COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

Tests for the control of Johnson grass by Motley County farmers show promise, as Delmont Hays, Northfield; Sam Ross, Flomot; and James Ed Russell, Matador report that grass treated with DOWPON killed grass treated. The chemical was mixed at the rate of 1 lb. to 5 gal. of water, and application was made when grass was 6 to 18

inches tall. A second application was made on test plots to treat plants that were missed the first treatment, or were not fully covered the first time, with all three farmers reporting that a satisfactory job was done in the eradica-

tion of the grass. Another test by Milton Brooks of Roaring Springs was applied with only fair results reported. Grass in this test was 18 in. and taller when treated, thereby indicating that for best results, treatment must be made while the grass is young and still

growing. Four tests for 1958 are planed, these to be conducted by Mervin Green and Alfred Dye, Roaring Springs; Alfred Cooper, Whiteflat; and Joe Smith, Flomot. Farmers are encouraged to watch these demonstrations for results.






