## Teacher Says Reds Taking Peru Control

AN attractive young school teacher, Pina Sue Sturdivant, Tuesday told members of Matador Lions Club that Russian influence is taking control of Peru.

Miss Sturdivant, who left Lima, Peru early Saturday morning, after teaching school in the foreign-owned mining town of Ilo, Peru for the past season, was principal speaker at the regular luncheon meeting of the service club held in the Methodist Church basement.

Miss Sturdivant is a native of Motley County, graduate of Matador High School, former teacher here, and last year taught school in Greece. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James P. Sturdivant of Matador. She was introduced Tuesday by Lion Douglas Meador.

"In a word of defense for the copper company by whom I was employed," Miss Sturdivant said, "the company pays approximately five times the standard Peruvian wage, in addition to housing, medical and hospital service and many other benefits. The copper company provides education for the workers' children, which is not provided by the Peruvian government."

"The copper company pays 53 percent of its gross proceeds to the government, then pays 5 to 10 percent export tax on its products.

"Since the recent coup in government in Peru, Russia has established an embassy in Lima, and now American goods are forbidden, while Russian goods are in the markets. Russia is gaining influence in the country."

Miss Sturdivant said there was little anti-American influence in Ilo, a community of about 35,000, but in Lima she saw walls inscribed with signs: "Yankee, go home." Miss Sturdivant followed her address with a brief question and answer period.

## Big Truck Flips, Kills 39 Cattle

A BIG double-decked cattle truck turned over on US Highway 70 about 7:30 Saturday afternoon, killing 39 of 127 head of cattle in the load.

The truck was owned by J. C. Duke of Albany, Georgia, and the driver was Tommy P. McCoy, 28. Deputy Eddie Russell said the driver, who was uninjured, apparently dozed at the wheel, and possibly in suddenly righting the big vehicle, caused it to "jack-knife" and turn over. The accident occurred in the Foothills, about 10 miles west of Matador.

Highway Patrolman Ira Kuhlman said that but for the aid of ranchers and others, all of the cattle would have died in the truck because of the intense heat (about 102 degrees).

Patrolman Kuhlman praised the work of Bundy Campbell, Harold Campbell, Lewis Bostick, Curtis, Howard and Ewell Gene Martin and Jim Knight in aiding in saving the cattle.

He said the men provided two horses, four pickups, two trailers and approximately four hours of labor in helping clear up the wreck.

He also praised the work of members of the Sheriff's department, Sheriff J. D. Spray, and deputies Eddie Russell and Bobby Williams in the direction of traffic following the accident.

## Quick Stop for Laundry Truck

A large diesel-powered truck operated by Plains Laundry of Lubbock made a sudden stop in a field just west of the gate of East Mound Cemetery about 1 p.m. yesterday.

Samuel Hernandez, 25, of Lubbock, the driver, climbed out of the cab uninjured after the big vehicle left US Highway 70 and skidded on its side, taking out about 50 feet of fencing.

Hernandez told Highway Patrolmen Ira Kuhlman and Paul Hoff, he was driving west about 60 miles per hour when the steering developed a sudden "shimmy" which caused him to strike the concrete of a small culvert, throwing the truck out of control.

The truck was en route from Clinton, Oklahoma to Lubbock on a regular three times per week run. It was estimated that damage to the almost new metal truck might be in the neighborhood of \$1,000.

Deputy Sheriff Bobby Williams aided the Highway Patrolmen in investigating the accident.

A TRIBUTE to the dead of all wars was paid here Friday morning as a group met at the Veterans of Foreign Wars Building. It was homage of a small group of dedicated citizens to those who have given their lives to make the United States a free nation.

Invocation was by Rev. Larry Heard, pastor of the First Baptist Church, and the address was by Lt. Col. Bill Pallmeyer, Commander of the American Legion.

"It is regrettable," Pallmeyer said, "that so few can give 30 minutes in tribute to the more than half a million men who have given their lives to preserve freedom in this nation... we are paying tribute to the dead of all wars."

We know that many will not honor our flag today and we should be concerned that freedom can be lost at home as well as the battlefield... now is the time to take a stand... we do not need people who are afraid to become involved... we must admit that our nation was founded on dissent, but it was a dissent founded on a purpose and a plan...

A group of about 12 veterans fired a three-volley salute which was followed by "Taps" by Ward Rattan, and the group was dismissed.

All known graves of veterans in the various cemeteries of Motley County were decorated with flags.

