The Motley County Commissioners Court met Monday, July 12 at 9:30 a.m. Judge Laverna Price called Court to order asking Commissioner Don Hughes to give the invocation. Minutes were approved with one correction, bills were read and approved, and the following reports were read, Treasurer, Sheriff, and Tax Collector. The J.P. report was \$5,100 collected in fines with \$2,815 for the County Precinct 1, Place 1, Place 2 collected none. There was no Library report. Other items on the agenda are as follows:

## Local Teenagers Participate In Rural Electric Youth Tour

Lacey Parks of Roaring Springs, Daniel Alexander of Matador, and Amanda Ogden of Floydada were among the 78 young people from across Texas and New Mexico who journeyed to the nation's Capitol recently for a first-hand glimpse of the political process. The three area teenagers participated in the 1993 Rural Electric Youth Tour sponsored by the rural electric cooperatives of Texas and coordinated by their statewide association, Texas Electric Cooperatives, Inc. Lacey and Daniel earned expense-paid trips when they were named winners of the 29th annual Government-in-Action Youth Tour Contest sponsored by Light-house Electric Cooperative, Inc. Amanda was privately sponsored on the trip. During the past 29 years, Lighthouse Electric Cooperative has sponsored 60 young people from this area on the tour. The idea of sending young people to Washington to see their government in action was originated by the late President Lyndon Johnson in the early 1950's, when as a senator, he proposed selecting outstanding students and offering them the opportunity to visit Washington, D.C. to learn first hand how the government operates.

## Citizens Urged To Write Congressman In Effort To Save Landfill

have applied only to towns that generate little trash and have scant rainfall. But the EPA was ordered in May by a District of Columbia federal judge to impose groundwater monitoring mandates on all municipal solid waste landfills - thereby sparking concern among Texas officials. As many as 150 Texas towns, mainly in West Texas, will be affected by the ruling unless EPA can craft new regulations that meet the judge's guidelines without imposing expensive new mandates on low-income, rural areas. Congressmen Bill Sarpalius and Senators Phil Gramm and Kay Bailey Hutchison are working to try and keep the exemption. This will help Matador keep their landfill. Citizens are encouraged to write or call Congressman Sarpalius or one of the Senators and let them know you are for the exemption and encourage their efforts.

The Matador City Council met July 8 at 7:30 a.m. with all members present. After the minutes were read one correction was made, then approved. In reading the bills it was noted that the contract for mowing saved the City approximately \$500 from last year. Council wanted to check into the engineer bill of \$4,941.49 from Hilly, Oller and Todd, Inc. of Lubbock for the work at the wastewater plant. This bill was pulled and bills were approved. Council considered buying lots adjoining City well property in block 52 from Josephine Hamilton. It was approved to offer \$25 per lot. Council discussed and elected to run an article in the newspaper to ask citizens of Matador to send letters to the Con-

gressman requesting the arid exemption be continued as originally proposed by EPA so Matador can continue to have a landfill, and not close the existing one on October 1. Council elected to paint the new motorgrader yellow. Council discussed what action to take to get the City pickup repaired that was in an accident with a person with an invalid insurance card. They elected to pursue the case. A report on the progress of the extra pond at wastewater plant was given. Design has been made and ready to send to Austin to be approved before it can be completed. Meeting adjourned.

## Single Family Housing Loans Available

Rural Housing Loans for very-low and low income applicants are available through County Offices of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), Spur, FmHA County Supervisor, said today. Home ownership loans may be used to buy, build, improve, repair, rural homes and to provide adequate water and waste disposal systems. Homes may be built on individual tracts or in subdivisions. Funds may also be used to modernize homes - add improvements such as bathrooms, central heating, modern kitchens and other improvements. Borrowers may buy an existing house and lot or buy a site on which to build a home. Loans may be made for up to 100 percent of the appraised value of the site and the new home. Interest rates for this type of loan are presently 7.75 percent with 33 year terms. Monthly payments are subsidized with the amount of the payment dependent on the borrower's annual income. Homes will be modest in size, design, and cost but adequate to meet the family's needs. New homes average about 1,050 square feet of living area. In addition, Farmers Home Admini-

