Final rites for Rev. W. B. Vaughn, 87, today at 3 p.m. in the First Methodist Church, will pay tribute to one of the community's most beloved personalities. Officiating will be the pastor, Rev. John Fitzgerald, Dr. Wayne Cook, Chaplain of Methodist Hospital, Lubbock, and Dr. Howard Crawford, also of Lubbock.

Interment will be in East Mound Cemetery. Seigler Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements.

Rev. Vaughn, retired Methodist minister who had been a resident of Matador since 1938, died early Tuesday morning in Richard's Memorial Hospital, Paducah. He had been a patient there 14 days, but had suffered an extended illness.

He is survived by three sons, George of Owensville, Mo., Marvin of Matador, and Wayne of Big Spring; seven grandchildren, 5 great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild.

Minister Sixty-Four Years

Born August 7, 1881 at Collinsville, in Grayson County, Texas, Walter Baskin Vaughn had been a Methodist minister since 1905 when he was licensed to preach.

County Soaked

GENERAL RAINS have relieved the moisture needs in Motley County and West Texas, in a system that started last Friday and continued here through Tuesday morning.

Bob Stanley's rain gauge registered a total of 2.58 inches over the period, with 1.20 inches falling Tuesday morning within the period of one hour.

Reports from all areas of the county and trade territory indicate heavy moisture. Some parts of the Roaring Springs area report four inches, as do some areas of Flomot. Northfield has reported good rains.

The massive moisture system brought rains to a large part of the Southwest United States, accompanied in many areas by hail, tornadoes and almost continuous storm alerts.

A large part of Eastern New Mexico received abundant moisture and a share of the severe storms. Damage, however, was reported moderate to light.

The series of storms here did not result in any reported damage, and no hail was observed.

Flooding in the Afton area interrupted school activities Tuesday, according to some reports received here.

Bank Will Receive BCRIA Memberships

MUCH TIME and gasoline can be consumed in traveling the more than one thousand square miles of Motley County in securing memberships to the Brush Control and Range Improvement Association.

Dave Birnie of Matador, BCRIA Chairman for Motley County has been doing the driving and the results have not been rewarding.

Driving 20 or 30 miles to see a rancher or farmer and finding that he is in Matador or anywhere from 50 to 1000 miles away makes the work futile.

A new plan has been devised. The First State Bank in Matador will receive contributions (income tax deductible) to BCRIA. The organization is attempting to recruit 100% membership of Motley County landowners who will pay 1c per acre for five years to finance a stepped-up research for a more effective campaign against brush (mesquite) and improvement of rangelands.

Checks may be left at the First State Bank while the landowner is doing business and without inconvenience.

Contributions also can be mailed directly to the BCRIA State Chairman John Matthews, P. O. Box 176, Abilene, Texas 79664. Checks should be made payable to the association.

Birnie said the BCRIA is non-profit organization and is not associated with any university or company. A board of directors with 18 members, selected to represent different areas of the state, are directing the activities.

Industrial groups and foundations are also being asked to contribute to the association, he added. Funds will support research and education projects on brush control and range improvement. Certain funds may be used to match legislative appropriations or industrial grants to launch an overall campaign against brush infestations.

Highlights and Sidelights FROM YOUR STATE CAPITAL

AUSTIN — Strong determination to hold out a two-year spending bill with new taxes now was voiced by Gov. Preston Smith after a week of conferences on the subject.

Smith took the line that he and legislators have a commitment for teacher pay raises, and that it cannot be done without a tax bill to raise about \$100 million a year.

But Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and Speaker Gus Mutscher, as leaders of the two houses of the Legislature, will make the decision on whether a one-year or a two-year spending bill will be passed.

"We are considering all factors, and the governor's opposition to a one-year bill is, of course, one factor," Barnes said. Smith declared, "the House-Senate conference committee is working on a two year bill. That would indicate to me that it has been pretty well determined."

Conferees did go to work on a biennial bill. House Revenue and Tax Committee has yet to come up with a tax package, although Mutscher privately has sketched out a \$275 million revenue bill which includes a \$90 million corporate gains tax and increased cigarette levies.

Although rumors increased concerning possible summer special sessions of the Legislature after Smith took his stand against de-

layed taxation. Governor insists that will be unnecessary. He thinks lawmakers "if they apply themselves" can get through with all mandatory duties by the June 2 regular session deadline.

BILLS PASSED — With less than a month of the regular session to go the House began to out-distance the filibuster-slowed Senate in churning out major bills.

House finally approved measures boosting drinking curfew to 2 a.m. and increasing maximum interest rates on \$300 to \$1,000 loans from \$8 to \$12 per \$100.

Another House proposal passed and sent to the Senate is a constitutional amendment to permit local governments to contract with each other for services like police and fire protection, streets, waste disposal etc.

Both Houses completed action on a bill to strengthen the law requiring open meetings and advance notice of government agencies. Legislative investigating committee sessions and consultations with attorneys will no longer be exempt. Both Houses also approved a bill adding four more "Monday holidays" — Columbus, Veterans' and Memorial Days and Washington's Birthday — for state employees effective in 1971.

Legislators also voted themselves a substantial boost in retirement benefits.

House gave final approval to a bill that allows children to transfer from one district to another without the permission of the home

district, taking State money with them.

