ROY ROGERS, veteran days a week, in an attempt to screen celebrity, is coming to Matador to film scenes for his new movie, "Macintosh and T.J.

The King of Cowboys is returning to the screen after a 21 year absence.

Excitement ran high in Matador last week when representatives of the T. Penland Productions of Fort Worth were here making arrangements to shoot several scenes for the movie.

Setting for most of the production will be the 6666 Ranch in King County. After visiting several area towns, Matador was selected for certain scenes. Places of business selected were C. R. Davis' Conoco, Matador Variety, Household Supply, Bob Stanley Pharmacy, Cowboy Boot Shop and Matador Hotel. A street scene will also be shot on Dundee Street and will feature a duplex dwelling owned by the late Mrs. U. L. Wilie, just West of the First State Bank building.

This study by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association shows also that the county's petroleum production last year resulted in the payment of \$355,000 to royalty owners.

"These figures, whether considered statewide or individually in almost 80 percent of Texas' 254 counties, emphasize the importance of a healthy petroleum industry in the nation's No. 1 energy state," said Sherman Hunt, a Dallas independent oil man

'In the face of declining production in Texas, it is significant that this increased return to royalty owners and producers came from crude oil and natural gas which is free from restrictive federal price controls. But there are at this time proposals in Congress which would place all of Texas' petroleum production under federal price controls, with predictable disastrous consequences for the industry. as well as the whole economy of the state." Hunt said

The survey also shows that the State of Texas received \$130,986 in production taxes from county wells, with \$130,423 coming from crude oil output and \$563 from natural gas production.

According to the Texas **Employment Commission**, 10 oil and gas industry employes worked in the county in 1974 and shared a payroll totalling \$78,820.



TEXAS

Snow drifts in a cotton field? That's what it looked like last year at harvest time in Califor nia. And chances are the illusion will start showing around here. Cause of the phenomona is a new and innovative method of field storage. The most talked about method is the cotton module. Module builders are best described as hydraulic tampers operating inside portable walls which form the module. This is set up on the turnrow and cotton is dumped directly from the picker baskets into the module. The machine packs as much as 12 bales on the pallet then is moved to another pallet to repeat the operation. When the packing is complete the modules are covered by a tarp and can be picked up anytime by a gin truck. Growers cited the main advantage of the system as uninterrupted harvesting. Ginners say it increased their effective capacity and solved labor scheduling problems.
