As a boy I used to follow the winding wagon road home from school, speculating on the fate that might be implied by fresh automobile tracks in the dirt. Family stories renewed a dream that my mother would inherit vast wealth from her German ancestor who once owned much of New York City. The car tracks were never made by a lawyer asking my mother to sign legal documents to receive her share of the money. Usually they were left by a medicine salesman, a candidate or a lost traveler. One time, however, my mother received a letter from a lawyer, a relative interested in the estate, who asked her for family records. A few days later I went to town and found that a rumor had been released to the effect that my mother had inherited a million dollars. People I did not know, spoke to me. After a few friends had told me of the report, I was ready to believe it myself. The world glowed with a strange radiance and the 25-cent coin in my patched pocket multiplied itself with the magic of dreams. During the eventful afternoon an enterprising automobile dealer who also sold buggies, asked me to ride in a new Saxon roadster. After spending 10 cents of my actual wealth for admission to a picture show, I rode home horseback alone under the stars, as rich as any boy can ever be. I awoke my mother and told her about the rumor. She told me to put out the light and go to bed. I never heard the rumor again and the estate never materialized. Days on end the earthen ruts showed only traces of wagon and buggy tires.

Darting through the skies like bridled meteors, three planes whined their strange syncopation to the world below; fireflies in the marshes of the future's uncertainty.

Every man to his own preferences, but to me smoking a filter-tip cigarette leaves something to be desired, like kissing a woman through a veil.

Life's autumn winds subject us to a fury, and changing atmosphere that tests our grasp on reality. We cling to that which is steadfast like the grape tendril fastened to an arbor post.

Before moving to Dallas in 1973, Waybourn was director of sales for Community Advertising, Inc., of Fort Worth, a national newspaper syndicate, and is a former contributing editor of Southwest Business Scene, a bi-monthly business publication for the Dallas-Fort Worth area.

Funeral services for A.B. McCaghren, 92, were held at 3 p.m. Friday in the First United Methodist Church. Officiating were the pastor, Rev. Lloyd Hearn, Rev. Leonard Sims, pastor of the First Baptist Church, and a grandson-in-law, Rev. Darwin Scott, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Palestine, Texas, who delivered the memorial message.

Mr. McCaghren passed away about 2:30 p.m. Wednesday, May 12 at Richard's Memorial Hospital in Paducah after a lingering illness. He had been a frequent patient in the hospital the past several months.

Addison Burditt McCaghren was born September 26, 1883 in Hood County, Texas. When he was a year old his parents moved to Comanche County. He was married at Gorman, Eastland County, March 20, 1907 to Miss French White. They came to Motley County in 1915 to make their home and Mr. McCaghren engaged in farming. After his wife passed away August 24, 1923, he continued to reside here with their two children, Bill and Hazel. Later, he was associated with his son in the wholesale gasoline business.

On March 20, 1927 he was married to Miss Annie Renfro. The ceremony was performed at Whiteflat by the late Rev. R. L. Jameson, long-time Matador Methodist minister in the county.

Mr. and Mrs. McCaghren lived at Quitaque for five years, from 1935 until 1940, when they moved back to Matador.

"Daddy Mack," as he was affectionately called by his family, was known by his many friends for his Irish wit. Friends who visited with him through the years remembered many humorous incidents both in the association, and stories that he would tell.

Despite his years, he had remained mentally alert and drove his car to town until about six months ago. He could still read without the aid of glasses. He was a member of the Methodist Church.

He is survived by his wife, one son, W. F. (Bill) McCaghren of Matador; one daughter, Mrs. Hazle Godfrey of Houston; two sisters, Mrs. C. G. Willie and Miss Dez McCaghren, both of Dallas; four grandchildren, W. F. McCaghren Jr., of Amarillo, Mrs. Darwin Scott of Palestine, Tex., John Cotterell and Mrs. Kenny Weatherly, both of Houston.

In 1936 they moved to Becton where Mr. Reeves taught for two years, and in 1937 they moved to the family home near Matador, where he took over the farming and ranching business. In 1953, he ran for State Representative of the 88th district, was elected and served two terms. During the year the Legislature wasn't in session, he taught in the Idalou schools, and also one year in Floydada. In 1953, while at Idalou, Mrs. Reeves entered Texas Tech, as Pat was a freshman there, and receive her degree.

Mr. and Mrs. Reeves both taught in the Matador school system for two years, 1958-1960, when he was elected Motley County Judge and served two terms of four years each, while his wife continued to teach in the Matador school system. In 1967 he went back to Floydada and taught science in Junior High, and in 1968 Mrs. Reeves joined him in a teaching position at Floydada. They retired there in 1972. In the meantime they had sold the old home in 1971 and moved to Plainview.

No formal anniversary observance is planned, as Mr. Reeves has been ill for several months.

## TWENTY-FOUR SENIORS TO RECEIVE DIPLOMAS

"The small village of Roaring Springs sprang up along the South Pease River. The little pioneers were: Pennie Marshall, Carla Meredith, Hubert Marvel and Rebecca Palmer (those starting together and graduating) and Teresa Adcock, Christi Carpenter, Karen Daniels, Juan Pena, Julie Valettez, Charles Brown, Marceline Ramirez, Juanita Costonoda, George Valdez, Don Dillard, Dian Mendoyas, Nancy Ramirez and Bobby White.

