Flomot Rites Held For Mrs. Ola Jones

Funeral services for Mrs. Ola Jones, 91, of Flomot were held at 2:30 p. m. Saturday in the Flomot Methodist Church. Earl Cantwell, minister of the Rock Creek Church of Christ near Silverton, officiated, assisted by Jeff Browning of Flomot, a Church of Christ lay member.

Burial was in Memorial Park Cemetery at Flomot, with Seigler Funeral Home in charge.

Mrs. Jones, one of the oldest and few remaining pioneers of Motley county, died Thursday night at Nichols Manor Nursing Home in Lockney after a long illness. She had been a resident patient there about 3 1/2 years.

She was born Ola Williams, June 1, 1877 in Selma, Alabama, and was married to Benjamin J. Jones, May 10, 1896 in Salem, Arkansas. They made their home in Oklahoma until 1915, when they moved to the Flomot community. Mr. Jones preceded his wife in death, January 15, 1948. She was also preceded by two sons, Clive, who died in 1955 and C. B. (Casey) Jones, who passed away in 1966.

Mrs. Jones was a member of the Flomot Church of Christ. At her death on March 6, she had attained the age of 91 years, 9 months, and 5 days.

Survivors include four sons, John and C. C. Jones, both of Flomot, Ewell Jones of Kress and J. D. Jones of Amarillo; one daughter, Mrs. Winnie Elton of Wichita Falls; a brother, Jim Williams of Atoka, Okla., two sisters, Mrs. Evie Rice of Dallas and Mrs. Fannie Samples of Huntsville; 17 grandchildren, 26 great-grandchildren and 14 great-great-grandchildren.

Pallbearers were grandsons: Ralph Jones, M. C. Jones, Bennie Jones, Larry Bynum, Joel Jones and Leroy Elton.

Cartwright was cited for meritorious service while serving as the Noncommissioned Officer in charge of the Ordnance Shop, Marine Fighter Attack Squadron 122, Marine Aircraft Eleven, First Marine Aircraft Wing in connection with operations against insurgent communist (Viet Cong) forces in the Republic of Viet Nam from 4 September 1967 to 1 September 1968. During this time, he distinguished himself by his consistently high level of efficiency in operating the Maintenance Material Management System, observing and enforcing safety regulations and monitoring the inspection and repair of equipment. During hostile rocket attacks against his base during the Tet Offensive last year, he exhibited exceptional leadership as he calmly and efficiently coordinated the actions of his men. Cartwright, the son of Mrs. M.E. Simpson, has been based in Vietnam on three tours of duty. His wife is the former Jane Scaff.

State Bank Names Stapleton President

Directors last week named Ralph Stapleton of Flomot as President of the First State Bank here. The appointment fills the vacancy resulting from the death of Harry H. Campbell, February 17. Mr. Campbell had been president of the bank since March 24, 1950.

Mr. Stapleton, pioneer of the Flomot area, had been a director of the bank since September 24, 1941.

According to Tribune files, John H. P. Jones was the President of the first bank in Matador, April 15, 1907. The private banking institu-

tion later became the First State Bank and the late A. B. Echols was elected President February 1, 1921. He served in this capacity until his death in 1939.

The late C. D. Bird was then elected president and held that place until Campbell's election in 1950. Mr. Bird at that time became Chairman of the Board.

Ralph Stapleton was born at Clifton, Texas and moved with his parents, Dr. and Mrs. G. J. Stapleton to Dimmitt when he was 11 years of age. He moved to Flomot in the fall of 1916.

The former Suelecker Elmore and Ralph Stapleton were married in Plainview, December 22, 1917, and lived on the Stapleton farm north of Flomot until moving to their present home on Tom Ball Creek, south of Flomot.

Mrs. Stapleton was born at Killen and moved with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. D. S. Elmore, to Big Spring in 1907, and to Flomot in August, 1917.

The Stapletons have two children, a son, George D. Stapleton and a daughter, Mrs. Pace Cramer both of Arlington.

