Cemetery. Mr. Brogdon, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Brogdon of Plainview, died en route to a hospital in Tucson, where he was being conveyed by ambulance after becoming ill at his home. 

Candidates for two places on the District School Board are incumbent Bundy Hal Campbell and Charles Ren-


Candidates for three places on the County School Board are Glenn Woodruff, Wayne Hunter, and Raby Webb, all incumbents.

Entertainment, eyebanking, and city development were all part of the Lions regular Tuesday meeting at the United Methodist Church in Matador

Entertainment was provided by William F. Bennett who spoke to the Lions about his life and sang a song that illustrated his life.

"I was 33 before I began understanding deeper meanings in my life. I wanted to be recognized by people like

yourself," Bennett said. "As I came up the ladder of success there still seemed to be something missing. Then, four and one half years ago, I found that deeper meaning in

my life," he said. Bennett urged the Lions to listen to the words of the song about his life. Then he sang,

'Now I Have Everything. Mrs. Larry G. Hurst accompanied Bennett. They are from Dallas, and working in the revival this week at the Methodist Church.

Bill Leslie, of Memphis, Tex. director of the District 2-T-1 eve bank, spoke to the Lions on the importance of the eye bank program.

"It is possible that one person's eyes can help six people regain their sight," Leslie said. "Three different parts of the eye can be used in treatments.

The idea for the eye bank was conceived in 1958 at the district convention in Dalhart but did not get off the ground until 1961, Leslie said. Since 1961, 268 transplants have been made

"To me, this is one of the greatest things the Lions can do-helping others to regain their eyesight," Leslie said. "I appreciated Mr. Bennett's song because eyebanking is pretty closely akin to the Biblical teaching of

One of the major projects of Lions everywhere has been sight conservation and now sight restoration also, Leslie

All Lions Clubs in District

2-T-1 help the eye bank by contributing two dollars for every member in their club. The district eye bank has a budget of \$6-\$7 thousand. One person is employed to work with the program on a

full-time basis. Leslie went on to stress the importance of signing eye donor cards. He said it is highly important that someone knows that you want to donate your eyes.

After your death your remains belong to the next of kin, Leslie said. Eyes cannot be removed unless next of kin

If an eye donor does die, the most important thing is to get permission from the next of kin to remove the eyes. Thenyou should call the district

Leslie. In closing, Leslie urged Lions to become interested in the eye bank program. "I'd like to see all Lions in this district know enough about

the program to be able to explain it to others. **Housing Grant Possible** The possibility of Matador

getting a \$100,000 grant under the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 was the main point of the presentation by Mike Lumsden, representative of the South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG).

Of the 15 applications from this area for grants under the Act, only Matador and Plainview have been invited to turn in a full application to the Department of Housing and Urban Development, Lumsden said.

Lumsden explained that SPAG was a voluntary association of counties and cities which seeks to take advantage of government programs to help cities and counties with various needs. "If full application for the grant is made, chances are good that Matador will get the \$100,000 grant," Lumsden said

TEXAS

Q: As far as feed and feed grains are concerned, what are the differences between concentrates and roughages?

A: Fiber content and the amount of nutrient which is digestible by the animal are the basic criteria for separating these classes.

CONCENTRATES—are feeds generally high in nutrients and low in fiber content. Virtually all grains are in this class. as well as several by-products including linseed meal, cottonseed meal, hominy feed and wheat bran. Many of the concentrates have a high protein content, although this is not a prerequisite of the class.

ROUGHAGES-are high in fiber and low in nutrients. Feeds other than the grains are generally classed as roughage. These include: straw. silage. hay and a variety of coarse byproducts of the plants utilized in feed grain production.