Many flags in Matador were flown at half mast in honor of the deceased heroes. Flags were flown by all places of business here. Some places of business remained open until the mid-afternoon, but in general the community observed the holiday.

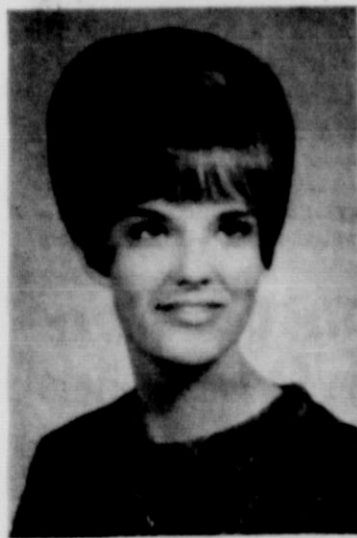

### Show is Reviewed Abroad

## Fourth Season Opens this Month For "Texas" in Palo Duro Canyon

The fourth season of "Texas" will open June 27, Friday, with a Gala International Night, and run through September 1.

Two reports from abroad have reached the "Texas" staff concerning the show in the Palo Duro Canyon. One was a description of a talk in Thailand and given to the Bangkok Book Club. The other was from the Tourist Section of "El Universal" the great daily paper of Mexico accompanying a picture of the overture.

A translation of the Mexican comment reads:

"To honor the pioneers of the State of Texas, the park of the Canyon of Palo Duro has been established in a place notable for its natural beauty.

In the past in this place the mammoths and the bison grazed during a hundred of years until the first humans, the Indians, arrived — then the colonizers came and the hunters.

In this place during the month of July, the musical comedy "Texas" plays in an open air theatre built in the canyon which adds the attractiveness of a modern spectacle to its natural beauty."

The talk in Thailand was made by Captain Ronnie N. Parks of Paducah, Texas. Captain Parks is a graduate of WTSU and appeared in "Thundering Sounds of the West" the first summer-long production in the Pioneer Amphitheatre in 1965. He is now stationed in Thailand and made a talk about Paul Green and the "Texas" show to the members of the Bangkok Book Club. The Australian head of the club described the lecture as a "Smasher" — Captain Parks wrote this about his audience's reaction:

"They were extremely interested in hearing about Paul Green and his work. Their lasting impression will be concerning his patriotism and love of country. Americans often find themselves in a constant defensive position concerning the States. The Europeans and Orientals seem to feel that since we are such a young country we do not have this pride of heritage and tradition. One Dutch lady approached me after the lecture and told me I had almost made her feel like an American. The group consisted primarily of Australian, British, New Zealanders, Dutch, Israelis, American, Thai, and one lovely Indian lady complete with sari, caste mark and nose ring. A charming little lady from North Carolina came up to

me with tears in her eyes because I had made her homesick."

Captain Parks concluded by saying "Give our regards to everyone for us. We will be coming home in September and living in El Paso."

The cast began rehearsals Sunday, for the summer production. They will rehearse eight hours a day, 6 1/2 days a week until the opening.

### Highlights and Sidelights FROM YOUR STATE CAPITAL

AUSTIN — Texas lawmakers have written the record of the 61st regular session, but their toughest job—levying the taxes to pay for what they have ordered—remains to be done.

In adopting a \$2.8 billion one-year state budget (for 1970), they invited a special session to complete appropriations for 1971 and to decide on the inevitable major tax bill. Legislative leaders, Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and House Speaker Gus Mutscher, claim the latter will be smaller if the finance showdown can be delayed until next year.

Gov. Preston Smith, who holds the key to the timing of the special session, has made clear from the start that he feels the Legislature should face up to a biennial budget and the raising of needed revenue. He could veto the single-year bill and call another session immediately—or accept it and schedule the remaining financial work whenever he pleases.

Many all-time legislative records have toppled at this session.

Certainly, the 61st session passed more legislation than any before it, and it was committed in advance to spending more money.

A multitude of laudable ends were attained. Giant strides were made in the field of education. Teachers got a \$61.9 million pay raise. Overhauls were ordered in the field of vocational and technical education. Three new medical schools, a dental school and two new nursing schools were authorized. Also, three new universities,

plus an experimental upper level branch college in Laredo. Never have so many new higher educational facilities been launched in a single session.

A master water plan got all the legislative support it could expect. Workmen's compensation laws were updated. Sweeping controls were approved over air and water pollution. A constitutional amendment to legalize the sale of liquor by the drink was submitted, along with many other proposed changes in the constitution. State employees got a 6.8 percent pay raise.