Stock Show Plans Made

PLANS for the Annual Motley County Junior Livestock Show were made last week at a meeting of the show officers of the Motley County Livestock Association. The show will be held at the Matador Schools FFA Building, Saturday, March 29th. All animals must be weighed in by 9:30 a. m. according to County Agent Bill Pallmeyer. The swine show will start at 10 a. m., and the beef show will start at 1:30 p. m. Floor bids for animals will be taken at 1:15, and auction for the top 15 steers and market hogs will start after the Grand Champion steer has been selected.

Judge for the beef class will be Paul Marion, Superintendent of the Spur Experiment Station. Judge of the swine show will be Milton Mann, vocational agriculture instructor, of Clarendon.

Memberships in the Motley County Livestock Association are currently being sold to provide money for the show. Support is requested so that young feeders in the county can be adequately rewarded for their time and efforts.

Show officers are: Bundy Campbell, Matador, president; Bill Hand, Roaring Springs, vice-president; and Lewis Bostick, Matador, secretary.

Other directors are: Banty Brandon, Roaring Springs; Herb Martin and Ronald Clay of Flomot.

County Hospital Budget Approved

Budget for the Motley County Hospital District was approved Monday night at an open meeting held in the Commissioners Court room.

Other action of the hospital board included the approval of detailed specifications for the remodeling of Stanley Hospital here to meet state and federal requirements.

John Stevens, President of the board, said the plans will now be sent for final federal approval, and that it might be possible to receive bids for the construction by the first of May.

Telelecture Comes To Matador School

A unique experiment in communication will be presented at the Matador High School Friday morning from 10 until 11 o'clock, when fifth, sixth and seventh grade pupils will hear a "telelecture" by an author in New York City, via modern electronic equipment.

The author, Madeleine L'Engle will speak to the students and answer a list of questions prepared by them in advance, as the program was being arranged.

Miss L'Engle has a number of books to her credit, one of which, "Is A Wrinkle In Time," was studied last year by the 7th grade and is being studied this year by the 6th grade. Next year the 5th grade pupils will also read and study the book. The author explains that the events in the book are based on the scientific principles of Einstein's Theories of Relativity.

'Weevil Counters' Confluence Here

MATADOR was alive Tuesday with a new activity, the confluence of boll weevil counters for Motley, Dickens, Briscoe and Hall Counties, as a part of a new experimental program to halt the advance of the boll weevil.

Fred Roy of Lubbock, state district supervisor, said the program is known as the "Pheromone Weevil Project." The plan is to trap the boll weevil and the state expects to establish as many as 25 or 30,000 weevil traps in the four counties as soon as permits can be obtained from land owners. Work of putting out the traps will start this week.

Approximately 50 persons have been employed in the four county area, who will use 25 government vehicles to check the traps. Among the 50 employed are six women.

