

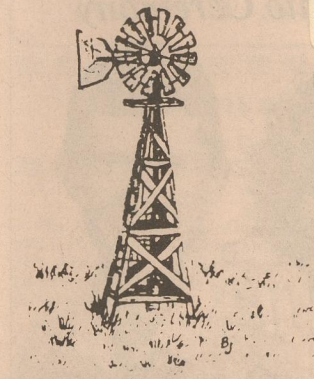

Dedication of Museum Project Stirs Emotions

A short but emotion-packed ceremony on May 25 was presented by the Gifted and Talented Class of Motley County High School at the Motley County Museum. Members of the class dedicated their museum service project, the Motley County map/mural, to their late sponsor, Mr. Jeff Piper. A plaque with their teacher's picture will hang near the hand painted map of the county enhanced by historic silhouettes.

Mrs. W.T. Piper responded to the dedication honoring her son by addressing an inspirational poem to the students, exhorting them to make the most of each day of their lives.

Refreshments were served in the lobby by the class. Others attending were Cle Schofield, Mrs. Sally Piper, school counselor, Mrs. Sherry Prather, and several museum board members and officers.

School children and out-of-town visitors have kept the volunteers of the Motley County Museum busy during the last couple of months.

When quizzed by their teachers about what aspect of the museum they most enjoyed, classes from the Motley County elementary school, ranging from kindergarten to sixth grade, seemed especially fascinated by the evolving replica of the frontier town of Matador created by Joyce Archer and Lorene Lancaster. One young man, in particular, was astounded by the detailing of a "two-holer" outhouse.

Others found the medical instruments of the doctor's office intriguing as they considered the crude surgical tools used in the once common office procedure of the removal of tonsils.

Many boys, and some girls, for that

matter, expressed interest in weapons, whether the bow and arrow of the Apaches, the Winchester of the settlers, or the Mauser rifle of the Germans. 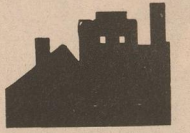

The Texas Historical Commission recognized outstanding preservationists and heritage organizations at its historic preservation conference Austin, April 29-May 1. More than 10,000 Texans across the state volunteer their time to help preserve the state's heritage, including conservation of museum collections, rehabilitation of landmarks, and protection of archeological sites. The activities of these volunteers help make Texas' towns attractive as visitor destinations, as well.

Motley County was among 28 county historical commissions receiving the Distinguished Service Award for fulfilling specified preservation activities in their communities.

The Texas Historical Commission is the state agency for historic preservation. Its staff administers a variety of programs to protect and conserve the state's architectural, archeological, and historic resources.

State Comptroller Sends May Sales Tax Rebates

State Comptroller John Sharp today delivered a total of \$172.6 million in May sales tax rebates to 1,071 Texas cities and 108 counties, a 14.4 percent increase over their payments of one year ago.

Texas cities received \$156.8 million, up 14.7 percent over the \$136.6 million they received last May. Counties received a total of \$15.8 million for their May rebates, a 12 percent increase over the May 1992 rebates of \$14.1 million.

"Texas has been exhibiting signs of slow, steady economic growth since March 1992. El Paso, Fort Worth, and San Antonio lead in employment growth among Texas' major cities," Sharp said.

This month's sales tax rebates include taxes collected on March sales and reported to the Comptroller in April by businesses filing monthly returns. May's rebates also reflect taxes reported by businesses filing quarterly returns for January, February and March and re-

ported to the Comptroller in April. Totals for Motley County are as follows: Matador: current rate, 1.000%; net payment this period, \$2,656.54; comparable payment prior year, \$2,646.25; % change, 0.39%; 1993 payments to date, \$9,774.04; 1992 payments to date, \$10,060.35; % change, -2.85%.

Roaring Springs: current rate, 1.000%; net payment this period, \$2,481.01; comparable payment prior year, \$1,196.11; % change, 107.42%; 1993 payments to date, \$11,348.65; 1992 payments to date, \$5,636.41; % change, 101.35%.

County Total: net payment this period, \$5,137.55; comparable payment prior year, \$3,842.36; % change, 33.71%; 1993 payments to date, \$21,122.69; 1992 payments to date, \$15,696.76; % change, 34.57%.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor,

I'm writing this letter to acknowledge this honorable accomplishments of a good friend and classmate, a former resident of Matador, and a graduate of the Matador High School class of '65 - William "Butch" Waybourn. Butch lives in Washington D.C. and is the founder and director of the Gay and Lesbian Victory Fund, an organization that provides campaign funds and assistance to openly-gay and lesbian political candidates across the United States. Among many others, the Victory Fund recently helped elect Texas State Representative Glen Maxey. The Victory Fund is presently helping fund a campaign to remove the ban against homosexuals in the Armed Forces.

A few weeks ago, Butch and a handful of other national gay and lesbian leaders met with President Bill Clinton at the White House. This was an historical moment because it marked the first time in history that the President had ever conducted an official meeting in the White House with members of the gay and lesbian community. I recently spoke with Butch and he told me that part of the conversation he had with President Clinton revolved around the similarities of their growing-up in the small towns of Matador, Texas and Hope, Arkansas.