"The Township of Matador grew near the Middle Pease River. The little chaps were: (graduates who started together) Tony Rose, Ben Charles Grundy, Darrell Moore, Charlotte Johnson, Betty Sue Markham, Kelly Nimmo and Ronda Williams, and Eddy Cook, Donnie Gwinn, Kelly Nichols, Patty Fullingim, Donna Whitefield, Richard Thomas, Steve Smith, Paul Price, Jimmy Stockton and Patty Zarate.

Christene continued the narration: "These people grew in stature and intelligence for eight years and were rewarded by the Mother Country, with 8th grade graduation. Those receiving recognition were:

At this point Stefanie took up the narration. "Our population shrunk until merging seemed appropriate, and the consolidation of all three smaller settlements took place and became Motley County School. Upon consolidation of our three schools, we strived to better ourselves by learning reading, writing and arithmetic.

"We made history pages of our school review through freshmen parties, dress codes and school attendance - or lack of it. "Today's athlete is better than ever before," he asserted. "The quality of performance is better and conditions are better. Many great stars of today will be forgotten, because others will be taking their

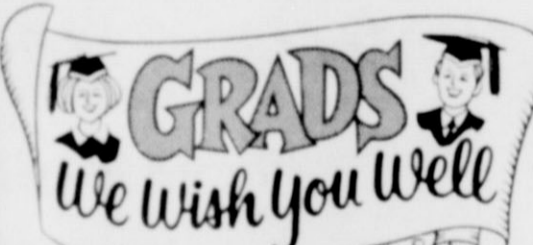
places... records are being broken as today's athletes are performing phenomenal facts and setting goals for the future."

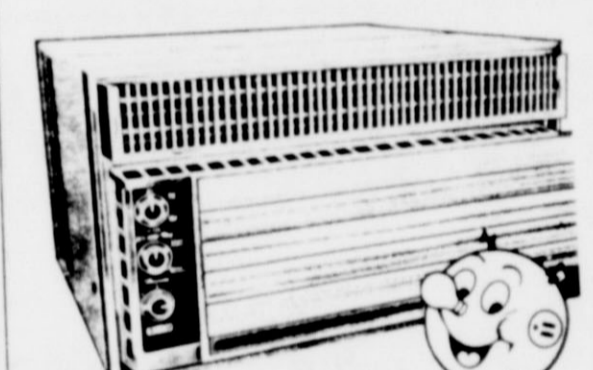

### County Agent Pallmeyer Says

Mosquito season has arrived, therefore horse owners should take precautions to prevent "sleeping sickness."

Three kinds of "sleeping sickness" have been identified. Eastern and Western which are the most common and Venezuelan.

As VEE (Venezuelan equine encephalitis) hasn't been found in Texas since 1971, vaccination against this disease has declined, but as little is known of the hosts of this virus, it could become a problem again. It takes money, but the only safe way is to vaccinate all horses against all strains.

Five years ago, cotton farmers had only two PPI (preplant incorporated) herbicides, Treflan and Planavin, and since then, Planavin has been withdrawn from the market, being replaced by Amex 820, Basalin, Cobex, Tolban and Prowl. All of these belong to the same chemical family as Treflan and require incorporation and control about the same annual weeds and grasses. With the exception of Amex, all have performed satisfactorily on the major soil groups of the High Plains, with Amex failing to provide satisfactory weed control on the loam and clay loam soils when used according to recommendations.

Even though these chemicals are related, they are different. The user should read the label and follow instructions to insure against undue cost and to provide optimum control.

The persistence of the herbicides also vary. Treflan is classified as a long residual chemical and Tolban has a medium-long residual. Amex, Basalin and Prowl are medium residual chemicals, but will not persist beyond the cropping season in which they are applied. Cobex is the shortest residual, but will also degrade before the cropping season is over.

The effectiveness of these herbicides is somewhat dependent on several application factors including spray coverage and proper incorporation. With the conventional nozzles used in spraying these chemicals, the spray solution is broken down into small droplets. If

windy conditions exist at the time of application, the small droplets will tend to drift and miss the intended target area. Drift reducing agents such as Target and Malcol can be added to the solution to eliminate the smaller droplets (mist), thereby reducing drift losses. Also a new type nozzle, "Raindrop" breaks the spray solution up into relatively large, uniform droplets which are more apt to hit the target area even in relatively high winds.

Time and uniformity of herbicide incorporation are also important as the preplant incorporation herbicides tend to volatilize and degrade rapidly if left exposed on the soil surface.

To prevent these losses, incorporate within 4 to 8 hours after application. To insure good weed control, the herbicide must be uniformly distributed in the soil, and if soils are cloddy or too wet during incorporation, weed control will be spotted. This year several are using spring tooth harrows for incorporation, hoping to help control wind erosion. Information received from other areas indicate that to date this method of incorporation has not been too successful as incorporation has not been uniform. Observations this year should help to provide guidelines for future years. It could come down to which do you want, weed control and soil erosion, or less weed control and less erosion!

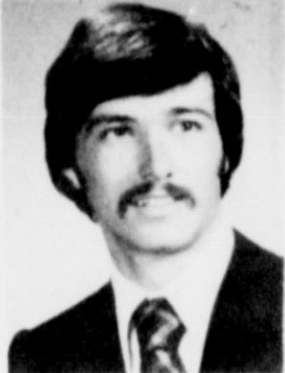
