Ricky Turner In Austin For Boys State

AUSTIN, (Special) - The 37th annual American Legion Boys State sponsored by the Department of Texas and held on the Campus of the University of Texas, got underway Wednesday as 930 high school boys from all parts of Texas, and two from Mexico, began registration, C. G. McKinzie, State Commander, announced.

Among those registering from Matador was Ricky R. Turner, who was sponsored by American Legion Fleming Post 337, Matador. He was accompanied to Paducah by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Turner, early Wednesday, and joined other boys in the district traveling from Amarillo by chartered bus.

Following registration, each citizen was assigned to one of two political parties - the Nationalist or Federalist. Each citizen then functions as a member of his party. He attends its precinct, county and state conventions and votes in its primary.

Boys State helps to develop civic leadership and pride in American citizenship, through a detailed study of government.

Highlight of Boys State will be a trip to the Capitol on Tuesday morning, where each elected Boys State official will be given an opportunity to serve in his respective office for a day.

Homemaker Service Explained To Lions

Opportunities available to the elderly were explained to members of Matador Lions Club, Tuesday at regular luncheon-meeting in the school cafeteria. Speaker was Mrs. Vance (Wynona) Gilbreath, Senior Advocate coordinator of the program sponsored by the Home Economics Department at Texas Tech University.

The program was introduced by Lion Forrest Campbell, treasurer of the club, who presided in the absence of the top four officers.

"Growing old isn't fun" Mrs. Gilbreath conceded, but pointed out that older persons have more options now than formerly, through various programs and opportunities which are now offered.

One of the services available to the elderly is the minibus, which comes here each Thursday from Floydada, and provides transportation to other towns for dental and eye appointments, or for any other needs.

"More people are now taking advantage of this service."

Dawson Rites Held Tuesday

Funeral services for Reginal Brandon Dawson, 62, were held at 3 p.m. Tuesday in the First Baptist Church. Officiating were the pastor, Rev. Jerry Golden, Rev. Lloyd Hearn, pastor of the United Methodist Church, and Rev. Philip Hilton, pastor of the Assembly of God Church.

Burial was in the Roaring Springs Cemetery under the direction of Seigler Funeral Home, Matador.

Mr. Dawson died about 8 a.m. Sunday, June 5, in his home, after a lengthy illness. He was born February 14, 1915, in the Sneedville community in Cottle County, Texas, the son of the late Fred P. Dawson and Nannie Hurst Dawson. He spent his early years near Roaring Springs, and later lived in California. Returning to Texas, he lived in Fort Worth and Dallas prior to moving to Matador in 1970.

A retired carpenter, Mr. Dawson was a World War II veteran, having served with the U. S. Navy from June 1943 until December, 1945. He was a member of the Methodist Church.

He was married to the former Nancy Tillison Duckworth in 1968.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, R. B. Dawson and William Reese Dawson, both of Bakersfield, Calif.; a daughter, Donna Annette Durham, also of Bakersfield; two brothers, J. L. Dawson of Dallas and Freddie Dawson of Delano, Calif.; one sister, Mrs. Paulette Parker of Bakersfield, Calif.; his stepmother, Mrs. Lola Dawson of Lubbock, three half-brothers, Melborn Dawson of Kermit, Don Dawson of Texas City and Bill Dawson of Floydada, three half-sisters, Miss Helen Jean Dawson and Mrs. Melba Perry, both of Lubbock, and Mrs. Carolyn Brady of Dumont; and by several grandchildren.

Serving as pallbearers were Clyde Clifton and W. H. "Buck" Marshall of Roaring Springs, Gus Bird, R. C. Giesecke, Fred Crenshaw and Algie Groves, Matador.

Mrs. Gilbreath said. "At first they didn't seem to comprehend that everyone is eligible to ride the bus, who need and wish to do so. All they have to do is let us know ahead of time."

A newer service that is now being offered is the Home-maker Service Aide Program, for which two local women, Mrs. Zona Ruth Cammack and Mrs. B. D. (Carolyn) Halford have trained at Texas Tech. They will go to the homes of elderly who need housekeeping services.

"In many instances, this makes it possible for the elderly to remain at home, rather than to enter a hospital or nursing home," Mrs. Gilbreath pointed out. "This is also a means of bringing part of the outside world into the home... it means a lot to these people... older persons are citizens, and still have their rights. We strive to lift them out of an environment of isolation."

Other services provided by the Community Service Agency include reading facilities and record players for the blind, or near blind.

A program of activities for the elderly could include arts and crafts, and other handwork, Mrs. Gilbreath said, but added that so far, persons locally do not seem to be interested. At Roaring Springs, the Senior Citizens are well organized and actively engaged in various civic and community projects.