As a lifetime subscriber to the Matador Tribune, I have been saddened, angered, and somewhat dismayed at the vitriolic statements made by some sanctimonious, closed-minded citizens who have written editorial comments for the Tribune. I was astounded by the comment from a subscriber who stated that if he was a "corpman" (sic) on the battlefield, he would allow a gay person to bleed to death before he would provide any assistance. Perhaps that writer should be informed that if the situation was reversed, he wouldn't have to worry about such a dereliction of duty. All medical units of U.S. armed forces are composed of a high percentage of homosexuals, all of whom perform their duties regardless of a person's sexual status. Not every gay man has AIDS; the armed forces routinely screens applicants for the presence of HIV. AIDS aside, morally it is offensive that anyone, especially someone from Motley County, would ever turn his back on a dying human being - gay or straight. Perhaps that myopic editorialist should be reminded of the Golden Rule: "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." Our Constitution recognizes that "all men are created equal" and instills in each of us a right to the "pursuit of happiness". This right should not be denied simply because some feel threatened, frightened, or angered by the sexual status others possess from birth.

All Americans, and especially the citizens of Motley County, should be proud of Butch Waybourn. He is standing up for the same principles which freed Americans from the yoke of a British monarchy, freed African-Americans from the

oppressions of slavery, and granted equal rights, suffrage, and the right to serve in the military to both African-Americans and women. In the final analysis, we all want to be able to look back on our lives and ask ourselves, "did I do anything to make this place a better world for others?" Regardless of how you feel personally about William "Butch" Waybourn and the principles and values he stands for, Butch Waybourn will be able to answer that question with a resounding "YES".

Local Producers Required To Keep Records On Pesticide Use

As of May 10, 1993, new United States Department of Agriculture regulations requires all certified pesticide applicators, including private applicators, to maintain records for each restricted-use pesticide they use.

Currently, there is not a standardized Federal record keeping form. The regulations require basic information to be maintained on restricted use pesticide applications.

- The recordkeeping requirements are:
- (1) The brand or product name of the restricted use pesticide that was applied;
 - (2) The EPA registration number of the pesticide;
 - (3) The total amount of the restricted use pesticide applied;
 - (4) The location of the treatment;
 - (5) Size of the area treated;
 - (6) Crop, commodity, or stored product to which the restricted use pesticide was applied;
 - (7) Month, day and year of application;
 - (8) Name and certification number of applicator.

All commercial applicators are required to provide a copy of restricted pesticide applications to customers within 30 days of each treatment.

The above information is only required by the USDA for restricted use pesticide applications. In order to further protect yourself as a certified applicator, I encourage you to also include additional weather conditions such as wind speed and direction, relative humidity, cloud-

ness and other information in which you feel is relevant.

These records must be retained for 2 years from the date of application. Individuals are not required at this time to submit the information to any governmental entity. However, if requested by an authorized representative, the certified applicator must provide access to restricted use pesticide records. Applicators will be surveyed by officials responsible for developing a national pesticide use report.

Fines and penalties will be assessed for violation of the Federal pesticide recordkeeping requirements. Violators include private and commercial applicators who refuse to maintain appropriate records or provide access to authorized representatives of the Secretary of Agriculture or designated state agencies.

These requirements are only for federally restricted use pesticides. At this time there are no recordkeeping regulations for general use pesticides. However, new and updated environmental regulations are constantly being passed at the state and federal level.

As a farmer or rancher, I would get in the habit of keeping and maintaining accurate records on all pesticides (restricted, state-limited, and general use) applied. Accurate recordkeeping of pesticide use may help keep you in business and out of the court room.

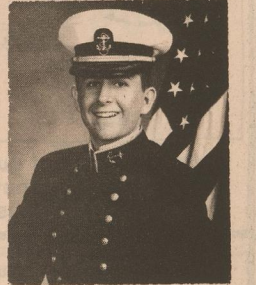

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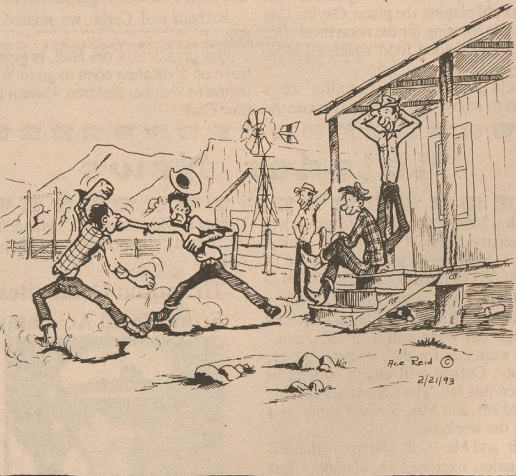

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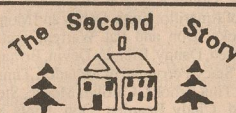
