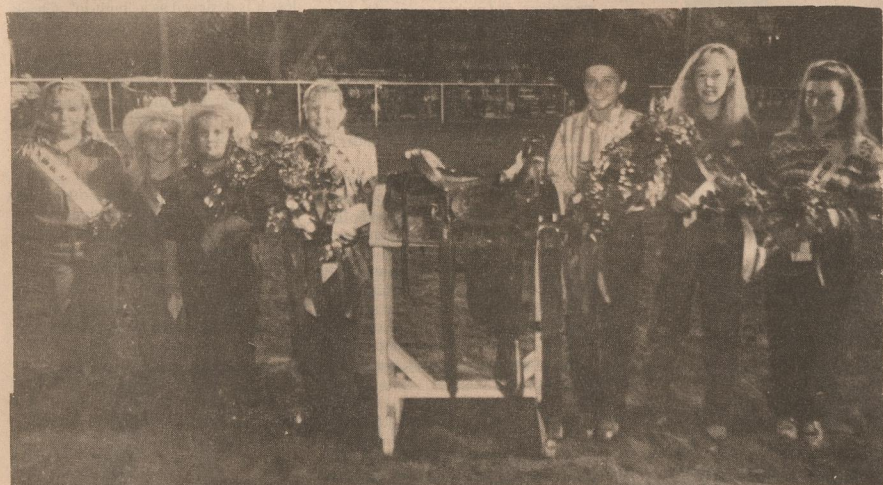

School Board Meeting Report

The Motley County ISD Board of Trustees met in a special board meeting August 30 at 7:30 p.m.

Gary Harrell, Superintendent of Jayton ISD was present to explain Option 4 of the Senate Bill 7. Harrell stated if the voters of Kent County vote to pass Option 4 on September 4 they can then purchase Weighted Average Daily Attendance (WADA) from Motley County ISD.

The Board elected to sell WADA to Jayton ISD if the voters pass Option 4.

No one was in attendance for the Public Hearing of the Tax Rate Increase.

Items for board action were as follows:

- * Time and date were set for the 1993-94 tax rate adoption, September 8 at 7:30 p.m.
- * Approved update 44 in TASB Policy Manual.
- * 1992-93 Budget Amendment #3 approved.

- * Dress and Grooming Code were discussed.
- The CED meeting opened at this time. Items for board action were as follows:
 - * Minutes of the previous meeting were approved.
 - * The Motley County ISD Board of Trustees was appointed successor-in-interest to CED.
 - * Transfer of Assets, Liabilities, and records to the successor-in-interest was authorized.
 - * Delinquent taxes, revenues, penalties, transfer of contracts, and records from the CED to the successor-in-interest was authorized.
 - * All business and administrative matters relating to dissolving the CED be referred to the successor-in-large, Motley County ISD Board of Trustees was authorized.

Meeting adjourned.

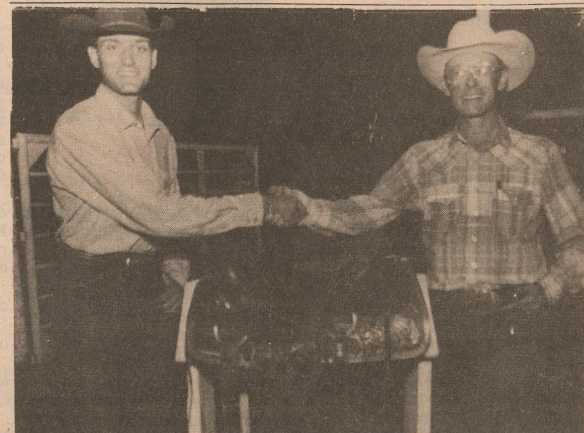

State Comptroller's Sales Tax Rebates Indicate Continued Growth In State's Economy

State Comptroller John Sharp today delivered a total of \$182.3 million in monthly sales tax rebates to 1,069 Texas Cities and 109 counties, a 15.9 percent increase over the payments of one year ago.

"Employment in Texas has continued to rise from last year. The service sector led all other industries by adding more than 59,000 jobs over last year. As the national economy recovers, increased consumer spending has caused sales tax rebates to increase," Sharp said.

Texas cities received \$165.2 million, up 15.9 percent over the \$142.6 million they received last August. Counties received a total of \$17 million, a 16.1 percent increase from their August 1992 payment.

This month's sales tax payments include taxes collected by monthly filers on June sales and by quarterly filers for

April, May and June and reported to the Comptroller in July.

County Total - net payment this period, 5,169.00; comparable payment prior year, 3,866.22; % change, 33.69%; 1993 payments to date, 33,432.44; 1992 payments to date, 25,195.06; % change, 32.69%

Home Economically Speaking

WHAT'S THAT "DIFFERENT" SOUND IN YOUR KITCHEN?
If you bought a new refrigerator within the past few years, you've probably noticed that it sounds "different". Here's why.

New refrigerators use only half as much electricity as older models. In fact, a new 20.6 cubic foot refrigerator with top freezer uses more electricity than a 75 watt light bulb. Most new refrigerators are also larger and have such added conveniences as automatic defrost systems, ice makers, and perhaps even a "built-in" look, resulting in different sounds such as:

— High-pitched whine from more energy efficient compressors that have smaller, higher speed motors.

— Soft hum from the evaporator fan in the freezer or condenser fan under the refrigerator.

— Clicks from the automatic defrost timer switching on and off, the thermostat turning the refrigerator on and off, or the water valve refilling the icemaker.

— Boiling, gurgling or trickling water when the refrigerator stops running, the defrost water runs into the drain pan or the refrigerator circulates in the system.

— Running water as the ice cube tray fills, and thuds as ice cubes drop into the

storage bin.
To help deafen these new sounds:
— Make sure the refrigerator is level and the defrost water collection pan is in position (usually reachable behind the bottom front "toe plate").

— Put carpet or sound-absorbing ceiling tile on the wall behind the refrigerator. Carpeting, drapery, upholstered furniture and wall coverings can help muffle refrigerator sounds.

— Allow enough space between the back of the refrigerator and the wall unless it is designed as a "built-in". Check your use and care book for the needed space.

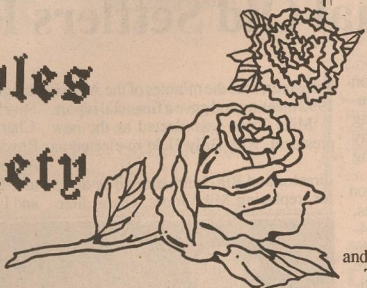
To reduce compressor "run time":
— Vacuum the condenser coils at least twice a year, more often if you have pets.

— Keep your freezer at least three-fourths full. Use partially-filled water jugs to fill empty space.

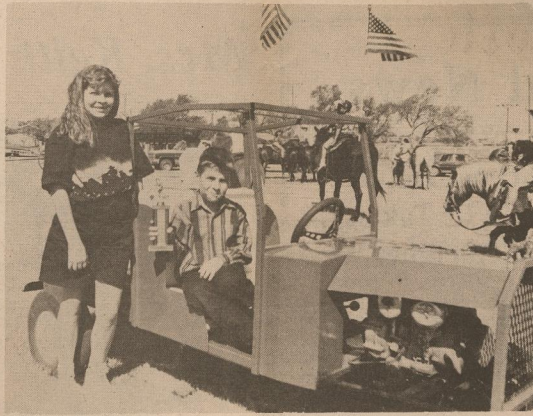