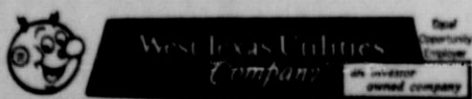

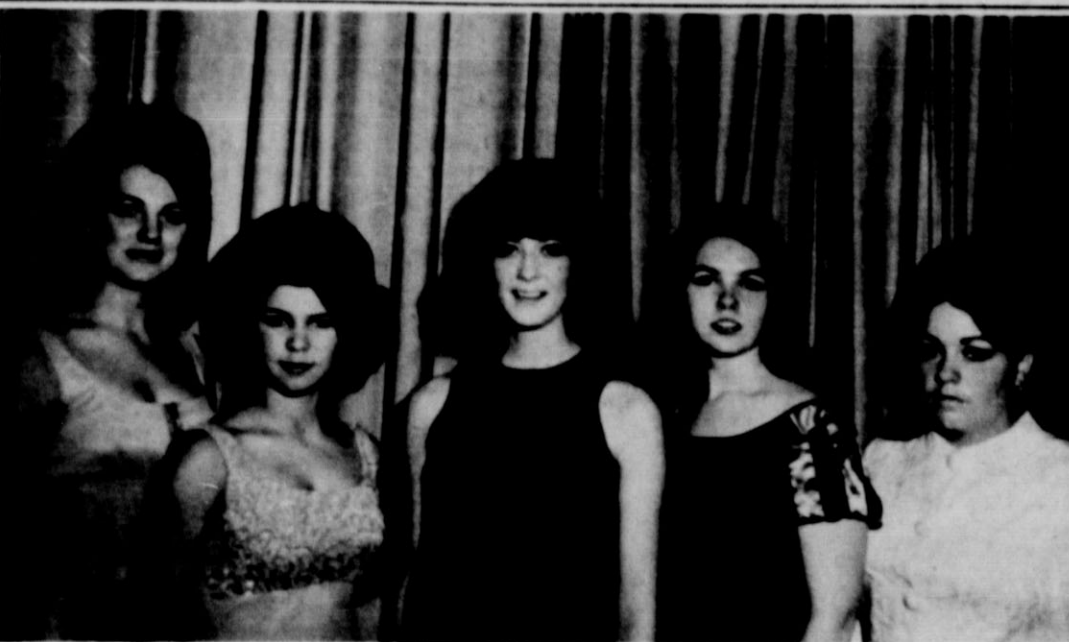

WEIGH STATION NEAR CHILDRESS TO BE DEDICATED

Weigh Station No. 51, only the third in the state of Texas, will be opened formally with official ceremonies on Saturday, March 15, near Childress. Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety announced today.

Formal dedication ceremonies will be held at 2:00 p.m., with State Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon, Rep. W. S. Healy of Paducah and Col. Wilson E. Speir, State Director of the DPS, as the principal speakers.

Rep. Healy will cut the ribbon that officially opens the station and the first truck will be weighed by either the assistant DPS Director or the Chief of Traffic Law Enforcement.

District Judge Charles Reynolds of Childress will serve as master of ceremonies for the occasion.

The public is invited to attend the ceremonies and will be given a tour of the weigh station.

An informal coffee for guests and visitors will be staged at Gay's Cafe, sponsored by the Childress Chamber of Commerce, at 3:00 p.m. After the formal ceremonies the weigh station will remain open for public inspection until 5:00 p.m.

Leading officials of Childress and the county will be honored guests at the formal dedication and ribbon cutting.

Only 38% County Cars Inspected

Last year Motley County registered (and had inspected) 1938 motor vehicles. As of March 1, only 738 vehicles, about 38%, had been inspected.

OF THE REQUIREMENT FOR RECORDATION AND LIMITATION OF CERTAIN CLAIMS OF WATER RIGHTS.

Notice is here given as required by Section 4 of the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 (Article 7542a, Vernon's Civil Statutes) that all claims of riparian water rights, all claims under Article 7500a, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, to impound, divert or use public waters for other than domestic and livestock purposes for which no permit has been issued, all claims of water rights under the Irrigation Acts of 1889 and 1895 which were not filed with the State Board of Water Engineers in accordance with the Irrigation Act of 1913, as amended, and all other claims of water rights other than claims under permits and certified filings, must be recorded with the Texas Water Rights Commission. Section 4 does not apply to use of water for domestic and livestock purposes as the same is defined by Commission Rules.

On or before September 1, 1969, every person claiming any water right to which Section 4 applies shall file with the Commission a sworn statement setting forth the nature of the claim of water right. Claims to which the Section applies shall be recognized only if valid under existing law and only to the extent of actual application of water to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1967, inclusive.

However, in any case where any claimant of a riparian right has prior to August 28, 1967, commenced or completed the construction of works designed to apply a greater quantity of water to beneficial use, such right shall be recognized to the extent of the maximum amount of water actually applied to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1970, inclusive; provided an additional sworn statement is filed on or before July 1, 1971. Failure to file the sworn statement or statement in substantial compliance with Section 4 shall extinguish and bar any claim of water right to which the Section applies. Instructions and forms for recording claims may be obtained without cost from the Texas Water Rights Commission, P. O. Box 12396, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.

Student Tours Booked through May At Institute of Texas Cultures

SAN ANTONIO—Some 75,000 a week for in-depth studies of each Texas school children are planning to visit the displays at the Institute of Texas Cultures in San Antonio from March through the end of May, R. Henderson Shuffler, Institute Director, has announced.

The visits are a part of a special educational program aimed at helping students learn more about the individuals from many lands who played a major role in the history of Texas. It was developed in response to requests from teachers from all over the State who visited the Institute during HemisFair '68 and saw its exhibits as a useful teaching tool.

