than 8,000 church leaders from throughout the state were shown "Living Proof" television and radio spot announcements that Texas Baptists predict will be seen 40 times by the average Texan this spring.

Living Proof will move across the state in four-week periods of intensive multi-media advertising beginning February 20 in North Texas; March 6 in South Texas; and March 27 in West Texas.

The media evangelism campaign will feature testimonies by well-known Americans who have experienced changed lives through commitment to Jesus Christ. Among celebrities spotlighted will be Billy "White Shoes" Johnson of the Houston Oilers; actor

Dean Jones; former militant Eldridge Cleaver; and Country and Western star Jeannie C. Riley.

Before ending in April, the campaign is expected to reach every Texas resident at least 40 times through TV, radio, newspaper, magazine, outdoor display and transit advertising.

With nondenominational appeal, the 2.1 million member Baptist General Convention of Texas seeks to raise spiritual and moral awareness through the program, according to Dr. Lloyd Elder, co-chairman of Living Proof. Dr. L. L. Morriss, chairman of Living Proof and BGCT Director of Evangelism, explains that the local church is at the heart of this movement.

"The Living Proof media campaign will spur public awareness that will be met by local churches with activities illustrating the value of Christian fellowship," Dr. Morriss said. "Our goal is to lead new converts and inactive Christians back to all the local churches."

Rev. Jerry Golden, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Matador, Rev. Raymond Crowder, pastor of the Flomot First Baptist Church and Rev. D. D. Smith, pastor of the Roaring Springs First Baptist Church have alerted their congregations to the Living Proof campaign, which includes simultaneous revival meetings during the West Texas period from March 27 - April 24.

