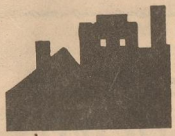

Motley County To Benefit From Jayton-Girard ISD Net Gain \$564,923

NOTE: The following article was taken from the *Texas Spur*.

When the Jayton-Girard Independent School District school board met on October 14, the set a tax rate of \$1.34 per \$100 value. The tax rate had to be set before plans could be finalized to purchase Weighted Average Daily Attendance (WADA) credits from the state or from area school districts. This action is being taken in response to Senate Bill 7, which requires all school districts with property value in excess of \$280,000 per weighted student to give away property value or keep the property value and give away excess tax revenue from that property value. The Jayton-Girard ISD could have sent all the excess tax revenue to the state, and the state would decide how and where the money would be spent, but the Jayton School Board decided to add Option 4 to the September 7 ballot which allowed them offer the excess tax revenue

to area schools that had a property value of less than \$280,000 per WADA. It was the feeling of the Board that they would rather see the students of our area benefit from the windfall rather than send all the money to Austin and now know what students, if any, would benefit from the money.

During the past month or so, several decisions have been made that have affected the amount of WADA Jayton can or will buy from any one school district.

One of those decisions resulted in increasing the number of school districts that Jayton has offered to buy WADA from. That number has been expanded to nine. Those school districts are listed below. The combined number of WADA these districts have to sell is 2,713. Jayton can only purchase 1,307.

Matadors Out Run The Greyhounds For 38-0 Win

The Motley County Matadors steam-rolled yet another District opponent Friday night with a 38-0 victory over Knox City. This win and Spur's loss to Munday, leaves Motley County and Munday along at the top of the district race.

The Matadors opened the scoring for the night on a 24 yard touchdown run by Shane Taylor. Frankie Ortiz ran in the two point conversion. Brandon Blanch scored the next Matador TD from 2 yards out and Ortiz once again carried in the two point conversion. The final TD in the first half was an 8 yard run by Taylor to bring the score to Motley County, 22 and Knox City, 0.

The second half of play proved to be more of the same with Motley County continuing its tough style of defense and wide open offense. Taylor scored his third touchdown of the night on a one yard run. Ortiz completed the two point conversion on a pass to Kevin Keltz. The Matadors last score of the game was a 29 yard run by Ortiz with Jarrod Brooks carrying in the two point conversion. The final score, Motley County - 38, Knox City - 0.

The victory was a total team effort with every Matador participating. The

offensive line of Jeremy Jones, Cody Barclay, Dustin Davis, Chad Graves,

Jeromy Jameson, Bobby Barton, and Crawford Mason continued to control the line of scrimmage allowing the Matadors to rush for 442 total yards and picked up 16 first downs. Taylor carried the ball for 177 yards, Ortiz ran for 112 yards and Blanch carried for 85 yards. The Matador Defense once again held its opponent scoreless. In three district games this defense has allowed only 7 points. Knox City was held to 147 total yards. Kevin Keltz again played the thief, keeping his interception string alive, with 3 in 3 games.

The Matadors face Spur in Spur, Friday night, October 29th. Make plans to be there to see the Matadors clinch a playoff berth.

Deadline Nears For SBA Disaster Loan Assistance

Businesses in Childress, Cottle, Dickens, Foard, Hall, Hardeman, King and Motley Counties have until November 10, 1993 to file applications for low-interest disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA). The SBA's Economic Injury Disaster Loans are available for businesses dependent on farmers and ranchers sustaining crop losses from drought which occurred August 1 through November 10, 1992. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible for these SBA loans. However, nurseries that

are victims of drought disasters can apply. Applications and further information can be obtained by calling the SBA, toll-free at 1-800-366-6303, or TDD 817-267-4688 for the hearing impaired.

These loans are intended to assist businesses in offsetting working capital losses which they suffered as a result of the drought reducing the crop income of the area farmers and ranchers. Small businesses claiming to have been physically injured by the drought are not eligible.

The total number of attendance credits that Jayton has offered to purchase from area school districts is 1,305. Jayton will send \$7,513,050 to the nine schools. That leaves two (2) attendance credits that Jayton will purchase from the Texas Education Agency at \$5,758 per attendance credit or a total of \$11,516.

The nine school districts will have their state aid reduced by an amount equal to their cost per weighted students, therefore, they will realize a windfall of the

difference between their cost per student and the \$5,758 per student that Jayton will give them. The total combined windfall, after state aid reduction, of the nine school districts will be \$3,488,094. Each school district was required to report to the Texas Education Agency how they planned to spend the extra money to benefit the students of their school district. The schools will receive their check from Jayton of February 14, 1994.

