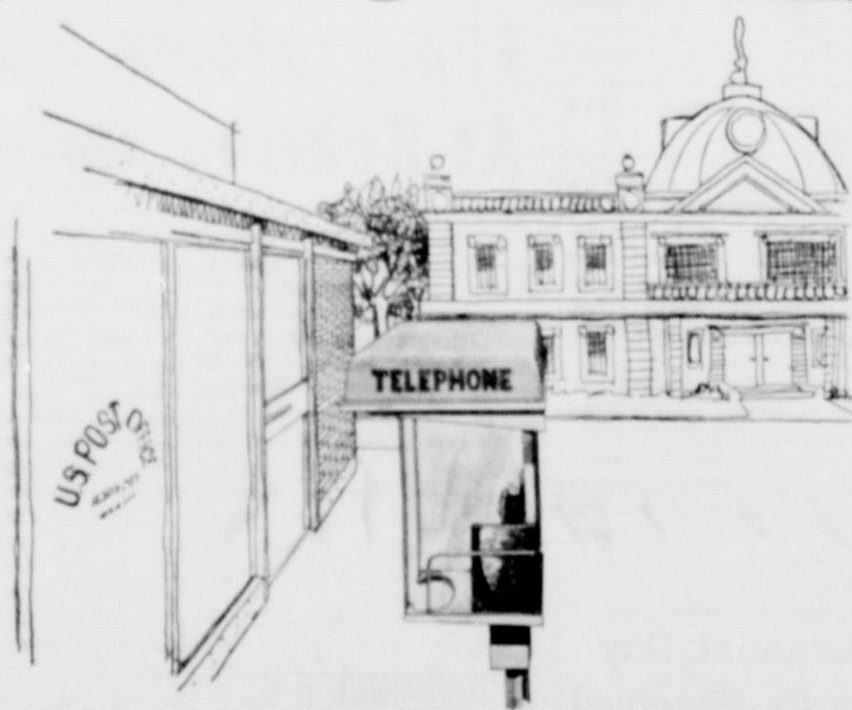

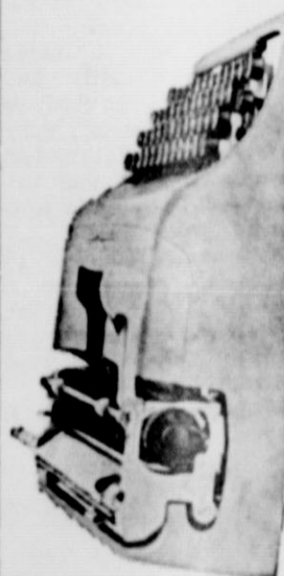

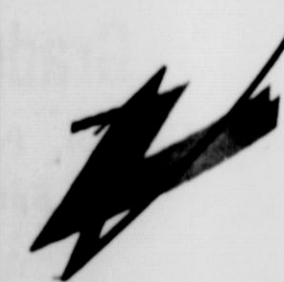

Open letter to Senator Andy Rogers

Dear Andy:

Your sudden interest in Motley County is refreshing. The only service we have sought from you in 17 years has been denied, then you write two-page letters to voters explaining why you have refused to carry a bill in the Senate which will allow us to hold an election and decide whether or not we want to create a hospital district.

Andy, your principal concern appears to be a doubt that the plan was publicized. It is not very comforting to us to realize that you have been in the Legislature 17 years, and still do not know that a bill of this nature must be advertised, in a newspaper of general circulation, for three consecutive issues, before it could possibly be introduced.

You would think first of Austin, and then of any friends you might have there. We know he represents us and a lot of other Texans. We sent the bill to him because we felt he would see it through. The fact that you never received a copy is not our fault.

The fact that you and Bill Healy do not see eye to eye is not our problem, but you have placed a penalty on us, and in turn, taken a political slant on something that is not political.

You know it is common practice for this type bill to start in either house and you could have, in good grace, carried the bill, if you had had any good will for the people of Motley County who have voted for you almost unanimously for the past 17 years.

Andy, we don't want your advice. We don't want a lecture on political morals. We know how to vote and we can make our own decisions. We may all vote against the hospital district, but we want the privilege. We also know about taxes. It is a medium of exchange taken out of our pockets to pay a Senator to serve us in Austin.
