Urged to Join God's Team

Fathers, Sons Hear Athlete

"One of the greatest discoveries I made through football was the discovery of Jesus Christ," said Ecomet Burley to approximately 200 men and boys Tuesday night at Matador's thirty-eight annual Father-Son Banquet. Burley was the featured speaker at the banquet.

The supper was sponsored by the Matador Lions Club. Master of ceremonies for the banquet was Mark Wason, son of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Wason. Mark outlined

the history of the event and told of the letter that Paul Eubank, originator of the Father-Son Banquet in Matador, wrote in 1943 explaining that he could not attend because of military obligations. Eubank was killed in action in the South Pacific the next year.

Ray Sefcik, Motley County High School coach, introduced Burley and listed some of his accomplishments including: all-state trackster while attending high school in Lufkin, Outstanding Line-man of the Sun Bowl as a freshman at Texas Tech, Southwest Conference Sophomore of the Year, and NEA 2nd Team All-American as a junior.

Burley is currently a junior at Texas Tech University.

"This brings back memories," said Burley. "I can remember when I sat in the audience of a father-son banquet in Lufkin, just like you're doing now."

Burley related how his father played a great part in his success as a football player. "He taught me that education was foremost. It's because of the academic situation that I picked Tech," said Burley.

A great player must train regularly according to Burley. "It takes great discipline to stay out there every year. Discipline is a great word in football."

Burley related to the fathers and sons how his high school coach, along with his father, inspired him. "My coach told me that the moment you become satisfied you start going down. In life there's always a little more you can do to be better."

"Football, emphasizing the development of the mind and body, has many values and you can reap great returns," Burley said.

He listed some of those values as training, discipline, and development of character.

"To have a team you have to forget yourself," said Burley. "The training and discipline you receive in football are the same as you need in life."

After drawing parallels between the game of football and life, Burley moved to what he felt was the most important part of his speech and of his life.

"Finally I made a decision to join God's team. Not Jim Carlen's team or Steve Sloan's team but God's team. On this team you can never lose," said Burley.

"I know when I was young I thought that Christ was a sissy, but I found out different. He was no sissy. Christ was a carpenter, he worked with his hands."

"He was a Jew in the middle of Romans—he was a

Travel over the Panhandle and South Plains areas of Texas was affected and traffic was stopped on highways out of Ralls and Floydada, and after Saturday's mail delivery, there was no more until late Monday.

High winds, causing the snow to pile up in drifts, caused much of the highway trouble, as vehicles were stalled and numerous motorists stranded.

The snow left 40 of moisture, bringing the total to 3.63 for the eight weeks of this year, as compared to .18 this time last year, according to Bob Stanley.

