Matadors Slip By Paducah Team 7-0

The Motley County Matadors slipped past the Paducah Dragons by the score of 7-0 on the Dragons homefield Friday night. The win upped the Matadors record to 2-0, while the Dragons fell to 0-2.

The first quarter was uneventful for either team, as neither could manage enough momentum to get any points on the scoreboard. The second quarter was somewhat like the first except the Matadors got their

momentum going, and Jerry Lee broke loose for a 27 yard scramble which put the Matadors on top 6-0. The P.A.T. was good by Grant Johnson making the score 7-0 in favor of the Matadors. The Dragons got into scoring range late in the quarter but time ran out in the quarter before Paducah could capitalize on the good field position. The quarter ended with the Matadors still on top by the score of 7-0.

The third quarter began with both teams moving the ball well, although neither team managed to score.

The fourth quarter almost did the Matadors in, although the quarter began like the others with both teams moving the ball, with no scoring. It was the final minutes of the game when the Dragons moved the ball down to the 8 yard line of Motley, but when the defense was needed most, it came through as the Matadors held the Dragons as time ran out, making the final score 7-0. Motley County outscored their opponents by the count of 207 to 146.

The Matadors continue road action as they travel to Crosbyton Friday to battle the Chiefs. A good game is expected and a good crowd would make the chances of a victory better.

Tulia Man To Join Rolling Plains PCA

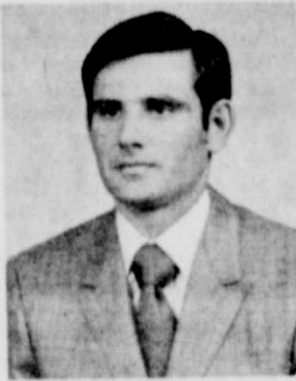
Lonnie McDonald of Tulia, Texas, has accepted employ-

SCS Field Day Announced

A public field day will be held on September 23 at the Soil Conservation Service plant materials center in Knox City, State Conservationist George C. Marks announced this week.

New grasses, forbs, legumes, and other plants under evaluation at the center will be discussed during the day, Marks said. The center serves both Texas and Oklahoma.

Guided tours will be conducted through the 92-acre tract from 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. The center is located on FM 1292, 2 miles north and 2½ miles west of Knox City. Box lunches will be on sale for those who wish to eat lunch at the center.

Grass seed growers, seed dealers, conservation district directors, research workers, sportsmen, and others interested in the search for better plants are invited to attend.

Seed or rootstock from plants that show promise for solving specific soil and water conservation problems are collected, then grown and evaluated at Knox City. The more promising ones are then grown under field conditions on farms of soil and water conservation district cooperators under a wide variety of conditions. Selections that prove superior to other strains available are then released by conservation districts to commercial seed growers. These producers then grow seed and sell it to the public.

Approximately 1,200 different grasses, forbs, legumes, and woody plants are being grown at Knox City. Grass strains proven and put into use by SCS include Selection 75 kleingrass; El Reno, Uvalde, and Vaughn sideoats grama; King Ranch bluestem; green sprangle-top; and Grenville switch-grass.

Clyde Gilbert would have completed 20 years in the office, the first of January. He did not run for re-election this year and will be succeeded by John M. (Sonny) Russell, who was elected to the office.

County Judge Forrest Campbell administered the oath of office to Mrs. Gilbert in a brief ceremony at 2 p.m. Wednesday, attended by the other members of the Commissioners Court, and county officials and employees.

Following the swearing-in ceremony, refreshments of punch, coffee and cookies were served.

Mrs. Gilbert thanked the court for the honor bestowed upon her, and in a later statement said, "Clyde's maintenance work will continue as in the past, as Carlos Clower, who has been working with him is familiar with the duties and has pledged his full support. He assured me that if I accepted this appointment he would continue with the work to the best of his ability."

Water Development Board Meetings Are Announced

The Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) will hold public forums to gain citizen input on the revisions of the Texas Water Plan currently underway by the Board and staff of the water agency. Meetings in the area are scheduled as follows: Lubbock, Sept. 21st; Amarillo, Sept. 28th; Wichita Falls, Oct. 25th; and Abilene, Oct. 27th.

Executive Director James M. Rose announces that the public is invited to make their wishes known concerning Texas's water problems, opportunities, needs and ideas for meeting the water needs of the state now and in the future.

The revised Texas Water Plan will be submitted to the Texas Legislature early in the next session, and will include revised estimates of statewide water demands and supplies for municipal, industrial and agricultural uses.

The uses of and the need for an additional funding of \$400 million for the Water

Development Fund will be discussed, and Constitutional Amendment 1 on the November 2 ballot gives Texas voters the opportunity to authorize the Legislature, by two thirds vote to increase the Development Fund. The Development Fund, a loan fund, not a grant program, is used primarily for hardship cases where the only alternative to funding of water supply and distribution projects would be for the town to raise taxes and increase water bills. The Fund is also used to purchase water supply storage space in reservoirs before they are built so that the water is available when and where needed as an area or a town experiences the expected growth.

Rose said recent critics claiming the Fund makes an annual draw from the general revenue fund is not true. Over the past 10 years several millions of dollars have been used, amounting to 25 cents per year per taxpayer.

SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 2, 1976

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

Repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, S.J.R. 49 amends Section 49-c of Article III of the Texas Constitution to provide for and authorize an additional \$400 million in Texas water development bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the members of each house of the Legislature for such water development purposes as the Legislature may prescribe.

The amendment contains a specific prohibition against the use of state funds for the development of water resources from the Mississippi River and also requires that before any single water development project may be undertaken requiring the expenditure of more than \$35 million in bond proceeds, it must be approved by resolution of the Legislature.

The amendment removes the constitutional requirement that certain revenues must be used to retire water development and water quality enhancement bonds and removes the constitutional interest rate limit on such bonds.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing an increase of \$400 million in the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued on approval of two-thirds of the legislature; amending and consolidating provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution; and repealing Sections 49-d and 49-d-1 of Article III of the Texas Constitution."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 99)

H.J.R. 99 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the aggregate principal amount of Texas water development bonds which may be issued and outstanding by the Texas Water Development Board to provide grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"A constitutional amendment to increase from \$100 million to \$200 million the amount of Texas Water Development Bonds that may be issued for water quality enhancement purposes"

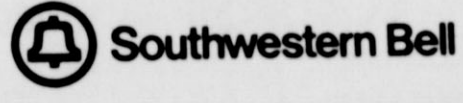
