"This notice constitutes your authority to use these funds in the amount of \$100,000 granted to you under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. Signed, Walter G. Sevier, Acting Area Director."

A Matador Water District was formed in April following a public hearing to obtain citizen input concerning the community Development needs of Matador and to obtain \$100,000 Community Development Block Grant. Later a bond election carried for issuance of bonds in the amount of \$284,000, the amount required to aid in funding a new water supply source for the City, to supplement the government

grant. The grant was approved in August, but the ensuing months were required for legal procedures before clearance could be granted. These procedures included publishing a Request for Release of Funds, which was complied with, and gives a green light to the Water Board to start construction.





H. Belo Corporation, publishers of The Dallas Morning News. Those historic events affecting Texas have been traced in an article written especially for the Texas Almanac by the late R. Henderson Shuffler, editor, historian and, at the time of his death in the summer of 1975, executive director of the Institute of Texas Cultures at San Antonio

'What we call the American Revolution was simply the first stage of the revolution of the Americas," Shuffler wrote. "Texas was affected directly by the American Revolution and the course of its history for centuries to come was shaped by the outcome.

Also in the Almanac's Bicentennial section, Sam Kinch Sr., chariman of American Revolution Bicen-Commission of tennial Texas, tells of the American Bicentennial in Texas. A commission listing of Texas events during the bicentennial year is included.

The new edition also contains a special section on "Gardening in Texas" prepared by specialists of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. It is a guide for planting vegetables, fruit and nut trees and ornamentals in all sections of the state





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

County Agent Pallmeyer Says

I know that many of you already know the information in articles that appear in this column, and often you have better suggestions on how to cope with a problem that I may offer, therefore I try to limit these articles to the ones I have several questions about. Keeping this in mind, here is some information on managing winter pastures.

Wheat, oat or rye pastures are expensive to produce and require good management if they are to produce high yields and provide a good quality forage

First, grazing must be withheld until the plants are well rooted down, or the stand will be ruined, and if grazing is started before the plants are 6 to 8 inches tall, forage production can be cut in half. These plants do not grow much during the cold months of December and January, therefore stocking rates should be kept down early in the grazing season so that enough forage will be present the first part of December so that enough will be left to carry the animals through the next 60 days. The normal stocking rate until March 1st is about 1 animal to 2 acres, but with adequate fertilization and good management, this rate can be doubled. If the crop is to be grazed out, this stocking rate can be increased in March to 2 or 21/2 animals per acre.

Livestock should be removed during periods of wet weather

Always keep a supply of dry roughage and minerals available Don't overgraze during dry

or cold periods as stem terminals may be destroyed decreasing later forage and grain production. If the grain crop is to be harvested, remove animals before the grain starts to joint, as grazing after

jointing greatly reduces yields. This time can vary depending on the year, so don't set a certain date for removal, but check the growth of the plants. Normally the removal date in this area will be between March 5th and 15th.

Green pastures CAN be used to supplement the protein and energy requirements of the cow and calf by grazing only on a limited scale. This can be done by letting them graze 2 or 3 hours each day, or one day out of every 4 or 5. This system will allow grazing of large numbers on fewer acres, or even stretch available forage during bad

weather conditions. Fertilization is very important if good weather pastures are maintained. High rates of nitrogen are needed, and producers should watch their fields closely. When leaves start to vellow, or dropping spots start showing up, its time to topdress. Normally, two

pounds of nitrogen and 1 pound of phosphorus is used for each bushel of grain produced, plus 50 to 50 pounds of nitrogen for each ton of forage removed by grazing. It's too late to apply

symptoms appear, and moisture is good, top dressing may still help.

I looked at many a shrub the past summer and after finding scale, recommended the use of Malathion. This did the job on many infestations, but some of the white fuzzy insects persisted to remain on some plants. If this happened to be your problem, try adding the following. Add summer oil to the mixture at the rate of 5 tablespoons per gallon, depending on the label instructions

Three or four applications at two week intervals will be needed for effective contol. After the third application, check and see if the scale insects are still alive. This can be done by rubbing the underside of the leaf, and if a vellow, moist material is found, the scale insects are alive and additional applications will be needed. If only a white scaly material is left, control measures have been effective

Diazinon in place of Malathion also may be used.




