County To Have Two New Doctors

Motley County soon will have two new doctors instead of only one, as previously announced.

Word has been received by the County Hospital Board that Dr. Do Danh Thy (pronounced Tweek) of Gunterville, Alabama, a recent visitor here, had made a decision to join Dr. Y-Hoang-Do (The Y is pronounced E) in practice here.

Dr. Thy and his family are expected to arrive sometime during the week end. However, Dr. Y will not arrive from Fresno, Calif., until about the 17th of the month.

Members of the hospital board and their wives are making preparations for the arrival of the two doctors, and have made arrangements to house the family of Dr. Thy in the Stanley residence formerly used as a clinic by the late Dr. J. S. Stanley, Dr. Y, who is single, will occupy the Terry residence and will be joined later by his parents and other family members.

The hospital board makes the following appeal to the public:

"We can use good, used furniture. Let us know what you have available. We will make a list and contact you when we need it. In Matador, contact Mrs. John M. Russell or Mrs. Pete Williams; in Flomot contact Mrs. Leon Cloyd, in Roaring Springs, Mrs. Chas. Long, Whiteflat, Mrs. H. R. Jameson and at Northfield, Mrs. Billy Paul Simpson.

"Also boxes are placed at local stores in each community for miscellaneous shower gifts and non-perishable foods to be given to the doctors. Other places where these items may be left are, Methodist Church Educational Building in Matador; Depot in Roaring Springs; Northfield School building and Flomot School building. They prefer that items not be wrapped.

"Check with above persons, Friday to see if we need more painters, cleaners and scrubbers.

"Later we will have a community reception in order that everyone might meet the doctors." In his letter of acceptance, Dr. Y Hoang Do wrote, "I am looking forward to serve the community to my best capability and I hope that I will become a part of the wonderful Matador in a very short time."

He is a Medical Graduate and attended the School of Medicine, Saigon University in Saigon, French and Vietnamese. He received numerous honor awards for intern work, and a scholarship which was offered by the Department of Health, Republic of Vietnam, for the best medical students, continuously from 1969 to 1974. He served at BinhDan General Hospital from June 14, 1974 to the evacuation from Vietnam.

Motley Victorious In Last Home Game

The Motley County Matadors raised their 1975 ledger to 6-3 with a 29-0 shellacking of the Whiteface Antelopes, Friday here on Burleson Field, and increased their winning streak to four games. Friday night's game was the last home game of the 1975 season and the Matadors gave the fans their money's worth.

The Matadors won the toss and received from the South end of the field. They took the kick-off and began the ballgame with good field position. However, on the third play from scrimmage the Matadors turned the ball over to the Antelopes on a fumble. This was when the defense of the Matadors proved what they were made of as they kept the Antelopes from making a 1st down, and got the ball as it went over on downs.

The Antelopes weren't the only ones who couldn't move the ball as the Matadors were forced into punt formation, and with good downfield pursuit of the punt returner managed to capture the ball as it deflected off a Whiteface player. This time the Matadors had the ball for

keeps until they hit paydirt, and that they did as Fullback Joe Campbell got loose and ran standing up into the endzone. The P. A. T. kick was attempted by Grant Johnson and with this being good the Matadors were out in front by the score 7-0. With Micky Hurt pouncing on a loose ball, the Motley defense kept the Antelopes from getting on the board. The quarter ended with the Matadors still in front. When the 2nd quarter began, the Matadors were bound and determined to add more points to the scoreboard, they began this on a 40-yard pass from Quarterback Harold Dempsey to end Micky Hurt, the P. A. T. was no good and the Matadors lengthened their lead to 13-0. Again the Motley defense proved too tough for the Antelopes to penetrate and the half ended with the Matadors again out on top, 13-0.

With the two teams coming out for the 2nd half of the ballgame the Matadors were still not satisfied and wanted to score more, as they kicked to the Antelopes they knew the Matadors meant business as Motley again forced the Antelopes into punt formation, this time it wasn't the Matadors who made the mistakes but it was a high snap to the center which gave them 2 more points to add to their total, which was now 15-0.

The Antelopes had a free kick and the Matadors made the most of it as they continued to score, this time by fullback Jerry Lee, and with the extras being made on a pass to Joe Campbell the Matadors extended their lead to 23-0. The Motley defense continued to play an excellent game as they kept the Antelopes from beginning any serious scoring drive.

The Matadors added more points as Craig Christian scored and extended the lead to 29-0. The P.A.T. was blocked, and the Matadors continued to chalk up their 4th straight victory in 7 outings since the beginning of the season.

The Matadors continued to contain the Antelopes in the final quarter and recorded their third shutout of the year. The Matadors go on the road and travel to meet the predicted North-Zone champions Sudan this Friday and round out the season on the road, and with the performance of the team this season it seems certain that they deserve all the support they can get because who knows? What a better way to round out the season with an upset, so go to Sudan and follow and support your High School football team.

The "Leader of the Year" awards went to Mrs. Boyd Long of Roaring Springs and Grady Phillips of Matador. Other leader awards were received by Ward Rattan and Mrs. John V. Stevens, 10 years, Mrs. C. M. Barton Jr., 25 years and Mrs. Elva Reed of Flomot, 35 years.

In a summary of 4-H activities in the county, Agent Pallmeyer said that there were 237 members in 10 clubs, as compared to 200 in 1974; 15 moved from the county (9 in 1974); 19 dropped out (12 in 1974) and 6 had no project or activity as compared to 13 in 1974.
