## Easter, The Greatest Festival

Easter, the greatest festival of the Christian Church, commemorates the Resurrection of Jesus Christ.

It is a moveable feast. It is not always held on the same date. The church council of Nicaea in 325 A.D. decided that Easter should be celebrated on the first Sunday after the first full moon on or after the Vernal equinox (March 21). Easter can come as early as March 22 or as late as April 25.

In many churches, Easter is preceded by a season of prayer and fasting, called Lent. This is observed in memory of the 40 days fast of Christ in the desert.

In the Western church the Lenten season is from Ash Wednesday until the noon of Holy Saturday - the day before Easter. These six weeks and four days include 40 fasting days, since Sundays are not fast days. In the Eastern Churches, Lent extends over eight weeks and they do not observe Saturday as fast days.

Ash Wednesday gets its name from the practice, mainly in the Roman Catholic church, of putting ashes on the foreheads of the faithful. This is to remind them that "man is but dust" and that he must do penance. The second Sunday before Easter is Passion Sunday. The week following is now usually called Passion Week, although Passion Week originally meant the week before

Easter. Palm Sunday, one week before Easter, celebrates the triumphant entry of Christ into Jerusalem. Holy Week begins on this day. Holy Thursday or Maundy Thursday is in memory of the Last Supper of Christ with his disciples. Good Friday commemorates the Crucifixion.

Besides the services in churches, sunrise services are held outdoors in many places. Some, such as those at Pikes Peak in Colorado, in the Grand Canyon of Arizona and in the Hollywood Bowl, have won national fame because of the beauty of their surroundings. Many Easter customs came from the old world. The white lily, the symbol of the Resurrection, is the special Easter flower. Colored eggs and rabbits have come from pagan antiquity as symbols of new life.

The Easter Monday egg rolling on the lawn of the White House - a custom of European origin - is said to have been introduced in Washington by Dolly Madison.

In many Catholic countries Lent is preceded by a carnival season. Elaborate pageants often close this season on Shrove Tuesday. The day before the beginning of Lent. This day is also called by its French name, Mardi Gras (or Fat Tuesday). The Mardi Gras celebration of New Orleans and other cities are famous.

Easter Island is another part of Easter. Far out in the South Pacific about 2,200 miles West of Chili, lies Easter Island, one of the loneliest islands in the world. Its nearest inhabited neighbor is Pitcairn Island, 1,300 miles away. The population in 1940 was 563.

The people are remnants of numerous people who were once skilled workers in stone and wood and had a form of writing different from any other writing known. Scattered over this volcanic island of about 50 square miles are many gigantic statues carved out of a single block of soft stone. Some are more than 30 feet high. Many have been transported several miles from the quarry in which they were carved and set up on huge stone foundations.

The present inhabitants have no traditions that explains this and the old picture writings have not been deciphered. The decline of this civilization has been explained as the result of wars, and diseases brought by whalers early in the 19th century, and transportation of most of the inhabitants to work the Peruvian guano fields about 1860. A few survivors were later returned to the island and converted to Christianity.

The island, called Rapa Nui by the inhabitants was named Easter Island by a Dutch navigator, Jacob Roggenveen, who discovered it on Easter Day, 1722. Chili annexed it in 1888 and made it into a national park in 1935.

## Doug Meador Inducted Into PPA Hall of Fame

The Panhandle Press Association inducted four members into its Hall of Fame during a luncheon Saturday at the Harvey Hotel in Amarillo.

The PPA - made up of 50 member newspapers in the Panhandle and South Plains of Texas, eastern New Mexico and the Oklahoma Panhandle - presented the awards in recognition of the many outstanding journalists in the area who have made lasting contributions to their professions.

The Hall of Fame debuted in 1992, when seven honorees were inducted. Four people were inducted, two of them posthumously, during the second annual ceremony on Saturday.

Those inducted are the late Douglas Meador of the Matador Tribune; the late H.M. Baggary of The Tulia Herald; Morris Higley of The Childress Index; and Jimmie Gillentine, former owner of The Hereford Brand.

Meador, longtime editor and publisher of The Matador Tribune, was a member of the PPA for 40 years, beginning in 1936, and twice served as president. One of the best-known editors in this area, he was the author of "Trail Dust", a front-page column that was widely read and reprinted in Texas newspapers and other publications. A book of selections from his columns was published in 1967 and has become a collector's item. He received a White House commendation in 1967 for the book.

Meador was regarded by many as the poet of the Panhandle-Plains area. A tribute to him, written and published in 1940 by Amarillo Daily News Editor John L. McCarty, called him "country editor, cowboy, printer, poet and philosopher." Meador served as Mayor of Matador from 1948 to 1965 and was named Texas Newspaperman of the Year in 1952 by the Dallas chapter of Sigma Delta Chi. He won more than 20 state and regional awards. A historical marker was erected in his honor in Matador in 1972.