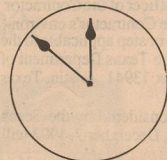
McCown thanked the Matador Club for all he support through the years and challenged them to grow.

TRIM DIETS WITH GRAIN FOODS
Carbohydrates Help
Cut Back On Fat

Forget fasting or expensive weight-loss schemes to shed pounds, and remain trim while enjoying oriental noodles, dinner rolls, pasta and bagels.

Nutritionists and federal dietary guidelines suggest eating more bread and grain foods to achieve lower-fat, healthy diets. But "lower fat" doesn't have to mean eating skimpy portions or giving up everything you like. It simply means eating smart, and the first step to smart eating is adding more bread and grain foods to your diet.

It's only a half-baked truth that bread is fattening. Breads and other grain-based foods not only satisfy hunger, but are also high in fiber and complex carbohydrates. Complex carbohydrates are essential to healthy diets because they provide the kind of energy needed to work and play.

Another benefit of eating more carbohydrates like those found in grain foods is reducing total amounts of fat consumed. When complex carbohydrates replace high-fat, high-calorie foods, they help control weight because they contain less than half the calories of fat. This makes a big difference in addition to the fact that calories from carbohydrates are less likely to turn into body fat than calories from fat.

When counting calories, count on carbohydrates to satisfy hunger. For example, the mayo on a burger usually has as many calories as the entire bun. Two buns could be eaten for the same calories by skipping the mayo.

Several other combinations of low-fat toppings, spreads and seasonings also are available. Try these delicious low-fat ideas:

- Spread on jams and fruit purees.
- Go light with butter, margarine and mayo.
- Try in plain.
- Toast it.
- Warm it up in the microwave.

On or before Monday, November 15, 1993, the City of Roaring Springs will request the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs to release Federal funds under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended, to be used for the following project:

Project: City Sewer System Improvements

Purpose: Provide for installation of new gravity and pressure sewer lines to seven first time customers, replacement of existing sewer lines that were improperly installed and are causing maintenance problems, reshaping and regrading of existing wastewater treatment plant berm tops, and construction of new sludge drying beds.

Location: City of Roaring Springs, Motley County, Texas
Contract Number: 701060
Estimated Cost of Project: \$174,844.00

FINDING OF NO SIGNIFICANT IMPACT

It has been determined that such a request for release of funds will not constitute an action significantly affecting the quality of the human environment and accordingly the City of Roaring Springs has decided not to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

The reasons for such decision not to prepare such Statement are as follows:

1. There will be no negative impacts on the environment as result of this activity undertaken with TCDP funds.
2. Some increase in noise, dust, or other nuisance levels may occur during construction; however, such disturbances will be temporary and will cease upon completion of the activities which cause them.
3. None of the activities to be undertaken will affect any known local, state or national historic, architectural, or archaeological resource presently listed, or potentially eligible for listing, in the national register or historical places or in any state or local registry.
4. No effect is expected on protected or endangered wildlife or vegetation.

This Environmental Review Record is on file and is available for public examination and copying, upon request, at City Hall, 209 Broadway, Roaring Springs, between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 12:00 noon and 1:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.

PUBLIC COMMENTS ON FINDING

All interested agencies, groups, and persons disagreeing with this decision are invited to submit written comments for consideration by the City of Roaring Springs to the office of the Mayor on or before Friday, November 12, 1993. All such comments so received will be considered, and the City of Roaring Springs will not request the release of Federal Funds or take any administrative action on this project prior to the date specified in the preceding sentence.

RELEASE OF FUNDS

The City of Roaring Springs will undertake the project described above with the Texas Community Development Program funds from the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended. The City of Roaring Springs is certifying to the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs that the City of Roaring Springs and Joe Thacker in his official capacity as Mayor, consent to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental assessments, decision making, and action; and that those responsibilities have been satisfied. The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval, the City of Roaring Springs may use the Texas Community Development Program funds, and the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs will have satisfied its responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 and 24 CFR Part 58.

OBJECTIONS TO STATE RELEASE OF FUNDS

The Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs will accept an objection to its approval of the release of funds and acceptance of the certification only if it is on one of the following bases: (a) that the certification was not in face executed by the chief executive officer or other certifying officer of the Contractor approved by the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs; or (b) that the Contractor's environmental review record for the project indicates omission of a required decision, finding, or step applicable to the project in the environmental review process (24 CFR 58), and may be addressed to the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs, Texas Community Development Program, P.O. Box 13941, Austin, Texas 78711-3941.

Objections to the release of funds on bases other than those stated will not be considered by the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs. No objection received after Tuesday, December 7, 1993 will be considered by the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs.