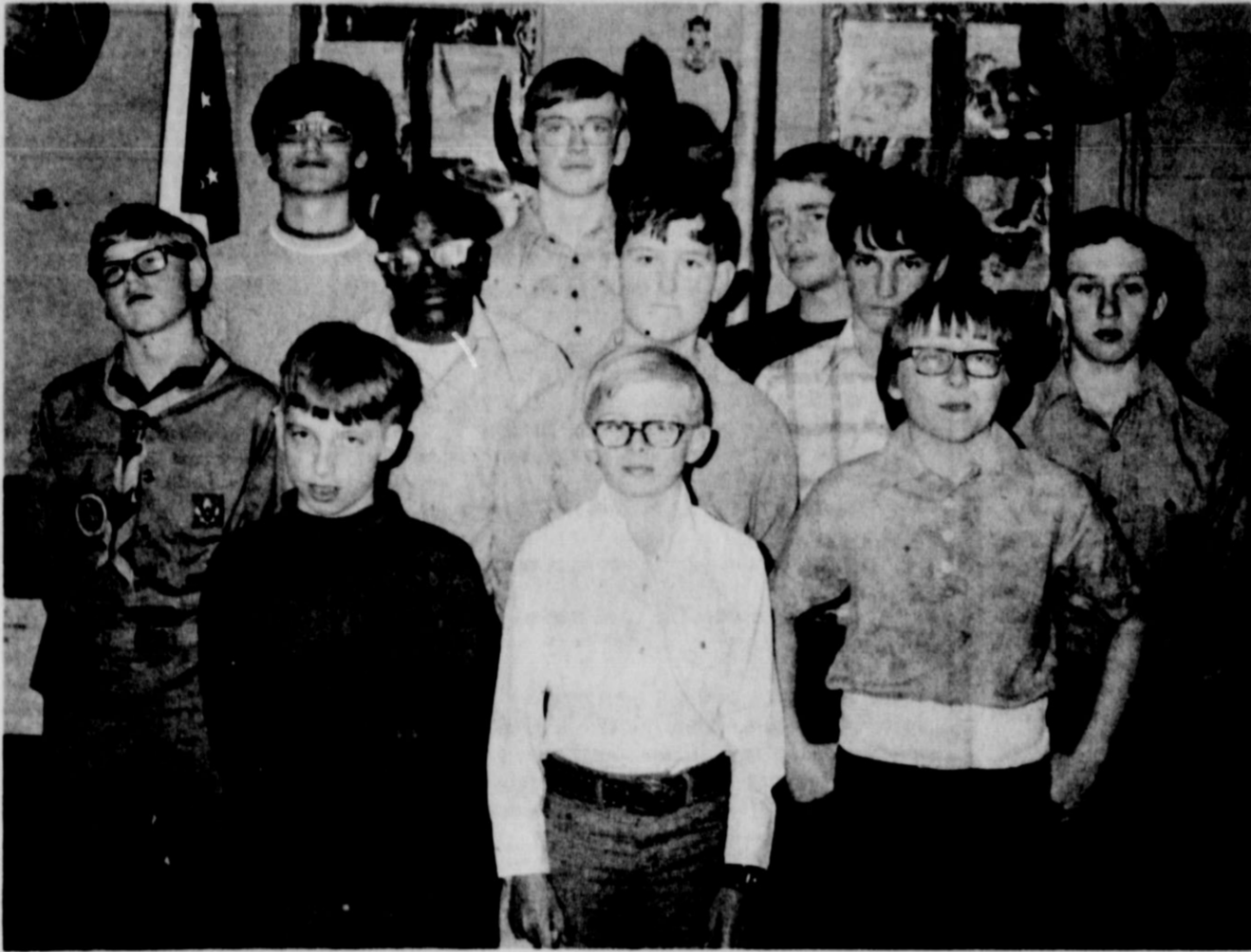

STUDIES ABOUT THE BIBLE

A second purpose for surrendering ourselves to Jesus in baptism is "for remission of sins." Some have misread and mistaught the preposition in this phrase. Below are four translations of this phrase.

Good News for Modern Man. "... so that your sins will be forgiven: ..."

Goodspeed. "... in order to have your sins forgiven: ..."

Revised Standard. "... unto the remission of your sins: ..."

New International. "... so that your sins may be forgiven: ..."

Also Greek scholars tell us that "for" in the above quote is translated from the Greek preposition "eis" which means "for" in the sense given in the four translations here presented. Peter reinforces these translations in this way. After telling how the Noah Family were saved, he writes this.

And corresponding to that, baptism now saves you . . . 1 Pet. 3:21.

In the latter part of this same verse Peter, with Paul, connects baptism with the resurrection of Christ. Paul says that baptism with its prerequisites brings about a new life. Please read Ro. 6:5-18.

The Holy Spirit furnished the apostles the necessary power for writing the gospel of Christ. And now every man may have that gospel "in his own language." And in every language the Bible strongly connects baptism with salvation -- as well as "faith" and "repentance."