Texas' 61st Legislature was a busy, productive session. It was a liberal-spending one with the bills yet to be paid.

"The citizenship of Texas will applaud our work at this session and give us their full support when we return to appropriate and finance the second year of the biennium," concluded Speaker Mutscher.

LAW ENFORCEMENT PLAN ADVANCED — Texas' new State Criminal Justice Council has recommended a comprehensive \$1.1 million law enforcement plan that covers a wide scope of activities.

Governor Smith will analyze it before it goes to the U. S. Department of Justice for approval and funding under the Federal Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968. Funds for a two-year operation must be committed by June 30.

Texas received \$234,000 for riot control and \$830,350 in planning money six months ago.

Council voted priority funding to these programs: Prevention of juvenile delinquency, education and training in all elements of the criminal justice system, regional and statewide information and communication systems, community relations programs, experimental and demonstration projects to test and evaluate new approaches to solving problems in criminal justice system.

Approved funds will be disbursed to 21 geographical planning regions of the state. Congress now is considering funding which would provide Texas more than \$11 million in action money, plus planning aid for next year to develop a long-range plan and begin putting it into effect.

COURTS SPEAK — An order by the Midland District Court to jail nine union members for picketing the Texaco plant at Port Arthur was invalidated by the State Supreme Court House of Representatives followed up in a matter of hours by passing a bill directing that lawsuits to halt picketing and strikes must be filed in the counties where the labor dispute arises.

Supreme Court ordered an Austin trial before August 1 of Clyde Durbin Jr. charged with killing two University of Texas students

early this year.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES — A person not registered as a voter is ineligible for election or appointment as an independent school district trustee. So advises Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin in ruling on a Spring Creek school election issue. A similar opinion was returned earlier following a Honey Grove controversy.

In other recent opinions, Martin held that:

Texas Foundation School Budget Committee must include cost estimates for the school program training all prison system inmates over and under 21 years of age who are not high school graduates.

A bill providing for private road construction and maintenance in counties of 10,000 to 10,050 population is unconstitutional as a local and special bill.

Bexar County is required to advertise for competitive bids on all purchases including road machinery, although some emergency buying is expected.

State funds cannot be used for payment of group insurance policies for legislators and their dependents.

An act to prohibit corporations from engaging in farming or ranching (allowing a 10-year period to sell interests) would be constitutional.

State treasurer must publish information on unclaimed funds over \$50 held and owing by life insurance companies.

An article in the latest edition of "Petroleum Today," a magazine published by the American Petroleum Institute, describes mini-vacationing—a brief two or three day trip to a not-too-far-away place of interest—as an easy and inexpensive method of getting away from it all.

Already very popular, mini-vacationing promises to become even more so when new federal and state laws establishing four additional week end holidays become effective in 1971.

At that time, federal employees and District of Columbia residents will celebrate Washington's Birthday on the third Monday of each February, Memorial Day on the last Monday in May, Columbus Day on the second Monday in October, and Veteran's Day on the fourth Monday in October. Several states already have voted to follow Congress' lead, and by 1971 the extended week ends are expected to be effective nationwide.

