Beth McFall, Ben Grundy Receive Gold Star Awards

HIGHEST 4-H Awards were received Monday night by Beth McFall and Ben Grundy, at the annual 4-H Achievement Banquet, held in the high school gymnasium. They were named the Gold Star Girl and Gold Star Boy, and presented also with the Plains Key Award and the I Dare You Award from the Danforth Foundation.

County Agent Bill Palmeyer presented the awards to the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sid McFall, and the son of Roy Grundy and Mrs. L. B. Campbell.

Speaker for the event was Jimmie C. Irwin, Chief Technologist at the Lubbock Osteopathic Hospital, a former Motley County 4-H member, and the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Irwin of Matador. He drew on his

eight years experience as a 4-H'er as he spoke of goals for being successful.

"Be creative, set your course of action, then follow through," he told the audience of approximately 300 young people and adult leaders. "The man who follows the crowd gets no further than the crowd," he quoted, and added, "You have two choices in life - either stay in the main stream, or dare to be distinct and different. There is a price to pay, but creativity and ingenuity, with an interest in your job or projects go a long way toward success."

He also urged parents to encourage their children in participating in 4-H club work and the projects which the program offers.

A graduate of Matador High School in 1960, Irwin attended West Texas State University at Canyon and Abilene Christian College. He is a graduate of Gradwohl School of Medical Technology in St. Louis, Missouri and is registered with the American Medical Technologists as a 14-year member. He received the Distinguished Achievement Award in Medical Technology in 1967 in Washington, D.C. and has served as State president and other elected offices with the Texas State Society of AMT. Kenneth Finch of Roaring Springs was Master of Ceremonies and introduced the speaker after the invocation by Rev. D. D. Smith of Roaring Springs.

Scouts Leader Speaks At Lions Club

John Blomshield of Lubbock, District Executive of the South Plains Council, Boy Scouts of America was guest speaker Tuesday at the regular luncheon-meeting of Matador Lions Club in the basement of the United Methodist Church.

Mr. Blomshield's message was to challenge the club membership in enlisting for service in Matador Scout Troop 360, a 30-year chartered organization which the club has sponsored since its beginning.

He pointed out that Lionism stands for citizenship, which embraces the scouting program in training youth in skills and crafts. "You have the Scout Troop, a fine meeting place, and adequate leadership (South Plains Council)," he declared, "Needed locally are a Cubmaster, and mothers to serve as Cub leaders." He stated that 12 youngsters want to be Cub Scouts locally. "We need to find people who are interested in these boys, and willing to give of their time as leaders," he stressed.

Mr. Blomshield has served as District Scout Executive for 25 years. He has three sons, all Scouts, and a daughter, who is a member of Explorer Sea Scout Ship. "Girls and women are now involved in Scouting, and this is a phase in which they can achieve leadership," he said. The speaker was introduced by Emilio Aguilar.

Boss Lion Larry Hoyle led the lions in applause to the women of the Methodist Church for the fine lunch, and Bill Seale of Snyder former Matador Lions Club president was introduced as a guest by Lion Bob Stanley. Jerry Golden, new pastor of the First Baptist Church was presented with membership credentials.

First Bale Ginned At West Texas

West Texas Gin announced this week that it had ginned its first bale of cotton. Mrs. Marion Norris, manager said that their first bale was brought in by Bill Smallwood and ginned on October 13.

The yield was 550 pounds of lint and 900 pounds of cotton seed out of 2100 pounds of seed cotton. The gin will pay \$110 per ton for the seed, and 20 cents premium above the USDA classification, Mrs. Norris said.

The cotton was produced on the Haynes Baumgardner farm.

The 1976 cotton crop is expected to get into full swing in about 10 days.

The Motley County Matadors came back from their last week's loss with Sudan to beat the Silverton Owls by the score of 46-19, Friday night at Silverton.

