Jury Gives Cruse 7-Year Term

MEMPHIS — Weldon Paul Cruse, who was convicted of voluntary man-slaughter on Tuesday, was sentenced to seven years in prison last Wednesday, Cruse's attorney said.

In addition to the prison sentence, the seven-woman, five-man jury gave the 62-year-old Turkey man a \$7,000 fine, his attorney, Jim Brown, said.

Cruse, who was convicted of the August 19 shooting death of Northfield resident Eddie (Petesy) Timmons, faced a maximum of 20 years in prison for the second-degree felony.

Brown said the seven-year sentence was "a victory for us."
"We'd like to have probation, but seven years is better than 70," he said. "Considering the facts of the case, I think we came out all right. I think the facts were so bad they could not help but send him to jail for

David McCoy, the 100th Judicial

District attorney, said the sentence was a disappointment.
"I feel terrible," he said. "I busted my backside. I went the last mile on the case The facts were so heinous. That's awful cheap for a human life."

McCoy said a combination of Cruse's age, the fact that he had no prior criminal history, and the fact that Eddie Timmons had a previous murder conviction might have influenced the jury to impose a sen-tence less than the maximum penalty. Brown said another factor might have

been that voluntary manslaughter "means there was provocation by the guy that got

McCoy said Cruse must serve at least year, nine months - before he will be eligible for parole.

Brown said Cruse is out on bond and will spendtime with his family for the next week to 10 days before he begins serving his sentence. Brown said he did not expect to file an appeal in the case

According to testimony during Cruse's trial, Cruse was embroiled in a feud over land with Timmons, his 49-year -old brother-in-law.

Timmons' partially burned body w discovered early Aug. 20 stuffed head-first in a trash barrel in an alley behind Cruse's home in Turkey.

Timmons had been shot once in the head from close range with a 12-gauge shotgun, according to testimony.

FRUITS: A NATURAL SWEET

an important part of a healthy diet. According to surveys, most people eat fresh fruit for snacks; and the banana is the most popular fruit in America, followed by apples and seedless grapes. The USDA Food Guide Pyramid rec-

ommends two to four servings of fruit each day. For most, that's easy to do because fruit is so popular and makes such a handy snack when eaten fresh. Because it's also naturally sweet, it can serve as a dessert, substituting for higher fat and calorie-laden desserts.

Fruit gives a quick source of energy in the form of carbohydrate. Fruits and fruit juices also provide important amounts of Vitamins A and C and potassium. They are low in fat and sodium. Some fruits provide a good amount of fiber, including apples, berries, figs, pears, peaches, and

Seving sizes are important when interpreting the Food Guide recommenda-tions. A serving size is a particular amount of a food, not just the number of times it is eaten per day. For example, a serving size of fuit would be a small to medium orange or banana, or half of a large banana; one-half cup chopped,cooked, or canned fruit; and three-fourths cup juice When selecting juices, only 100 percent fruit juice products are considered a serving. Other products such as fruit punches,

reservateres ades, or sodas contain only a little juice Fruits, often called nature's sweet, are and added sugar. Fruit jello also does not

qualify.
Other tips for including fruits in the

 Include many forms. Choose fresh fruit, fruit juice, and frozen, canned, or dried fruit. Go easy on fruit canned or frozen in syrup or sugar. Read the labels

for content.

— Include whole fruits. They are

— Include citrus fruits, melons, and berries because they are rich in Vitamin C. We need Vitamin C each day because

the body does not store it.

— Always wash fresh fruits before preparing or eating to remove any surface dirt, residue, or bacteria. Capitalize on the richness and versa-