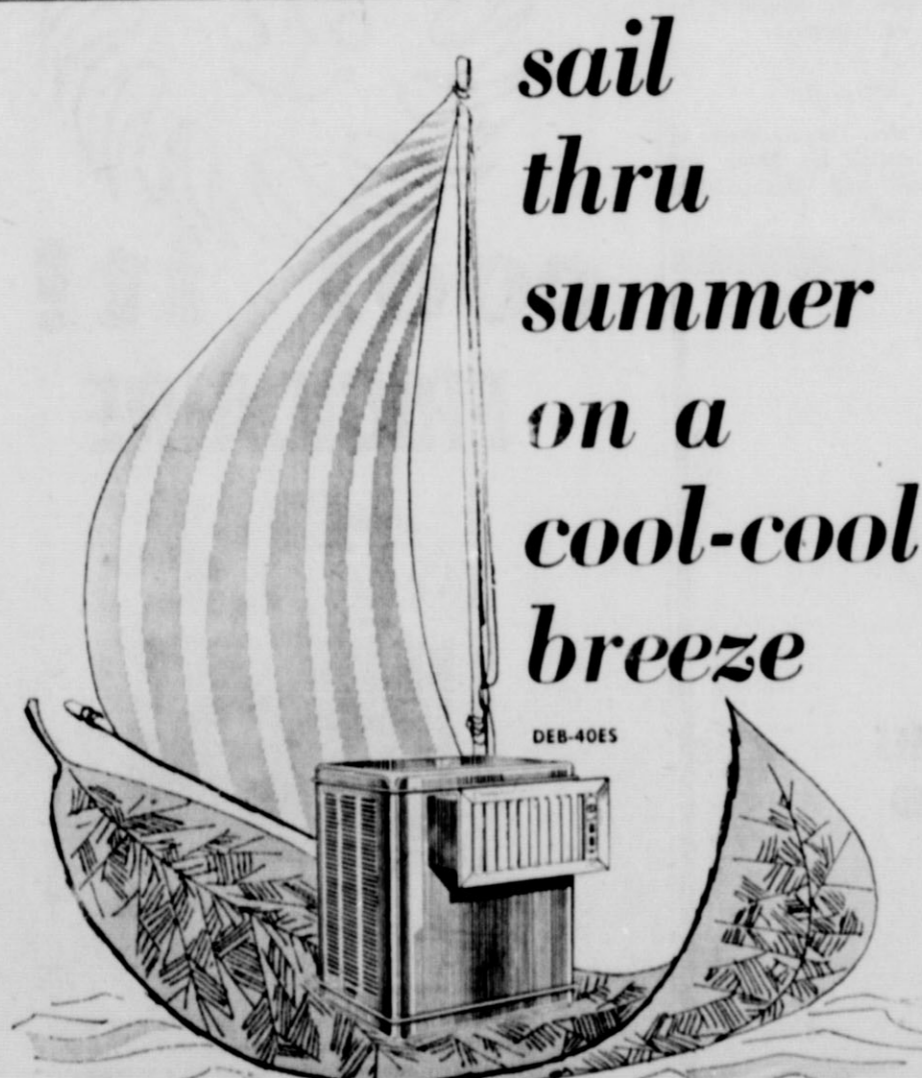

**COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:**

Farmers who have trouble getting a good stand of cotton can improve their chances by following a few simple rules.

One of the most important factors in getting a good stand of cotton is seed quality. The use of high quality seed will produce a much better stand, and high quality seed resist most seedling diseases while seeds of low quality prove to be extremely susceptible to such diseases. Seeds of high quality will produce a long taproot, instead of a short, stubby one that often results from poor seed quality.

Seed can be treated with a fungicide before planting time to reduce its susceptibility to diseases. Treated seed has a protection zone immediately around the seed, and when the seed germinates, and the seedling leaves this zone in its growth, it again becomes susceptible to disease. In-furrow treatment with fungicides protects the seedling until it sprouts above ground, and this practice is recommended where seedling disease is a consistent problem.

Tests in Motley County have continuously proven this practice. Seed treatment for seedling disease control helps, but cost returns show the value of furrow treatment.

A good practice for control of cotton diseases is in crop residue management. Organisms which cause disease often live in the crop residue that is left on the surface of the soil. Deep plowing puts the organism far enough under the seedling to eliminate infection.

New strains of "cold tolerant" cotton are being developed. Farmers should watch the performance of these strains as they are being tested, and if results are favorable, put them to use.

John G. McHoney, Extension Economist has the following to say about the hog situation.

In January, 1969, hog slaughter in federally inspected plants was running four to five percent larger than a year ago. It is expected to continue relatively large this spring, summer and fall.

This expected increase is due to hog producers in the corn belt indicating last December, that they planned to have 4% more sows farrow during December, 1968 and February, 1969, than in these months a year earlier. They also intended to increase March-May 1969 farrowings by 6%.

Cold storage stocks of pork at the beginning of this year were about 11% smaller than a year earlier. Moreover, no sizable buildup in stocks took place this past winter. Thus, the market situation for hogs will be helped somewhat next summer by the smaller stocks of pork in storage.

Hog prices in the first half of 1969 will be under pressure from larger pork supplies of both beef and poultry. Also, hog prices in the second half of the year are expected to average somewhat on the lower side compared with prices the second half of 1968. This is due to prices reflecting increased marketings. Fed cattle marketings are expected to remain large and supplies of poultry will likely continue large in the second half of 1969.

The hog corn ratio likely will decline this year from the unusually high average of 1968. However, the relationship will still be rather favorable to hog production. This would suggest that the expansion underway now may continue through the year, although the rate of increase may slow in the second half.