After a large number of requests for visitation dates and guided tours, the Institute of Texas Cultures asked the Texas Education Agency to determine the range and extent of demand for such services. A questionnaire was sent to school principals and superintendents throughout the state. The estimate of attendance is based on replies received to date.

School groups who have requested bus tours range from 12 to several thousand in size and include pupils from elementary, junior high and high schools. Requests indicate they plan to spend from two hours to half a day per group at the Institute and that most of those from outside the local area plan to visit other sites of historic interest while in San Antonio.

While most of the groups from over the state have made requests for only one visit during the next few months, some local schools have asked to bring classes once

TAX MAN SAM SAYS: When it comes to arithmetic the IRS computer would get a straight A and stand at the head of the class. Most of us make simple errors in arithmetic anytime we add more than two and two. However, when we figure our income tax returns we have to go through the painful process of adding and subtracting and multiplying just like we did when we were in the fifth grade.

When an Internal Revenue agent or any tax professional figures a tax return he uses an adding machine and/or calculator to work the tax computation. He also goes back and re-checks all of his figures. In many cases the professional man who works with figures also has someone else to check the figures. If all taxpayers would follow the system used by the professionals and very carefully recheck their figures, they would keep the IRS computer from sending out so many math error notices.

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

TO THE DULY QUALIFIED RESIDENT ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF MATADOR, TEXAS AND TO ALL OTHER INTERESTED PERSONS:

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an election will be held in and throughout the City of Matador, Texas on the 5th day of April, 1969 on the question of the adoption of a One Percent (1%) Local

Sales and Use Tax within said City, in keeping with the following ordinance adopted by the City Council of said City, as follows, to-wit:

AN ORDINANCE ORDERING A SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE CITY OF MATADOR, TEXAS, ON THE QUESTION OF THE ADOPTION OF A ONE PERCENT (1%) LOCAL SALES AND USE TAX WITHIN THE CITY; DESIGNATING THE DAY OF THE ELECTION AND THE POLLING PLACE; APPOINTING ELECTION OFFICIALS THEREFOR; PROVIDING THAT ALL DULY QUALIFIED RESIDENT ELECTORS SHALL BE QUALIFIED TO VOTE, PROVIDING FOR NOTICE OF ELECTION; AND CONTAINING OTHER PROVISIONS RELATING TO SAID ELECTION.

WHEREAS, Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62) authorizes the governing body of any city, town or village in Texas to call an election for the purpose of adopting a local sales and use tax within such city, town or village; Now, Therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MATADOR:

Section 1. That a special election shall be held in and throughout the City of Matador, Texas, on the 5th day of April, 1969, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified voters of said City, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

"FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the City."

"AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the City."

Section 2. That said election shall be held in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and all duly qualified resident electors of the City of Matador, Texas shall be qualified to vote.

Section 3. That the ballots of said election shall conform to the requirements of election being held by Matador Independent School

District, with which the election is being held.

Section 4. That the elections judges and clerks are directed to comply with Article 6.06, Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended (Section 2 of House Bill 181, Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 452, Pages 1026, 1028), which provides that a square shall be placed beside each proposition in which the voter is instructed to place an "X" or other clear mark to indicate the way he wishes to vote; but which also provides that failure of a voter to mark his ballot in strict conformity with the directions on the ballot shall not invalidate the ballot, and the ballot shall be counted if the intention of the voter is clearly ascertainable, except where the law expressly prohibits the counting of the ballot. It is specifically provided that the election officers shall not refuse to count a ballot because of the voter's having marked his ballot by scratching out the statement of proposition for which he does not wish to vote.

Section 5. That notice of the election hereby ordered and called shall be given: (a) by publication on the same day for two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said City, the date of the first publication to be at least twenty-one (21) days prior to the date set herein for such election; and (b) by posting of such notice at the polling place in each of the election precincts of the City not less than

twenty (20) days prior to the date set herein for such election. It is hereby found and determined that the Matador Tribune is a newspaper published within the City of Matador, Texas, and is a newspaper of general circulation within said City.