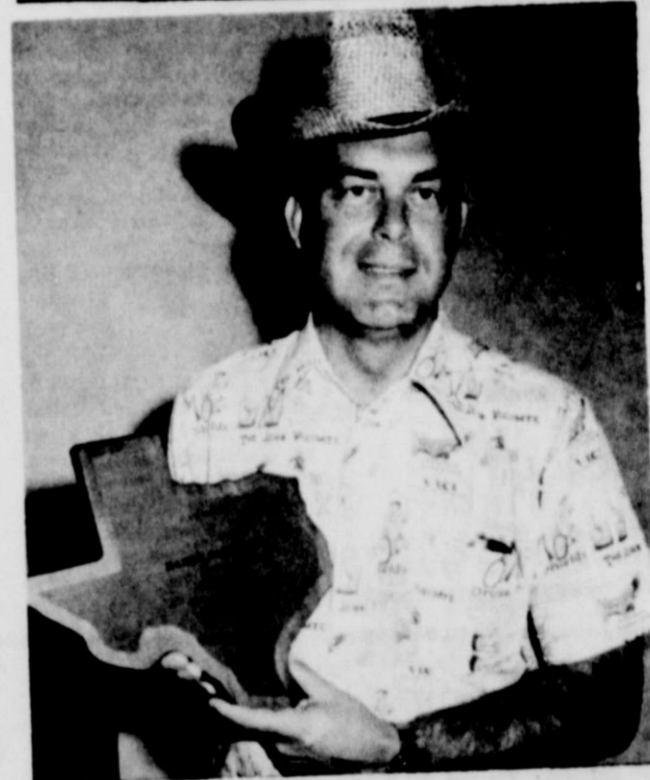

Harry Campbell, MHS. Grad Named 4-H Youth Specialist

A native of Matador and a graduate of Matador High School has been named area 4-H and youth specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service for District 6 in far west Texas. He is Henry H. (Harry) Campbell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Campbell, both of whom are also MHS graduates.

Campbell will be headquartered at the District 6 Extension office in Fort Stockton and will serve a 22-county area stretching from El Paso to Howard and Terrell Counties. He has been with the Extension Service for some 11 years, serving the past six years as Dickens County Extension agent.

Campbell will be working closely with county extension

agents, 4-H program assistants, county program building committees, and volunteer leaders in educational programs designed to help 4-H youth "learn by doing."

The new specialist joined the Extension Service in 1963 as an assistant county agent in Nacogdoches County. He served as Archer County agent for three months before entering private business with the Ralston Purina Co. at Nacogdoches.

In 1969 he returned to the Extension Service as an associate county agent in Denton County and served there for about a year and a half until transferring to Dickens County.

While in Nacogdoches he

was recognized as the top extension agent in Texas in the promotion of forestry by the Texas Forestry Association.

Recently he was cited in a resolution by the Dickens County Commissioners Court for his outstanding service while in that county and was also recognized as the top extension agent in Texas in 4-H and youth work by the Texas County Agriculture Agents Association.

As a youth growing up in Matador, Harry was active in 4-H, FFA, and the Boy Scouts, and was a member of the state-winning 4-H grass judging team in 1959.

Club Is Given Review Of Historic Treasures

Laced with an interpretation and rendition of America's Bicentennial music, led by Mrs. Frank Pohl, a slide presentation on "Our Historic Treasures in Philadelphia," was given by Mrs. Furman Vinson last week for El Progresso Study Club. The meetings was held Thursday, Oct. 14, in the home of Mrs. W. N. Pipkin.

Program leader was Mrs. Ben Keltz, who read the quotation for the day Patriotic Aspirations from Webster: "Let our object be our country, our whole country, and nothing but our country. And, by the blessing of God, may that country itself become a vast and splendid monument, not of oppression and terror, but of wisdom, of peace and of liberty, upon which the world may gaze with admiration forever."

Mrs. Pohl, at the piano, opened the musical part of the program with "The Star-Spangled Banner," after a brief resume of the author, and when it was adopted as the National Anthem. A reading, "The House I Live In" (Lewis Allen) was read by Mrs. Pipkin, and Mrs. W. F. Jacobs led the group in a sing-along of several oldtime favorite songs.

Miss Charise Cullin, a guest, played the cello, accompanied by Mrs. Pohl. These selections included "God Bless America," "Grand Old Flag," "O Little Town of Bethlehem," and "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot." Mrs. Pohl then followed with two other piano numbers, "Indian Love Call," and "La Caracha."

Mrs. John Hamilton gave the story of "The Little Brown Church in the Vale," which was then sung by the Estes Sisters, Mesdames Pipkin, Jacobs, Robert Darsey, and R. E. Campbell Jr. They also sang "The End of A Perfect Day," in conclusion.

"INDEPENDENCE National Park contains the greatest concentration of historic buildings and sites in the United States," said Mrs. Vinson in her introduction to a narration on historic treasures in Philadelphia.

"It was authorized by Act of Congress in 1948 for the purpose of preserving for the benefit of the American people as a national historical park, certain historical structures and properties of outstanding national significance.