Household insects can be a problem. In addition to the loss of items damaged, they also spread disease.

Any home and its surroundings harbor some form of insect life. Some insects feed on fabrics, contaminate food and attack dwellings, while others annoy humans by "biting".

Sanitation and good housekeeping are important in controlling or keeping most pests away, but even well-kept homes sometimes become infested.

Certain pests may be found outside and controlled before they enter the home, however, some insects live entirely within the home where they must be controlled by applying insecticides as sprays, dusts or baits. Fumigation seldom is necessary—if a house must be fumigated, it is wise to rely on a qualified company to provide this service.

L-311, Texas Guide for Controlling Household Insects gives recommendations for controlling every kind of insect from moth to mosquito and from tick to termite. The leaflet also contains descriptions of the many types of available equipment which can be used for insect treatment and insecticidal formulations are discussed in length. Copies are available for those who want them.

**Loans Available for Recreation Areas**

Farmers Home Administration can now make loans to farm and ranch owners or tenants for outdoor income producing recreational enterprises according to Alfred A. Harrison, County Supervisor.

Loans to individuals can be made to convert all or a portion of their farms to recreational facilities. The recreational enterprise may supplement regular farm income or, in some cases, replace farm income by converting the entire farm to recreation.

Public recreation areas are increasing in number each year; however, the demand for such facilities still exceeds what is available. The purpose of this loan program is two-fold in that it will provide more recreational areas and help farmers and ranchers to increase their income, stated Harrison.

Loans may be made for camping, picnicking, and hiking facilities, swimming, boating, skiing and fishing facilities, golf courses, riding stables or many other forms of outdoor recreation. Funds can be used to purchase necessary materials, supplies and animals, acquire and develop land and water resources, construct or improve modest essential buildings, and to purchase and install needed equipment and fixtures.

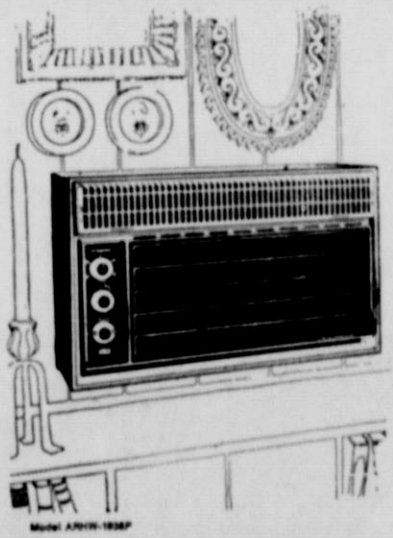

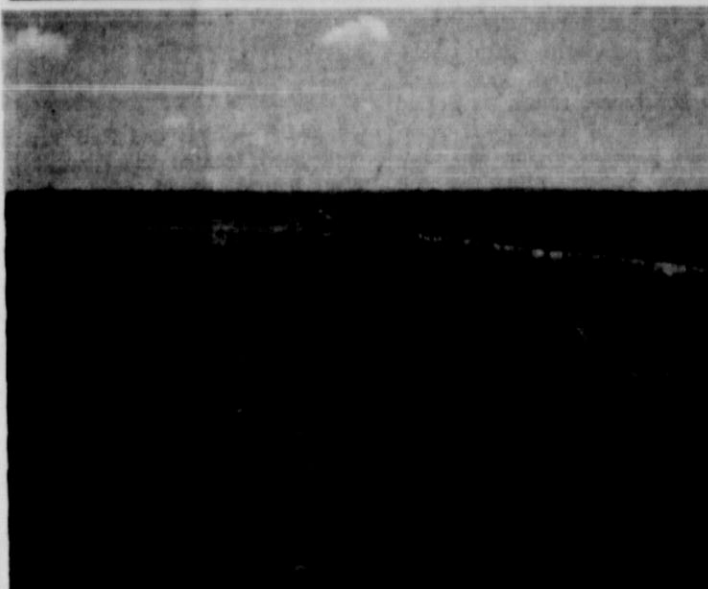

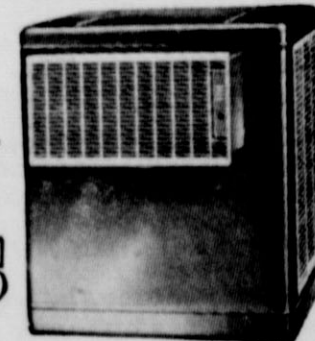