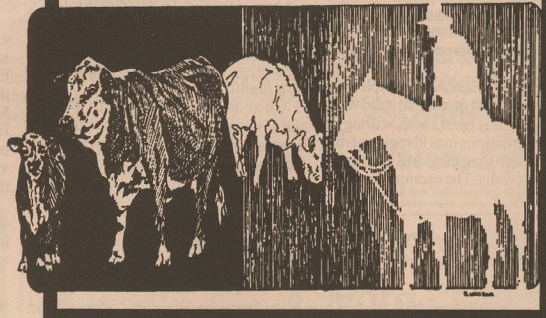

**MAYBE IT WILL GO AWAY!**  
No one likes unpleasant things. It's a natural tendency to avoid them. In many cases, that's probably a good tactic. However, there are times when unpleasant things need to be faced head-on because they will not go away and may even get worse.

Facing things head-on may involve letting someone talk about what is eating them. You may have a family member that has some hurt feelings that if kept held in, will hurt worse. You may not like to hear what they have to say. You may feel like "maybe it will go away, if we just

don't talk about it."  
Try to imagine a family sitting at the dinner table, eating a good meal. Everyone is busy passing the food, smiling and visiting. But there is a big horse sitting in the middle of the table. No one says a thing about the horse even though it drastically affects the family's dinner.

Some families are that way about problems. The problem is obviously affecting the family but it's not dealt with so it gets worse. Often a person has to swallow hard and deal with some of our "horses" because they usually hang around and keep growing.

# Health News

## WALKING TO IMPROVE HEALTH

Amid the numerous reports about the benefits of exercise, experts agree on the positive impact of the simplest of activities - walking. The new message: walking at any pace can improve health, and walking quickly can provide as much fitness as jogging. With the weather turning warmer, now is the perfect time to begin a walking regimen.

"Walking is just about the perfect exercise. It uses almost all of the body's 206 bones and 660 muscles," said Cheryl Benoit, wellness coordinator at Methodist Hospital's LifeStyle Centre. "Walking at any pace can provide some benefits, but to achieve optimal fitness levels, have more energy, and burn off significantly more calories, follow the general guidelines set by the American College of Sports Medicine (ACSM)."

To achieve fitness, the ACSM recommends exercising - including walking - at a brisk pace for 20 to 60 minutes, three to five times per week, at a heart rate of 60 to 80 percent of your predicted maximum

rate. (BE sure to check with your physician first).

If you decide to pace off a new physique by walking, watch the clock and listen to your body, Benoit advises. Distance is irrelevant. What is important is the amount of time spent moving and the intensity of your stride.

"Walk at a pace that elevates your heartbeat, and do it regularly," said Benoit. "Begin each walk with 5 to 10 minutes of simple warm-up exercises and stretches and follow the walk with a similar cool-down period of 10 to 15 minutes."

Whether walking for health or fitness, keep a few tips in mind:

- \* Wear shoes with good arch and lateral heel support;
- \* Wear a reflective vest if you walk at night;
- \* When on a road, walk against traffic; and
- \* Don't wear earphones (you won't be able to hear traffic).

