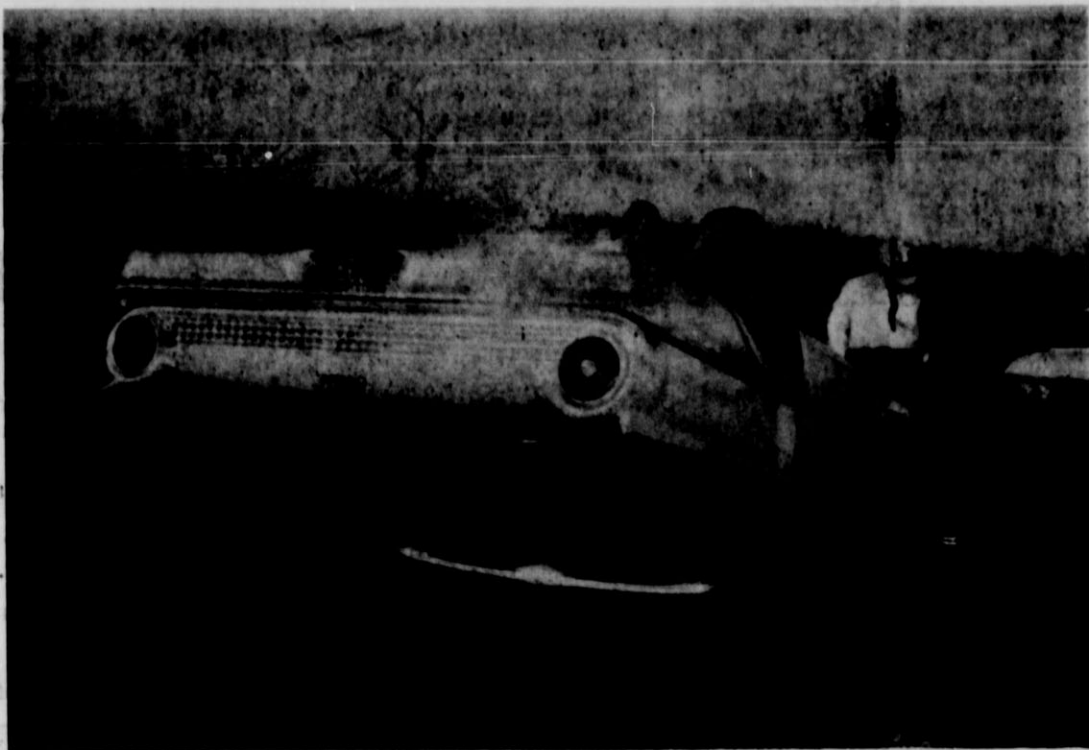

A MEDICARE STORY

It all began with a fall in the snow.

The woman is a widow who has lived by herself for the past 17 years. She was walking from her neighbor's home to her home when suddenly her ankle turned and something snapped. She lay in five inches of snow for a moment. Her mind sensed what had happened, and she cried out for help. Two neighbors quickly came to her aid, and in a few minutes the ambulance had delivered her to the local hospital in the little snowcovered village where she lives.

The doctor made a quick initial examination, x-rayed her broken ankle, and immediately saw that he could not handle the serious bone break.

His hospital was no longer more than a clinic which handled out-patients. He was not equipped to care for this case. This kind doctor had ministered to the sick and lame, delivered babies, and removed tonsils for many years in the small community. In the past few years, he was one of the two doctors who still practice medicine here after twenty-eight years.

There followed an eighty-two mile trip in the ambulance. The snow was five inches deep on the Plains highways and going was slow. There were many miles of anxious travel between the small village and the large city on the plains. The patient was carried from the ambulance into the small hospital and almost immediately, because arrangements had been made beforehand, the

hospital staff began working over the stricken woman. This hospital was well equipped to handle almost any emergency entering its doors. Less than an hour later the leg was straightened and placed in a cast, while the patient was under a general anesthetic.

For three days, pain alleviating drugs and sedatives were administered, and ladies in white, blue, and pink walked in and out of the room where she lay. Then followed a period when she no longer needed the intensive care of the many nurses. She was able to get along with the assistance of the regular duty nurse, and began to visit meaningfully with her two sons who live in the Plains city. Many of the village people had mailed her get well cards and newspapers, and others wrote letters to this lonely woman.

