Under this program enacted by Congress, socially disadvantaged populations groups are Hispanics, Native Americans, Asians and Pacific Islanders.

Motley Students Correspond Electronically With Clarendon

in electronic correspondence with students at Clarendon High School, Beverly
Darsey's Advanced Word Processing students, Wendi Beshirs, Conway Clary, and Lyndee Jameson, and Denise Gastineau's Microcomputer Applications students Brooke Brandon, Mindy Dod-son, and Kobbi Risser have been sending messages via electornic mail using the school library's computer. Responding to these messages are six Clarendon High School students in Krista Hughes' class.

The Library's computer, equipped with a telephone modem, enables teachers and administrators to dial into TENET (Texas Education Network). One of themany features available on TENET is electronic mail.

During November Mrs. Darsey contacted Lynnette Barefield, a teacher at Clarendon High School (and also sister to Walter Taylor, teacher at Motley County) to arrange for an electronic pen pal exchange as part of a unit on "Composing Flectronic Messages" in her Advanced Electronic Messages" in her Advanced Word Processing Class. Mrs. Gastineau's students joined the project; and for the past 3 weeks, the students have been

past 3 weeks, the students have been exchanging messages.

The Motley County students refer to this exchange by its nickname, e-mail, noting that it is much faster than mail through the postal service, dubbed "snail through the postal service, dubbed and receive massages all in the same day. Actually, it messages all in the same day. Actually, it takes only a few minutes to send a mes-sage to Clarendon's computer. The mes-sage is stored in the teacher's electronic mailbox until she turns on her computer to read her electronic mail. Her reply could then be read minutes later by the Motley County teacher.

TENET is an electronic information system with many other curriculum applications for Texas educators and their

Another service is Legislative Bill Tracking for the current status of bills in either house of the Texas Legisla-

Librarian Beverly Darsey and Library Aide Sherri Prather are assisting students in their research efforts with electronic information retrieval using TENET, Chad Graves and Kyle Mars, students involved in UIL Debate, check the news and conferences feature almost everyday for news about their debate topic, health reform. DaVona Atkinson has used Internet resources for her UIL studies. Almost ev sources for ner OIL studies. Almost every high school studieth has benefited from Groliers Encyclopedia and ERIC Archives on TENET as they work on research assignments for English, health, speech, history, science, and home economic leaves.

Mrs. Darsey states: "So much information is available through TENET, we have only scratched the surface in our efforts to connect students and teachers with the many services available."

What The Great Plains Conservation **Program Can Do For You**

by Edward J. Logan Range Conservationist

The Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP) is a USDA cost share program which assists landowners in imple gram which assists landowners in implementing a complete resource management system on their land. The GPCP is a long term agreement between landowners and the USDA for a period of 3 to 10 years. The USDA provides the landowner cost share funds for the implementation of approved practices. The Great Plains Program should be considered by landowners that are implementing practices required in their Food Security Act required in their Food Security Act (FarmBill) conservation plans, Landowners interested in the GPCP should contact James,Ed, or Rodney at the Soil Conservation Service office in Matador.

Through the Great Plains Conservation Program the USDA provides landowners from 50% to 75% of the funds for approved cost shared practices completed in accordance with SCS specifications. Some of the most common practices installed in Motley County with 75% cost share are standard and parallel terraces, diversion and basin terraces, critical area treatment, waterways, wind stripcropping, pasture planting, and range seeding. 50% cost share funds are available for fence construction, brush management, live-

stock water storage facilities, pipelines, and ponds. These practices and several others are available through the Great 'Plains Conservation Program.

The Great Plains Program in Motley County currently consists of 27 contracts which service 20,056 acres. The Matador SCS field office developed 7 new GPCP contracts on 5232 acres in Motley county in 1993. With these seven contracts the USDA obligated nearly \$103,000 in cost share funds for the implementation of approved practices. Landowners that are interested in the GPCP and would like more information should call or come by the Matador SCS Field Office and visit with James, Ed, or Rodney. Our phone number is 347-2263. SCS office hours are from 7:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.
