## Motley County Matadors Edge Amherst Bulldogs

The Motley County Matadors kept their district record unblemished with a 22-20 victory over the Bulldogs of Amherst at Amherst last Friday.

The Bulldogs homecoming provided the incentive for the Bulldogs to allow the Matadors only 188 yards on the ground. Castulo Gonzales led the Motley rushers with 83 yards.

In the passing department the Matadors went 3 for 7 for 33 yards, with Frank Welling hauling in all three passes.

On the opening kickoff the Matadors started off with a bang when Joe Campbell took the kickoff and raced 95 yards for the touchdown. The extras failed and Motley led 6-0.

On the next Motley possession the Matadors struck paydirt in 6 plays, with Jerry Pitts rambling 43

yards for the score. A Stevens to Welling pass provided the extras and Motley now led 14-0.

But in the second and fourth quarters the Bulldogs added two touchdowns of their own and converted the extras and the score was knotted at 14-14.

The Matadors at this point were tied in penetrations, but trailed in first downs. The offense went to work. A 27 yard pass to Frank Welling for the four set up the touchdown two plays later by Castulo Gonzales. A pass to Welling for the extras and Motley led 22-14.

With less than two minutes left the Bulldogs scored another touchdown. But on the extras the Bulldog back was met on the line of scrimmage by a host of Matadors and Motley won 22-20.

The win boosted the Matadors record to 7-1 for the season and 5-0 for the district, which sets the stage for the Sudan game for the zone championship, next week.

Friday (tomorrow) the Matadors travel to Whiteface to play the Antelopes in a non-zone game, but an intradistrict clash at 7:30.

## Pakistanis Enjoy Matador Visit

Last week Mrs. W. F. Jacobs had some interesting visitors in her home. Abdul Quadir and his wife, Asiya, were visiting Matador from Karachi, Pakistan.

Mrs. Jacobs met Abdul 11 years ago while he was stationed at Reese Air Force Base with three other airmen from Pakistan. They were guests of the El Progresso Study Club when Mrs. W. N. Pipkin was president.

The Quadirs were in the United States visiting Asiya's brother in Washington, D.C. He is working on a Master's Degree at George Washington University.

Abdul was at Reese AFB for primary and basic training and then was sent to a base in Nevada to Advanced Gunners School. He was training under a program that provided training for pilots from Pakistan and other allied countries.

"We had written exams; then intergroup testing in Pakistan to get into the program," Abdul said.

Abdul's and Asiya's English was very good and a good deal more correct than the English many of us use.

"English is compulsory in Pakistan. Many people even speak it at home," Asiya said.

"The Air Force sent me to Lackland AFB for a lan-

guage training period but soon sent me home. I already knew English," said Abdul.

Abdul is now a commercial pilot for Pakistani International Airlines. The airline operates out of Karachi International Airport and has flights to many of the major cities of the world.

The weather in Karachi is about like that of Corpus Christi according to Abdul. But the country is large and there are great changes in latitude and therefore weather, just like in the United States.

"They don't date so much in the rural areas but the cities are a lot like here," said Abdul. "We have meat and vegetables just like here."

But Abdul did point out one major difference, the price of labor.

"We hire a man for \$20. a month to watch the house. Our three bedroom, three bath house is only \$70 a month," Abdul said.

"We have a gasoline crisis also. It is over a dollar per gallon," according to Abdul. "That crisis is not only in the United States."

As I was about to leave, Abdul commented on what a wonderful experience his stay in Matador had been.

"We felt as if we were at home. Mrs. Jacobs has been so nice to us. By the grace of God we will see her again."

ELECTION interest Tuesday, in Motley County probably will be centered around the Congressional race in which Senator Jack Hightower, on the Democratic ticket is bidding for the place as U.S. Representative, of the 13th Congressional District now held by Republican Bob Price.

Other offices in which the two major parties (Democratic and Republican) are offering candidates include the Governor's race, with Jim Granberry of Lubbock (R) running against incumbent Dolph Briscoe (D); Lieut. Gov. Bill Hobby (D), and Gaylord Marshall (R); Attorney General, John Hill (D) and Tom Cole (R); Comptroller of Public Accounts, Bob Armstrong (D) and Mary Lou Grier (R); Commissioner of Agriculture, John C. White (D) and Zack Fisher (R); Railroad Commissioner, Jim C. Langdon (D) and Joe P. Cain (R); and Railroad Com. (unexpired term), Mack Wallace (D) and Dale W. Steffes (R).

In the race for State Senator to succeed Hightower, are Ray Farabee (D) of Wichita Falls and Mrs. Mary Virginia Kirchhoff (R) of Plainview. There are no run-offs for county offices. Since this is general election, a split ticket can be voted. If a person wishes to vote a straight ticket, he may do so by placing an X in the square beside the name of the party of his choice at the head of the party column. A write-in candidate is also allowed in the general election, but not in the primary.

The important thing is to go to the polls Tuesday, November 5, and vote. And voters are reminded that the number of people voting for governor on the Democratic ticket determines the number of eligible delegates to the Democratic Convention.

## Date Announced For Chest Drive

Matador Community Chest will conduct its annual drive for funds, starting November 18. Announcement was made by R. M. (Bob) Stanley following a meeting of the board of directors Wednesday of last week in the Commissioners court room at the courthouse.

Besides plans for the drive, other business was the selection of Larry Hoyle as a board member to fill the vacancy made by the recent death of Douglas Meador.

Goal for this year's drive is \$2,000. As in former years, the campaign will be conducted by mail, and letters will be mailed to everyone locally within the near future.