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
SPECIAL ELECTION APRIL 22, 1975

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. No. 3)

Repealing Sections 48a, 48b, 51e, and 51f of Article III and Sections 62 and 63 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for the revision and consolidation of provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and to provide that all general laws that have established retirement systems and optional retirement programs for public employees and officers in effect at the time of the adoption of this constitutional amendment will remain in effect, subject to the general powers of the Legislature.

Provide that the amount a participating officer or employee contributes to the employee retirement system or the teacher retirement system shall be established by the Legislature but may not be less than 6% of current compensation and providing further that the amount contributed by the state may not be less than 6 nor more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to participating persons, except that in an emergency, as determined by the Governor, the Legislature may contribute more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to persons participating in state retirement systems.

Provide that the Legislature shall provide for local retirement systems created by any city or county for its officers and employees and shall further provide for a state-wide system of benefits for officers and employees of counties or other political subdivisions of the State which may voluntarily participate, and

to further provide that a state-wide system of benefits shall be provided for officers and employees of cities which may voluntarily participate.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and providing for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 percent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. No. 6)

Amending Article III, Section 24 of the Texas Constitution to:

Provide an increase in salary for members of the Legislature from \$400 per month to \$600 per month.

Provide an increase in the per diem rate for members of the Legislature from \$12 to \$30 for each day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature.

Provide an increase in the transportation allowance for members from \$10 per mile to the rate prescribed by law for employees of the State of Texas.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment setting the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and setting a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees."

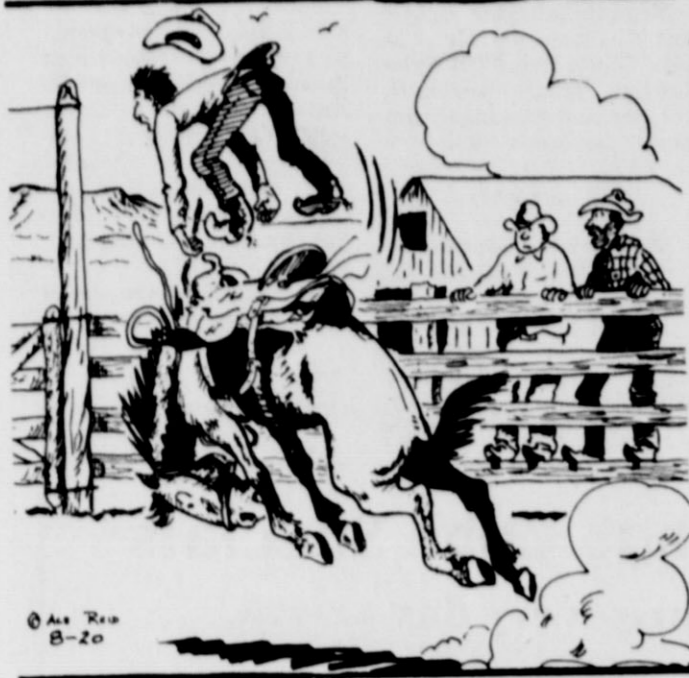

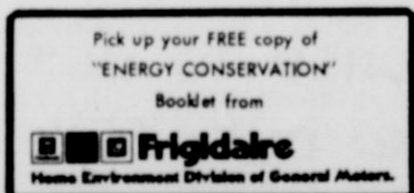

TEXAS TALK

COTTON PLANTING

Temperatures, even when considerably above freezing, severely limit the growth of cotton. This is especially true for planting time. It is generally agreed that cotton emerges faster and grows better when the seeds are not planted until the soil temperature 8 inches below the surface stays above 60 degrees Fahrenheit for at least ten days. Depending on who is running the figures, average planting time for cotton on the Plains of Texas is either May 3rd or 4th.

MAJOR GROUPS — Formal designation of the three major cotton groups is described by authorities as: Asiatic Diploid, American Diploid and American Amphidiploid. Polynesian hybrids are generally grouped with the American Amphidiploid. Diploid refers to the composition of the cotton cell. Hybrids are developed to improve staple qualities, shorten growing season and enhance drought resistance.