"This park preserves the scene where the Continental Congress met and governed the colonies during the American Revolution; where the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the U.S. were adopted, and where the Senate, House of Representatives and the Supreme Court of the U.S. met for 10 years (1791-1800) when Independence Square served as the capitol of the United States."

Mr. and Mrs. Vinson made the trip to Philadelphia during a meeting in February, of the Grand Masters Conference of the Masonic Lodge. This was the first time the Conference was held outside of Washington, D.C. Mr. Vinson is Grand Senior Warden of the Grand Lodge of Texas.

The slides shown by Mrs. Vinson included Independence Hall, Congress Hall, Carpenters' Hall, Old City Hall (U.S. Supreme Court Building), the First and Second Banks of the U.S. and the reconstructed Library Hall. The sites of the important City Tavern and Benjamin Franklin's home

Other views included the Liberty Bell, and Pavilion, symbol of American freedom, the Syng Inkstand, used at the signing of the Declaration of Independence, and the "Rising Sun" chair, from which George Washington presided over the Constitutional Convention, the Betsy Ross garden and home, and many other scenes of historical streets and buildings. She also showed some slides made at Valley Forge, where the Masons at the Conference were taken on a tour.

Inspirational Thought by Mrs. Carl King concluded the outstanding program on Americanism.

Mrs. Harold Campbell, president, called the meeting to order preceding the program, and plans and arrangements were made for the Gentlemen's Evening and Guest program which will be October 28, at the First Baptist Church.

Mrs. Pipkin displayed the medallion which has been received from the Texas Historical Commission which will be placed on the Motley County Jail, the oldest building in the county. Obtaining the medallion was a joint project of El Progresso Club and Matador Garden Club, and was financed by the children of the late H. H. Campbell.

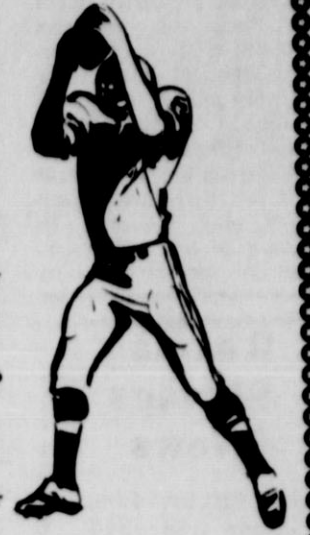

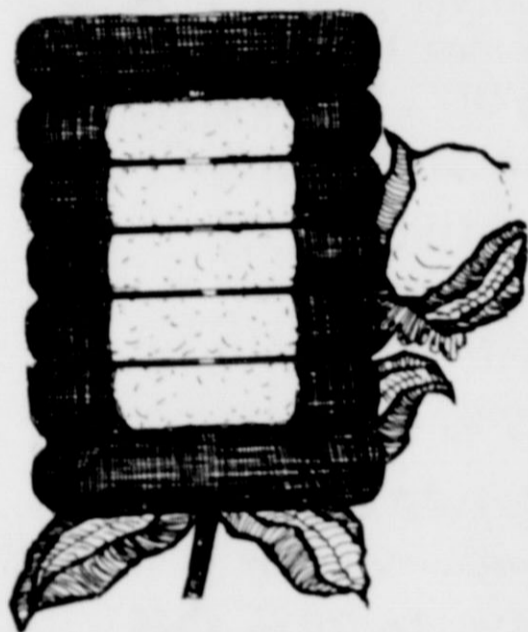

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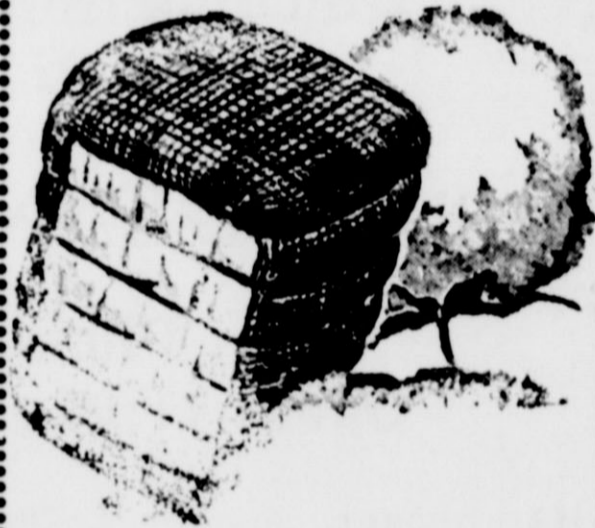