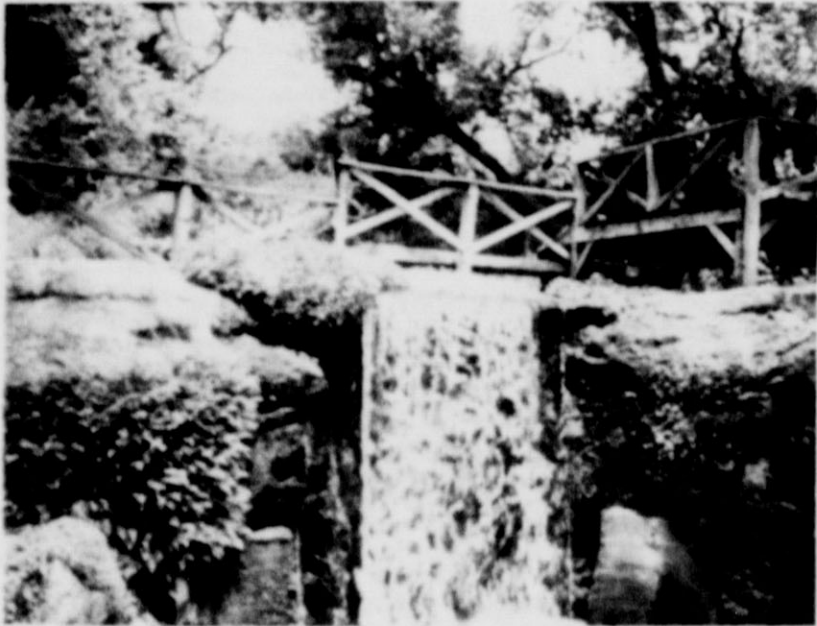

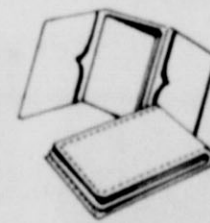

Planned Grazing Systems

by Clyde Pursley
Good range management is greatly enhanced through the use of grazing systems. Proper utilization of these systems will result in more forage and less soil erosion. Several types of grazing systems are switchback, one herd 3 pastures, two herds 3 pastures, 3 herds 4 pastures,

and high intensity low frequency (HILF) grazing systems. The newest system is the HILF grazing system. HILF systems are patterned after the way buffalos grazed grassland. Large numbers of buffalos would graze in one area for short periods of time once a year. Most other grazing systems allow a

pasture to be grazed more than once a year. Usually, several pastures are grazed at one time.

Allowing plants regrowth by rotation of pastures is the key to any planned grazing system. Benefits achieved consist of more grass produced resulting in a higher net livestock return per acre. Better utilization occurs by improved grazing uniformity. Additionally, improvement is made in wildlife habitat, seed maturity, food reserves, and vigor of the grass stand. The most vital contribution of a planned grazing system is the improvement of grass cover over the soil. A good cover of grass improves the retention of moisture due to less water loss to runoff and evaporation. In addition better erosion control is provided.

Planned grazing systems are an important tool to rangeland management. If you are interested in a grazing system or any other conservation practice, contact your local Soil Conservation Service or the Upper Pease Soil and Water Conservation District. Assistance is available to everyone regardless of race, color, creed, sex or national origin.

Parallel Terraces Replaced Standard

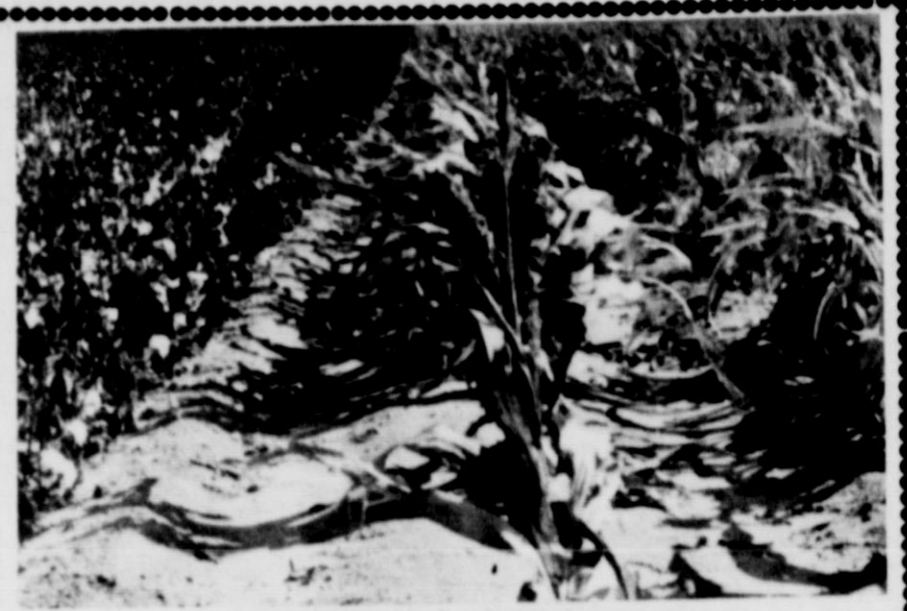
Water erosion, which has been a major problem for centuries, has been reduced in past years with the construction of terrace systems. The first terrace systems that were built were called conventional or standard terraces. These types of terraces contributed greatly in the reduction of water erosion. Standard terraces are constructed on a level line across the slope following the natural contour of the land. The use of these terraces results in odd areas or point rows between each terrace. Modern farming operations and larger equipment have created a need for better terrace systems.

Since the first terrace systems were built, many new methods have been developed. The old standard terrace has given way to the new modern terrace system, Parallel Terraces. These terraces are different in many ways to the standard terrace. The main advantage is that they are parallel, which eliminates many point rows within the field, and

creates the same amount of rows between terraces. Some other advantages are, elimination of a channel behind the terrace, and better water spreading, resulting in greater infiltration over a larger area.

Parallel terraces recently built in Motley County are doing a good job of controlling water erosion. 60,372 feet of parallel terraces were recently completed on Mrs. L. M. Cox's farm north of Matador. This parallel terrace system is a good example of water erosion control and water spreading. Approximately 125,000 feet of parallel terraces were completed this year in Motley County.

If you have an erosion problem on your farm, assistance is available to you through the local Soil Conservation Service of the Upper Pease Soil and Water Conservation District. Assistance is available without regard to race, color, creed, sex, or national origin.