Response to the use of purchased crutches was slow. Some days she was too sedated to read, watch television or visit with those who came to see her. Then she improved and enjoyed the visits more. Before twelve days had gone by her physician advised that she no longer needed the intensive care of a general hospital. Arrangements had to be made quickly to obtain her release from the hospital, and her entrance into a nursing home. The decision was made by the two sons, that care in an Extended Care Facility (ECF), a high class government designated nursing home, was necessary since she had not learned to use the crutches and became dizzy when she tried.

After twelve days in the hos-

pital, transfer was made to the Extended Care Facility. This proved to be just the right thing for the woman, because she began to respond to the nursing care and medications administered. Use of the crutches became easier, and anyway there was always the walker or the wheel chair she could use if she wished.

Today, she is in her fifth week in the nursing home. Many other persons are permanent residents of the nursing home, and all receive good care, love, and a clean, comfortable life—as people can make it so for them.

I believe this story points up several things but among them are three things which I am convinced need publicity. First, the possibility of hospitalization may befall any of us at any time. Hospitalization and nursing home care costs money. Lots of money. In this case Medicare provided much of the money to pay for the doctor bills, the tests, the hospital bills, and the nursing home care for the first 20 days in full.

Second, it points up the fact that a small village like the one from which she came, is full of people who are interested in their fellow man. Their interest is exemplified by the acts of kindness and show of friendship accorded this lady from their village. They have given their

time for this lonely widow.

Third, it points out the need for Americans who have the tolerance and foresight of the people at Matador, Texas, where this drama occurred.

I am well acquainted with the facts in this case. You see, this woman who fell in the snow was my mother. My name is Jim Latimer, I am a field representative of the Social Security Administration at Lubbock, Texas.

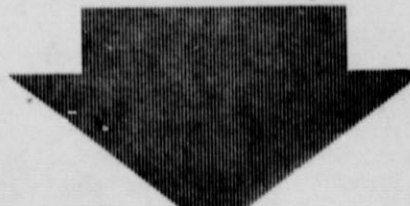

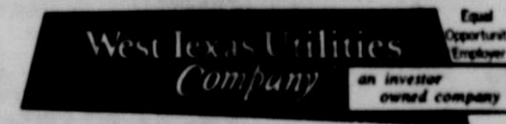


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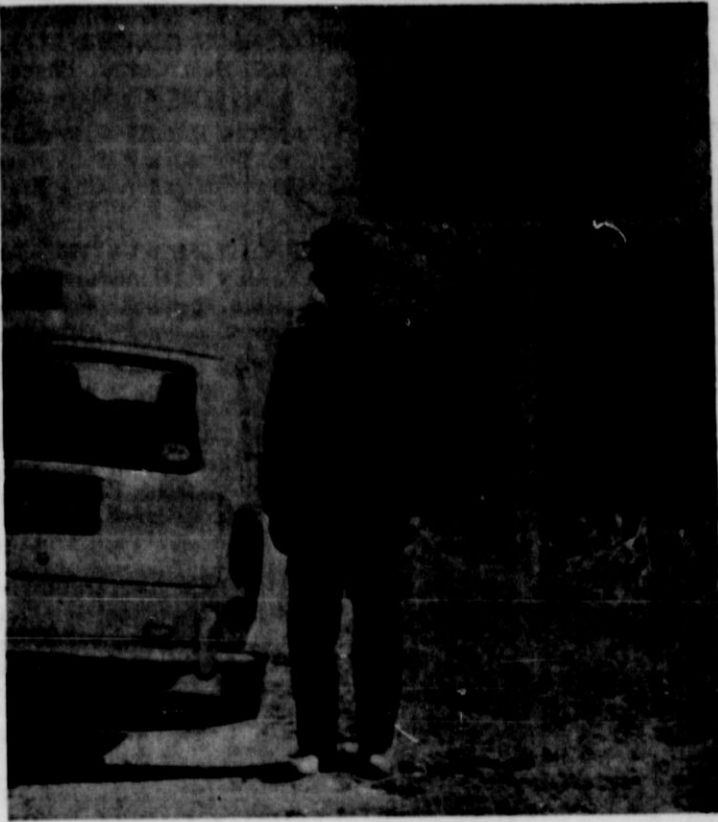