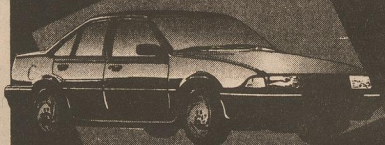

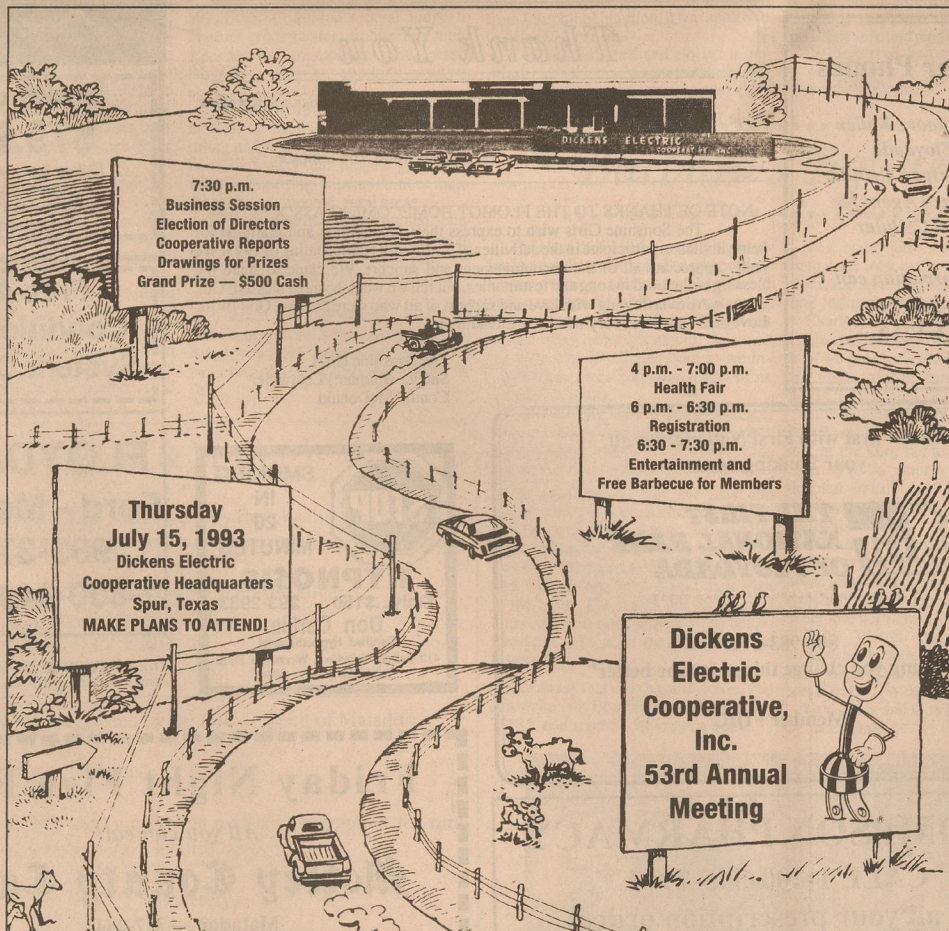

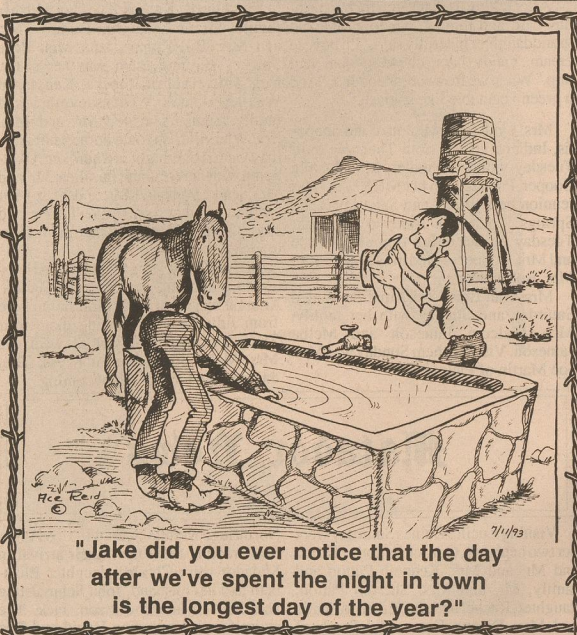