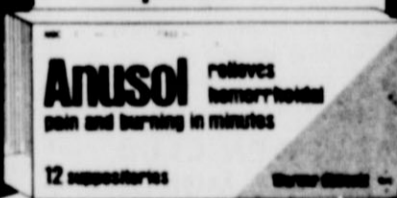

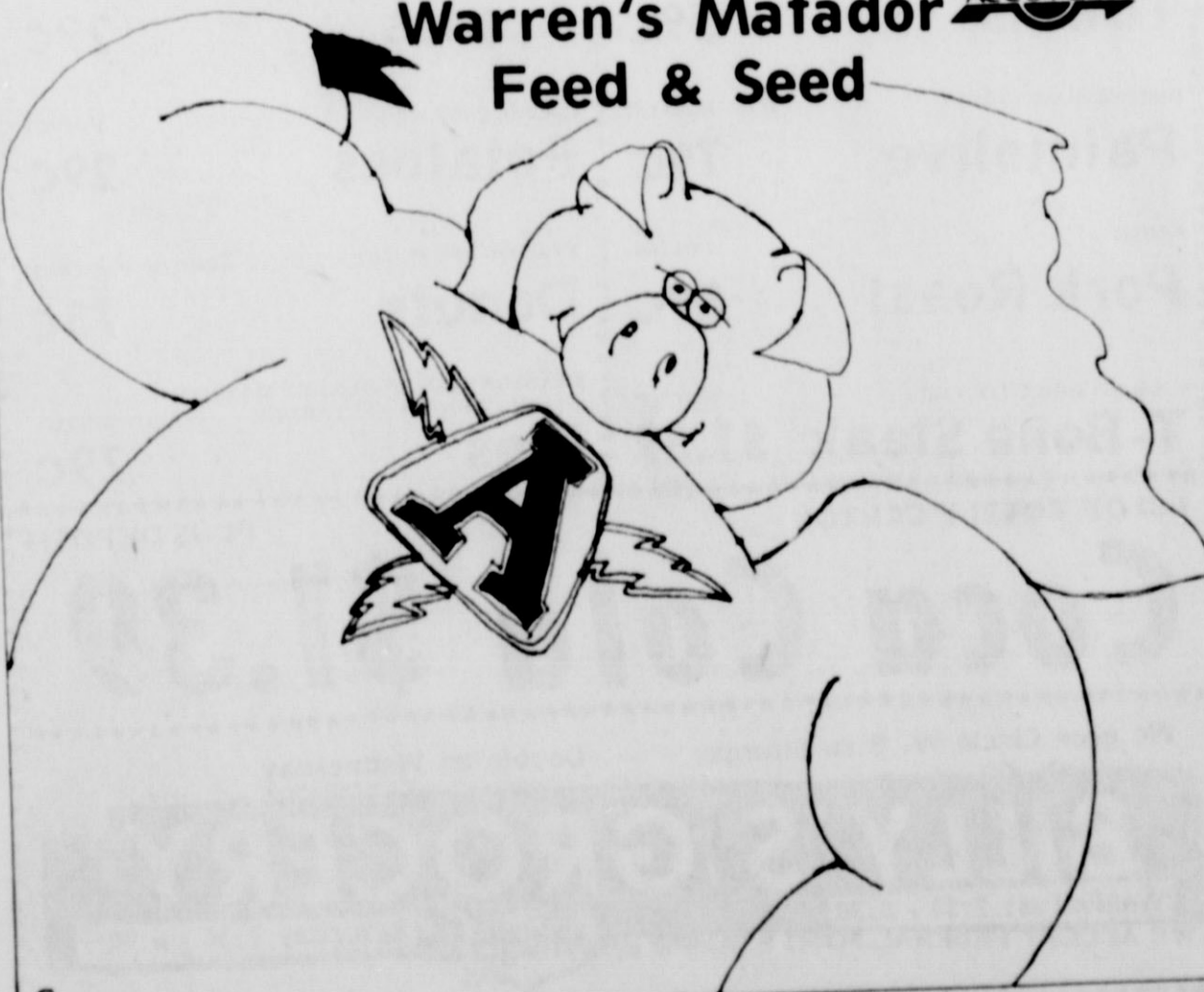

Says**

If you are planning a garden for this summer, site selection is the first thing to consider, if you have a choice. An area exposed to full or near-full sunlight, with deep, well-drained fertile soil is ideal. The location should be near a water outlet, if possible, and free of competition from trees or shrubs.  
Next, decide which crops you plan to grow. You know what you like, and what you will eat, so plan around these. Long term plants shouldn't be planted where they will interfere with care and harvesting of short-term crops, and this step is where you can reduce the labor required.  
Also, plant tall crops such as corn, okra and pole beans on the north side, so they won't shade the shorter

crops, grouping crops according to their rate of maturity. Don't plant the same vegetables in the same area each year, or even related vegetables. By rotating, you help reduce disease problems.  
Don't overplant. For example, 1 one thousandth an acre of beets properly cared for (40 inches by 13 ft. or 36 in. by 14.5 feet) should produce 40 lbs. of beets or 10 lbs. of okra; 16.8 lbs. of tomatoes or 24 lbs. of potatoes. I can give you the average yields of other vegetables if you would like this as a planting guide as these are too lengthy to include in a news article, but I hope that you can see the advantage of size planning, as an acre of beans can produce 2 to 3 tons, and who can use that many beans unless you plan to sell them.  
Next, spend \$2.00 for a soil test. All vegetables don't require the same type or amount of fertilizer, so use this aid to help in adding the soil nutrients needed for top production. If the soil where you place your garden is on heavy clay soil, consider adding organic matter (compost, gin trash) or sand if organic matter is not available, working into the soil until a good mixture is obtained.

Never work a wet garden soil, but by planting time, have the soil in a granular, not powdery or lumpy condition. Forget about chemical weed control, for materials that can be used to grow one plant can't be used for another. For those interested in large plantings, be sure to check and see what chemicals can be used.  
Next I will cover planting, and at any time you need more specific information than is included in these articles, let me know.

With our recent rain, top dressing of small grains may be more profitable. The use of nitrogen increases tillers, and as you well know, the more tillers, the better chance you have for increased yields if adequate moisture is received the rest of the growing season.  
30 to 60 lbs. of Nitrogen per acre are in the range to consider for grain production.

If your crop has received winter damage, this rate should be increased one-third, especially if the crop is to be grazed out.  
Unless we have hail losses, we make a grain crop if moisture is good the last of March or first of April. By then, it is too late to topdress, so in our county, who can say now what the conditions will be then.
