





The FDA will request premix manufacturers to recall all outstanding stocks of their product from the market place for supervised disposal

In announcing the ban in the August 4, 1972 issue of the Federal Register the FDA that the use of DES in animal feed represents a public health hazard and, further, that no human harm has been demonstrated in over 17 years of use. Under the law, however, the continued use of the drug in feed may no longer be permitted according to FDA.

+++++ This is the season to apply dormant oils for controlling some hard-to-kill insects on trees and shrubs. Properly prepared oils are effective for controlling scale insects, mites pecan phylloxera, insect eggs and some hibernating caterpillars. Oils kill the mites by suffocation or by penetrating the breathing tubes. Insect eggs are killed because of the interference with the gas exchange through the shell.

As compared to insecticides, advancement? oils have the advantage of being You are the one! We offer cheaper, give good covering action, residues of oils on fruit and nut trees are exempt from uous training. For personal tolerance and oils are safe to handle. Oils are most toxic to leaves, have low toxicity to many insects and are relatively unstable in solutions.

Dormant oils can be applied any time trees and shrubs are in the dormant stage, however, oil is most effective if applied in late winter or early spring just before the buds start to crack. Application should be made when the temperature is between 40 and 65 degrees F. Freezing weather within 48 hours of treatment may cause the oil to be less effective.

When mixing and using dormant oils, extreme care should be taken to use only the amounts recommended by the manufacturer. Tree trunks and insect infested limbs should be thoroughly covered, but remember, some trees may be damaged if oil is applied in excessive amounts. Trees the most likely to suffer damage are beech, Japanese and sugar maple, hickory, walnut, butternut and some spruces.
