SEVERAL battles were fought in Matador during the week end when two World War II buddies were together for the first time in over 29 years.

Arriving in Matador Friday for the express purpose of visiting Charlie Meador and his family (wife, Dena and sons, Doug, Danny, James and John) were

Daniel T. Killen and his wife, Dorothy, of Arlington, Va. Danny Meador was named for Mr. Killen.

The two men were communication technicians in the 19th Bomb Group of the 20th Air Force, 314th Bomb Wing. This group received five presidential citations and was the most decorated Air Force group during the war.

"I've been looking forward to this visit for many years," Mr. Killen declared. "In spite of the war, we had great times together."

The reunion brought more great times. Mr. and Mrs. Meador and their sons took

their guests to Springs Ranch, site of the historic falls and early Indian camping ground, which has re-opened as a recreational facility south of Roaring Springs.

They took a picnic basket and spent the day Saturday. "The place is fantastic," Mr. Killen exclaimed. "Who would believe such a beautiful oasis could be so completely hidden."

On Sunday the group drove to Cal Farley's Boys Ranch at Old Tascosa, between Amarillo and Channing.

Mr. and Mrs. Killen have been contributors to the ranch for a number of years and derived great pleasure in touring the vast complex with Garland Rattan, who is School Superintendent there, and a native of Matador.

"Boothill Cemetery - now that's something else," Killen declared. It is here that early cowboys at Old Tascosa, who "died with their boots on" are buried.

Killen, a native of Pennsylvania, and Meador met in 1943 while stationed at Peterson Field, Colorado Springs, Colo. and trained together at Dalhart, Tex. and Great Bend, Kansas before being sent overseas to Guam, where they saw "Plenty of action."

Returning to the states they received their discharges, S-Sgt. Killen at Fort Knox and M-Sgt. Meador at Fort Sam Houston. Each returned to his respective homeland.

Mr. Killen works in the Government Engraving Department in Washington.

Mr. and Mrs. Killen flew to Lubbock, from Lawton, Okla., where they had visited, then drove to Matador. They left Tuesday, also by plane from Lubbock with Dallas as their destination. While here they stayed at Trail Dust Motel.

Next year the Killens just might return to Texas to see more of the country and to attend the stage production "TEXAS" in Palo Duro Canyon.

A brief but impressive Memorial Day service was held at 7 a.m. Friday at the entrance to East Mound Cemetery, by Veterans of Foreign Wars and American Legion members.

(John F. Kennedy, Inaugural Address, January 20, 1961. She then introduced Mrs. Frank Pohl, who presented Dr. Oscar Kinchen, retired history professor of Texas Tech University who reviewed for the club, his book, "The Women Who Spied for the Blue and the Grey."

In her introduction, Mrs. Pohl informed the members that Dr. Kinchen was born in West Tennessee, the sixth of eight children. At age 16 his family, now fatherless, moved to Erick, Oklahoma. He attended high school for only six or seven weeks; earned money with which to buy secondhand books and passed the examination for teaching certificates. He taught himself to read German, Greek and Latin. He entered the University of Oklahoma as a special student because he had no high school diploma. It was there he earned his bachelors degree and in 1920 his Masters. He attended Stanford and the University of Chicago, getting his doctoral degree from the University of Iowa with honors in 1934. Dr. Kinchens joined the Texas Tech faculty in 1929 and though now retired from teaching he continues to research and write.

Dr. Kinchen presented a copy of the book he reviewed, to the club. He told how he became interested in these women by researching other aspects of the Civil War. Usually the women who were spies and smugglers were from the upper level families, had deep religious convictions and received no monetary reward and it is reported that the Southern women were more devoted to the "cause."

"Women were conscious of their talents and used them in every way," he said. "They used their hoop skirts, corsets, reticules, parasols and their long hair to hide drugs, contraband and messages across the lines. They

wore men's clothing, often stealing it to masquerade in. They played parts of "simplesons," used assumed names, a cryptic language and special ink in their operations. Many times they swallowed a message if they saw they were about to be caught. Quilts were also used to smuggle dope, bolts of cloth, etc. Usually medicine and dope came from the north to the south as it just wasn't to be found in the southern area."

Dr. Kinchen related events of various well-known women spies and showed pictures of them to the group.

Mrs. J. L. Woodruff gave the Inspirational Thought using Courage as her thought, from the Bible, saying it is through the Bible we find courage.

Mrs. Harold Campbell, the newly installed president of the club, made a few announcements and told of her theme, stating it would be of a patriotic nature because of bicentennialism. Her idea was expressed in the poem, "Gospel of Trying," with the closing lines: "He who believes goes out and tries," as her goal.

