With the romance, excitement and nervousness of spring fancies and Jun brides, a couple can easily lose track of the financial aspect of a wedding. An $\$ 13,000$ and may run wedding runs up bills quickly. For spring or summer weddings, plan ning has already begun. But it's not too late to get control of spending associated with the big day. Start your budget by writing down the expected cost of items
already planned. Add any other anticipated expenses and expect unplanned costs to occur.
For those just beginning to plan, set a tentative budget for the wedding before
talking to wedding consultants and service providers. You need to decide what you can spend, not what other people think you should spend. The tentative budgetmay need adjusting, but yourorigi-
nal estimate will help you stay on target by reminding you to trim expenses wherever you can.
In setting a budget, consider whethe to include these items:

tions or announcements. Low-cost facilitions or announcements. Low-cost facili-
ties or service providers may be booked ies or service providers may be booked up for your wedding date if you wait to
late to schedule. Starting early allows you to buy the bride's, groom's, and attendants' attire on lay-away, budgeting your money as you go.

ding with romantic illusion, it is busines toservice providers. Make sure you know your obligation in case of changes or cancellations, get written quotes on costs early payments. early payments.

compensate for them by cutuing dow somewhere else. Evaluate whether you can pay some costs ahead of time to save finance charges or reduce the lump sum which will need to be paid later, if ex penses are getting out of hand, discus
whether some items can be cut from the budget to save money.
As your wedding nears you can relax and enjoy it, knowing that you are in control of your finances. Extra expenses
will undoubtedly crop up, but you willnot be staggered by the overall total you owe as you start your life together.
