## Matador First Baptist Church Celebrates 100 Years

As relatives and friends began arriving this week to attend First Baptist Church's 100th anniversary celebration Saturday and Sunday (26-27), local members began making final preparations to entertain the visitors.

The public is extended a cordial invitation to join the church in welcoming those from out of town and to attend all activities and services, which will begin Saturday afternoon at 3:00 with a Welcome Reception in the Fellowship Hall. After a sandwich supper, a program and worship service will be held at 7:00 p.m. in the sanctuary.

Other services will be Sunday morning beginning at 10:30, with special music by Richard Campbell, and Sunday afternoon at 2:00. A catered lunch will be served at noon. There will be no morning

Sunday School or evening worship services Sunday. A nursery will be provided for children ages 2 and younger during the centennial events.

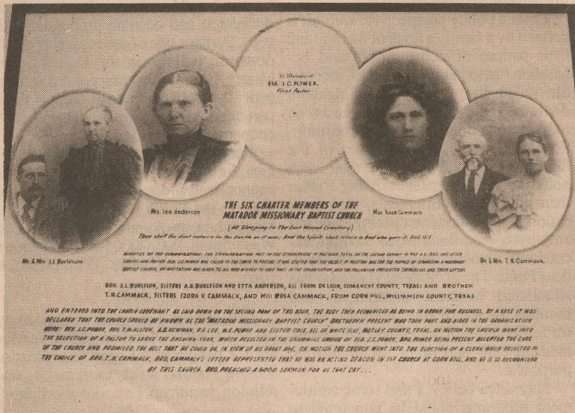
Thirty-one pastors have served the First Baptist Church since it was organized May 14, 1893, until 1991 when the current pastor, Gaylon Cox, came on the field. Nine of the former pastors will be here to participate in the services: Miller Robinson, Larry Heard, Jerry Golden, Bruce Oliver, Stacy Conner, Gene Joplin, Jim Hancock, Gene Hawkins and Greer Willis. A letter from Rev. Keith McCormick stated that due to health problems he would not be able to attend, and information from Gary Hillyard revealed that he is in the Ukraine and will be until the middle of August, to help start a seminary, hospital and radio ministry.

His wife, Cindy, was to join him June 25.

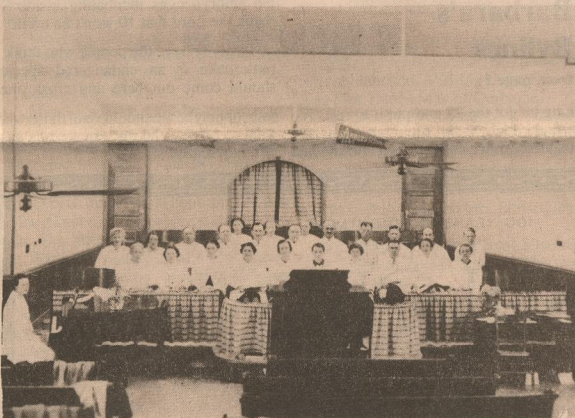

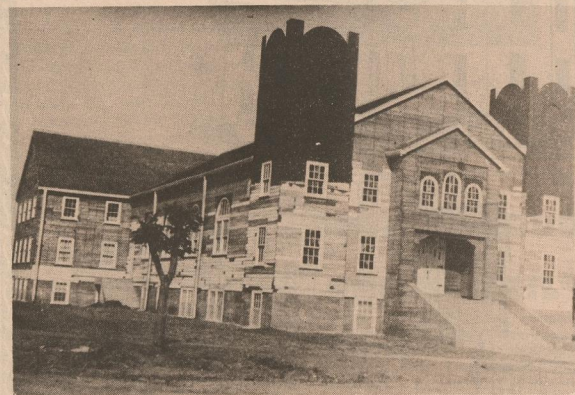
First Baptist Church, Matador, met in its current building for the first time 55 years ago this Saturday, June 26.