House sent to the Senate bills to permit persons 18 or older to teach driver education, provide for occupational drivers licenses for persons aged 15 to 18, toughen the 1967 Consumer Credit Code restrictions on misleading advertising, and bring the state law closer to conformance with the Federal Truth in Lending law. (It gives the State Consumer Credit Commissioner broader powers in enforcing the code.)

House voted to create a six-member committee to promote mass transportation and to make eight changes in the 1943 banking code.

Senators, braving an all-night filibuster, passed a resolution to knock the annual voter registration requirement out of the constitution.

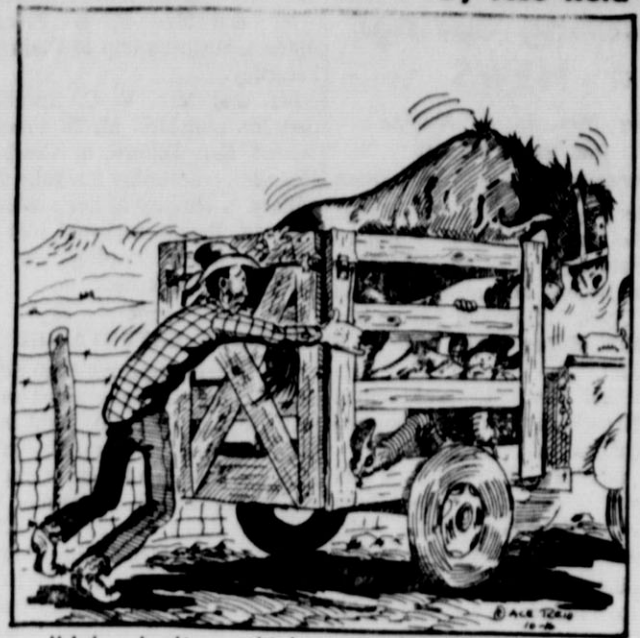
Senate approved a \$125 per hour state minimum wage bill and sent it on to the House.

A bill to halt the flow of unsolicited merchandise that comes by mail passed the Senate. Bill says unsolicited merchandise may be deemed a gift and the receiver does not have to return or pay for it.

Senate passed a bill to change the requirements for independent school districts wishing to form junior colleges. Contiguous districts with a combined taxable wealth of \$30 million — instead of \$9.5 million — and a scholastic population of 3,000 — instead of

7,000 — could establish a junior college.

Among other Senate-passed bills were stiff new controls for forging or altering prescriptions, curbs on obscene movies, a bill to establish a council to study the problems of children with learning defects and a measure which would permit Galveston's Moody family heirs to share in insurance company stock dividends distributed to the \$165 million Moody Foundation.

AG OPINIONS — Federal food stamp program must be operated by State Department of Public Welfare, not county commissioners courts. Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held in an opinion requested by Harris County Attorney Joe Resweber.

In a torrent of other new opinions, Martin concluded that: "There is no authority in law or the constitution for a constable to form a standby auxiliary force for civil disaster or special police duty."

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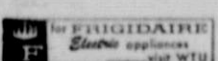

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 24. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the annual salary of the Governor. Each other member of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed the annual salary paid to a district judge from state funds. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive a salary fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the salary of the Governor; providing that the Legislature shall fix the salary of the other members, not to exceed that received by a district judge from state funds; and removing the 120-day limitation on per diem for regular sessions."

The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units with authority to make an arrest, of the state or of any city, county, district, or other political subdivision who, because of the hazardous nature of their duties, suffer death in the course of the performance of their official duties. Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature. Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for payment of assistance to surviving spouses and minor children of governmental officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and certain organized police reserve units, who have hazardous duties and are killed in the performance of those duties."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 50b-1 to read as follows: "Section 50b-1. (a) The Legislature may provide that the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successor shall have authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in addition to those heretofore authorized to be issued pursuant to Section 50b of the Constitution. The bonds authorized herein shall be executed in such form, upon such terms and be in such denomination as may be prescribed by law and shall bear interest, and be issued in such installments as shall be prescribed by the Board provided that the maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by such bonds may be fixed by law. "(b) The moneys received from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited to the credit of the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund created by Section 50b of the Constitution and shall otherwise be handled as provided in Section 50b of the Constitution and the laws enacted pursuant thereto. "(c) The said bonds shall be general obligations of the state and shall be payable in the same manner and from the same sources as bonds heretofore authorized pursuant to Section 50b. "(d) All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under this Constitution. "(e) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment such acts shall not be void because of their anticipatory nature. Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The Constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for additional loans to students at institutions of higher education under the Texas Opportunity Plan."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR8)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows: "Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of: "(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or non-citizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years; "(2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps; "(3) Needy blind persons; "(4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children. "The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation in these programs as it deems appropriate. "The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws

the state for these purposes and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons. "Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31-c, Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner not to administer or to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state. "Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in August, 1969. At the election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting "FOR" or "AGAINST" the proposition: "The Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of the needy aged, the needy blind, the needy disabled, and the needy dependent children and their caretakers; establishing Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) as the maximum amount that may be paid per year from state funds for assistance only; allocating and appropriating additional sums supplementing current legislative appropriations for assistance grants; and authorizing the Legislature to enact such laws as may be necessary in order that federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care."
