Motley Dominates Crosbyton Chiefs For Third Victory

The Motley County Matadors blasted the Crosbyton Chiefs by the score of 19-8, upsetting the Chiefs Homecoming Friday night and raising its season record to 3-0.

The Matadors dominated the Class A Chiefs by allowing them only 6 first downs and 132 yards total rushing. But, the Matadors were explosive in nearly every aspect of the game where they totaled 285 yards

rushing and 15 first downs. The Matadors completed 2 of 3 passes for 42 yards.

Motley began the rout when, with 4:10 left in the first quarter, Pat Smith got loose and went up the middle for a 65 yard run. The P.A.T. kick by Grant Johnson failed making the score 6-0.

In the second period Jerry Lee scored on a 2-yard plunge with 9:48 remaining in the half. The P.A.T. kick was good by Johnson. Moments later Lee took a 13 yard pass from Quarterback Harold Dempsey to increase the Motley lead to 19.

The home crowd finally got some excitement when in the third quarter tailback Donald Ray Harris scampered 35 yards for the touchdown, tailback Kelly Ferree ran the ball in for 2 points to finish the nights scoring. The Chiefs fell to 0-3 with the loss.

Motley County, the South Plains number one Class B team begins district action this Friday night when they host the Nazareth Swifts. With the fantastic team we have, it seems natural that we have a fantastic crowd also to held the Matadors chalk up another victory on their way to a playoff berth.

WHEREAS, cystic fibrosis, the most serious lung-damaging disease, is the number one genetic killer of children and occurs once in approximately every fifteen hundred births, and

WHEREAS, at this time there is no control or cure despite advances in treatment for this inherited lung disease, and WHEREAS, the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation is supporting research to find a control for cystic fibrosis and improved care for all children with lung-damaging diseases, and WHEREAS, the week of Sept. 27- Oct. 4 has been designated as the Breath of Life Week in the City of Matador to enlist public support in the fight against cystic fibrosis and other serious lung diseases in children.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED THAT I, Kirby Campbell, acting under and by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and Laws of this City hereby proclaim the week and urge the citizens of our community to join with the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation in its humanitarian task.

Assistance Urged For Wheat Farmers

Washington, D.C. (Special) - Congressman Jack Hightower today sent a letter to President Ford urging him to

provide immediate assistance for the nation's wheat farmers.

Seventeen Congressmen from wheat-producing states, including House Agriculture Committee Chairman George Mahon of Lubbock, joined Hightower in this appeal.

Hightower urged the President to direct Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz to adjust the wheat loan level to at least \$2.50 a bushel, which was the level recommended in the Emergency Farm Act of 1975. President Ford vetoed the bill.

"Considering the effect of inflation since the Congress passed the bill on March 21 of last year, the \$2.50 figure is conservative," Hightower said, "but it will give the President an opportunity to provide immediate relief to farmers and provide some insurance to the banks that finance their operations."

The National Association of Wheat Growers told Hightower that only this week the President had turned down the association's request that he adjust the loan level to three dollars.

"I believe his rejection of the Wheat Growers' request reveals the President's lack of understanding about the very real problems confronting grain producers," the Congressman said. "The need is imperative. The President has the authority to do something about it, and those of us who signed the letter hope that he will exercise that authority."