Funds will be used as formerly. Agencies receiving a percentage of monies collected include the Red Cross, USO and Salvation Army. In addition, such local youth activities as Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts are also supported by the Community Chest.

While the Community

Chest responds to requests for help, the requests are screened by a local Board of Directors. Although complaints have been made that transients receive large portions of the Chest funds, it was pointed out by President Stanley that only \$40.85 was paid to aid indigents outside the county last year. The remainder of funds paid out were for local emergencies.

The Board of Directors includes R. M. Stanley, President, Forrest Campbell, Raby Webb, Glenn Woodruff, Pat Seigler, Larry Hoyle and Miss Rachel Patton, Secretary.

"I wish to express my appreciation for the support of the late Ben Meador, who served so many years on the Community Chest Board, and was also a past president, and also to other board members for their time and efforts in behalf of the organization," said Stanley. "Also greatly appreciated are the contributions from non-residents, which help us to help others."

Construction on 4.6 miles of highway in Motley County started Monday.

Grading, structures, flexible base and one course surface treatment will be included in the work on a strip extending from FM 97 (Flomot turn-off) South toward Matador on State Highway 70, for 4,606 miles.

E. H. Monroe of Clarendon will be the Engineer in charge for the State Highway Department. Ivan Dement Inc., Amarillo, is the main contractor and Otho Ferrier Bros., of Seymour are the concrete contractors for the bridge building.

And do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind, that you may prove what the will of God is, that which is good and acceptable and perfect.

Ro. 12:2. In the above verse Paul uses the word "perfect" to describe the gospel of Christ. James uses the same word to describe the same gospel.

But one who looks intently at the perfect law, the law of liberty, and abides in it, not having become a forgetful hearer, but an effectual doer, this man shall be blessed in what he does. James 1:25.

The law of liberty -- the law of Christ -- is perfect. Man cannot improve on the message which God has declared to be "perfect." Unless "he believes in vain." An Old Testament verse has a phrase to add to Paul's writings. Psalms 19:7 offers this expression. The law of the Lord is perfect, converting the soul. So often man tries to improve on the inspired writings by writing a creed of his own. The creed which he writes is different from the creed given by the Lord.

# Scholarships Sponsored By National 4-H Service

Young people are looking, with increased interest, and careers in agriculture and agribusiness. And they are encouraged in their efforts by a variety of scholarship programs arranged by the National 4-H Service Committee, Chicago, Ill.

In 1974, \$13,800 in scholarships will be offered to present and former 4-H members interested in preparing for careers in agriculture and related fields. Scholarship applications are available from the respective state 4-H leaders and County Extension Agents.

The scholarship winners, selected by the Cooperative Extension Service, will be announced during the 53rd National 4-H Congress in Chicago, Dec. 1-5.

Funding the scholarships are Allied Mills Foundation; Chevron Chemical Co.; Ortho Division; Homelite, A Division of Textron Inc.; DeKalb AgResearch, Inc.;

Champion Valley Farms; and Alpha Gamma Rho Educational Foundation.

Two college juniors, present or former 4-H'ers majoring in animal science are eligible for \$800 scholarships offered by Allied Mills Foundation.

Four \$1,600 scholarships are offered present or former 4-H members to be college juniors and who will be majoring or minoring in forestry, with these provided by Homelite.

Chevron Chemical Co. offers two \$800 scholarships to college freshmen or sophomores planning a major or minor in any of the plant or biological sciences. These are available to present or former members.

College juniors preparing for agribusiness careers may apply for \$500 scholarships offered by DeKalb AgResearch, Inc. Four grants are offered along with expense paid trips to the company's headquarters for a three day

seminar and possible participation in a summer internship program with the company. Candidates may be current or former 4-H members.

Two veterinary science juniors are to be awarded \$800 scholarships by Champion Valley Farms in the Lassie-Veterinary Medicine program. Former 4-H members are eligible to submit applications to their state 4-H leader or veterinary school.

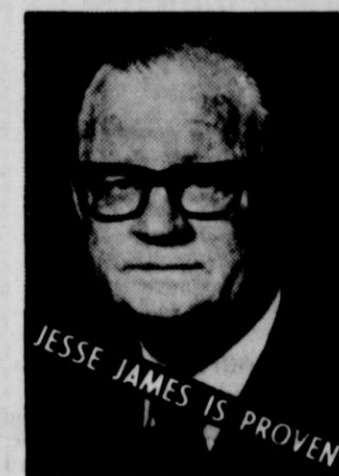
Alpha Gamma Rho Educational Foundation offers one \$600 grant to a current 4-H member.

Educational scholarships to be awarded in 1974, through the National 4-H Service Committee, total 265 in 40 different programs and are valued at \$184,100. These county 4-H records were judged in July, and members are encouraged to look over the different contests for 1975. Information will be distributed at regular 4-H meetings.

Proper insulation helps to keep OUT heat in the summer, cold in the winter, helps to reduce outside noises, and absorbs inside sounds.  
Adequate insulation can save over 40% on energy costs annually. You should have at least 4" in walls and 6" in ceilings. Heating and air conditioning duct-work should be wrapped with insulating material.  
Insulation can pay for itself with the savings from operating costs in about 1 1/2 years. Your home will be cleaner because insulation will help to keep dust and dirt pollution from sifting in.



**SAVE ENERGY WITH CAULKING AND WEATHERSTRIPPING**  
Check all windows and doors. If a cold draft indicates you are losing heat, install weatherstripping and caulking where needed. It will save on both heating and cooling costs.  
An almost invisible 1/4" gap at the base of a standard 36" outside door is equal to a nine square-inch hole in the side of your house. There are a number of easy-to-install felt and foam rubber products on the market to draft-proof doorways.