Mrs. Meador, her niece, Freida Maxey of Paducah, her nephew Gerald Fulker, former Matador Tribune employees, Mary Ann Woosley Edwards, and Hazel Donovan, were present at the luncheon. A beautiful plaque was presented to Mrs. Meador.

## Commissioners Accept Resignation of Judge

The Motley County Commissioners met in a special session and accepted the resignation of County Judge Boyce Hart, Monday, April 5.

The Commissioners Court will begin in the near future to fill the vacancy of the County Judge for the remaining 21 months of the term.

Hart, elected in 1990, tendered his resignation to County Commissioner Franklin Jameson on Monday, March 29 and officially stepped down at the end of the day Wednesday, March 31.

In an interview with the Lubbock *Avalanche Journal*, Mr. Hart was asked if there had been problems with other members of the commissioners court. He replied, "I would rather not get into it. It would do nobody any good."

The 63-year-old Hart worked in the Texas Animal Health Commission for 21 years before retiring and running for county judge. It was his first public office and it "didn't turn out like I wanted," he said.

## Students Achieve Goal In Memory of Teacher

NOTE: This article was taken from the *Amarillo Daily News*. Nan Smith was a teacher in Motley County ISD some years ago, and we thought our readers might find the following article interesting.

OLTON — If Nan Smith were alive today, she probably would tell the students of Webb Elementary School in Olton, "Thanks a million."

Three years ago, students at Webb set a goal of collecting a million tabs from aluminum cans. The students began the project hoping to picture how much "a million" was, said Gayle Allcorn, a teacher at the elementary school.

But one year after the project began, Smith, the school's gifted and talented teacher, became gravely ill and was put on a list for a liver transplant, Allcorn said.

So, the students of the school decided to change the focus of the project, and continued collecting the aluminum tabs hoping to cash them in and help Smith defray the cost of her medical bills.

Allcorn said tabs poured in from across the area - but Smith died in February 1991 before the tabs could be cashed in.

Still, the students wanted to honor the beloved teacher, Allcorn said, and they dedicated the tabs to Smith's

memory. Thanks in part to the efforts of the students, a tangible reminder of Smith's presence is still in Olton, Allcorn said.

When the 800,000 tabs the students collected were sold, the \$250 raised went to start a fund in honor of Smith, Allcorn said. The community contributed to the fund, and the money was used to buy a \$4,000 baby grand piano, she said.

On March 26, the piano was dedicated to the memory of the teacher, who loved music and even had written a song for Webb Elementary.

"Music was her life apart from teaching," Allcorn said. "Even when she was very ill, she sang, 'It Is Well With My Soul' in church."

The Nan Smith piano, placed in the dining room of the new Runningwater Draw Care Center, will be a constant reminder of the contributions of a teacher that students cannot forget, Allcorn said.

"For the dedication, we had a former music teacher sing 'It Is Well With My Soul,'" Allcorn said, "I think everyone when they see the plaque, they'll remember the part music played in her life."

And as for Smith, "she's smiling and singing," Allcorn said.

"She's just rejoicing with the angels as she looks down on this," Allcorn said.




### FFA Ag Mechanics Team Will Go To State

The Motley County FFA Agricultural Mechanics Team placed 1st in the Texas Tech University Judging Contest held on the Texas Tech campus April 3rd. Skill areas for this year's contest consist of: compact and utility tractor power; small gas engines; metal building fabrication; concrete and masonry construction; hot and cold metal work; electric motors, controls, and sensing devices; tool maintenance; and arc welding. Bradley Jameson was 4th high individual in the contest. Roegan Cruse was the first high individual in the contest

and the winner of a \$200 scholarship from Texas Tech. The contest consists of a 75 question written examination, three 24 problem - problem solving tests, and a hands on skill demonstration from five of the skill areas. The team will compete in the State Ag Mechanics contest in College Station on April 24th against 29 other teams that qualified for the contest from around the state. The winner of the state contest will advance to the National contest held in Kansas City next November.



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# Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by drought which occurred from August 1, 1992 through November 10, 1992, are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Spur, FmHA County Supervisor Larry J. Clements said today.

Motley County is one of eight in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Mike Espy as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production

losses resulting from the drought which occurred from August 1, 1992 through November 10, 1992.

Larry J. Clements said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must

have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for a FmHA emergency loan," Larry Clements said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency resignation will be accepted until November 10, 1993 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in

processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Clements said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Spur is open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.