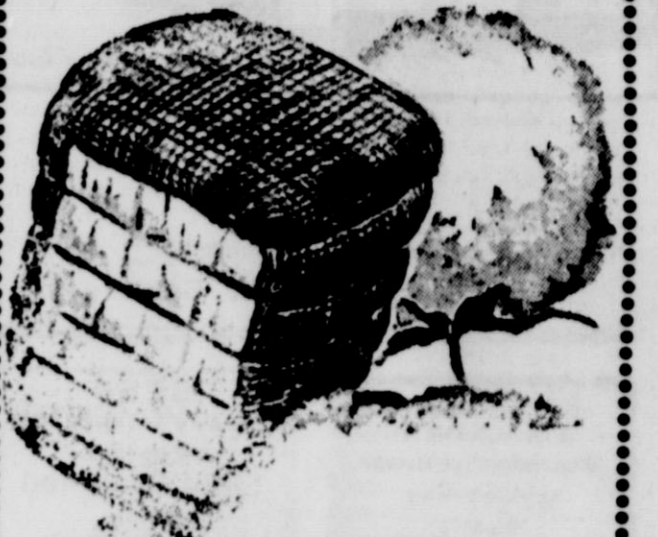

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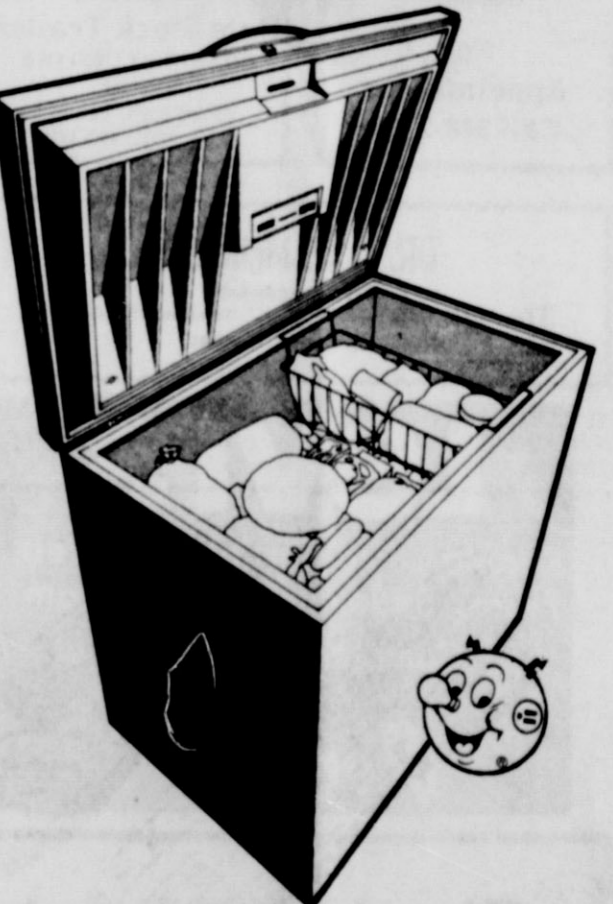

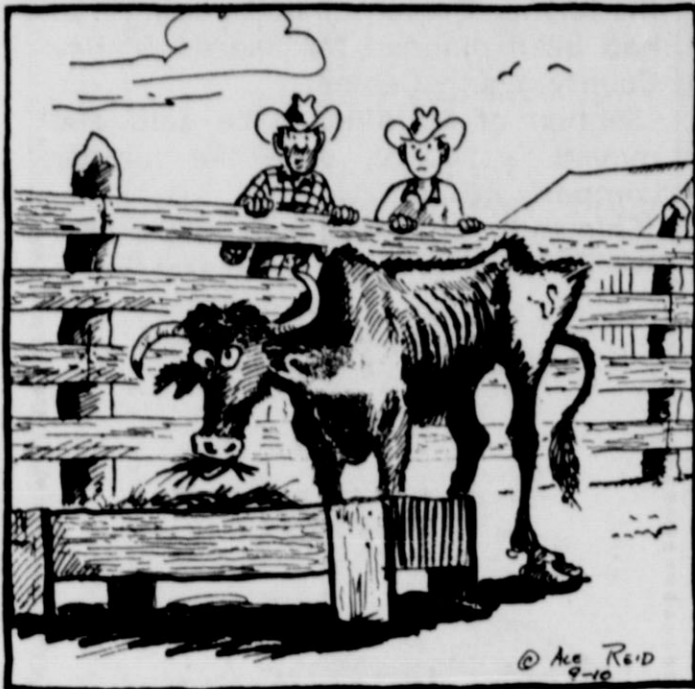

**TEXAS TALK**

Q: What causes the difference in tenderness of similar beef cuts?

A: Cooking methods are undoubtedly the most critical elements in determining the final tenderness of a meat serving. Assuming that the method of cooking is the same, there are still several variables influencing tenderness. Age of the animal at the time of slaughter is a major factor, with a noticeable decrease in tenderness at advanced maturity (animals over three years of age). Other factors will be mostly up to the individual packer. Aging and curing usually increase the tenderness of the meat as do the addition of special enzymes. Three common enzymes used in meat processing are Bromelin, Ficin and Papain. What the three have in common is the fact they are all derived from fruit... Bromelin from pineapple, Ficin from figs and Papain from Papaya.