## State Comptroller Delivers Monthly Sales Tax Rebates

(AUSTIN) — State Comptroller John Sharp today delivered a total of \$109.4 million in June sales tax rebates to 917 cities and 108 counties, a 3.5 percent increase over the payments of one year ago.

Another \$149.2 million in payments went to the state's eight mass transit programs.

Texas cities received \$98.1 million in sales tax payments, up 3.4 percent from the \$94.9 million they received last June. Counties received \$11.2 million, a 4.9 percent increase over the June 1992 rebates of \$10.6 million.

"Sales tax rebates this month were a mixed bag," Sharp said. "While payments were up in many Texas cities and counties, other parts of the state continue to feel the 'drag' of a sluggish national economy."

This month's sales tax rebates include taxes collected on April sales and reported to the Comptroller in May by businesses filing monthly tax returns. The

mass transit payments include taxes collected between January and April and reported to the Comptroller in March, April, and May.

be at the courthouse on Friday, July 9 for this free clinic. If you choose to use your family doctor, please contact Mrs. Blanch at school, 347-2677, or at home, 347-2287. We will need to let the Texas

Department of Health nurse know approximately how many students need to be inoculated.

This clinic will be a first come first serve basis, and will be held at the Motley County Courthouse, 9:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Friday, July 9. This is a free clinic and is for Motley County students only. Mrs. Blanch will be there to record shots as they are given.

## EMT Program Presented At Do Gooders' Club Meeting

An educational Emergency Medical Technician's program was presented at the Do Gooders' Club meeting Tuesday afternoon, June 1 at the Community Center in Flomot.

Featured guests were Judy Barrett of Quitaque and Sandra Barclay of Flomot. They showed the medical facilities inside the ambulance and explained how they were used on an emergency trip en route to a hospital.

Ms. Barrett gave a demonstration on treatment of snake bites. She said all snake bites should be considered poisonous. If bitten, you should use constricting bands cautiously, allowing enough room for one finger to fit loosely under the

bands. Do not incise or induce bleeding. If swelling persists loosen constricting bands slightly. Keep the bitten body part at or below level of the heart and keep yourself warm. Remain calm. After calling 911 wait for the ambulance to arrive and you will be transported to the nearest hospital that carries antivenom serum.

Mrs. Barclay demonstrated the emergency treatment for an airway obstruction. The Heimlich maneuver was enacted and practiced by all those present.

It seems that we can more readily pick out of the same (self-righteousness burns with a hot flame). Yet neither vociferous opinion nor history is our final judge.

"Bravo" to Butch and "Bravo" to Gary. Courage needs recognition, and compassion to all is a Godly characteristic and merits a listening ear.

Jesus the Christ didn't just die for the good guys - he died for all of us who have done dumb and wretched and even unspeakably wicked things and even all who are guilty of hate, and avarice, gossip, and intolerance.

"The students who come here are really eager to learn," said Dave Krupnick, SPS manager of agricultural and whole-

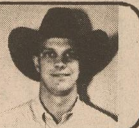
sale marketing. "These are skills that these young people can use everyday on the farm."

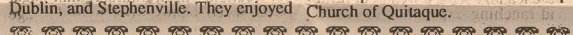

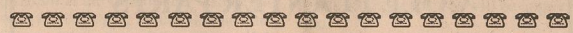

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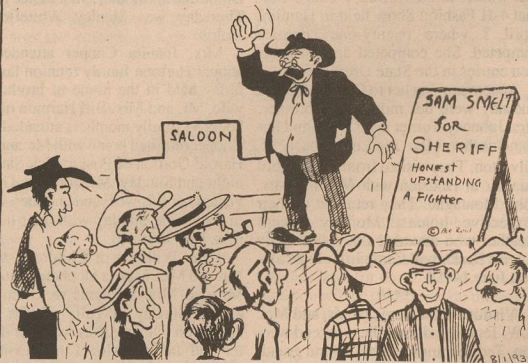
