## 2nd Primary Plans Ready

Plans for the second 1956 Democratic primary election are completed for Motley county's seven voting boxes, it was announced this week by County Chairman Henry Ford.

Absentee votes cast up to the closing hour Tuesday night reached a total of 37 according to County Clerk Pat Sheridan, which he said was above normal for a 2nd primary with few contested offices.

Principal interest in the county is focused on the commissioner's race here between Raby Webb and Clyde Gilbert.

On the state basis, the big race is that for the governor's office between Senator Price Daniel and Judge Ralph Yarborough and the equally important contest between Will Wilson and Tom Moore for the attorney general's office.

## LUBBOCK SCOUTER IS LIONS SPEAKER

"Most important phase of the cold war is the battle for the control of the thinking of the citizens of tomorrow," asserted Ralph Cribbs, Tallwister of the Lubbock Down Town Lions Club and public relations manager of the South Plains Scout Council, in an address here this week.

Lion Cribbs was the principal speaker at the regular Tuesday luncheon meeting of the Matador Lions Club held in the basement of the Methodist Church.

He was introduced by program sponsor, Lion Dr. J. S. Stanley, who said he was interested in Cribbs because he was the only man he knew whom he could beat on the golf links.

Cribbs said that the present Scout membership in the United States is over 3,000,000 with approximately 1,200,000 adult workers. He said Scouting is now organized in 63 foreign countries and pointed to the records of law enforcement officers that only one Scout with 200,000 is ever charged with violations.

Cribbs paid tribute to the Matador Lions Club for the 20 years it has supported Scout work here and said that the Lions and Scouts in Matador are well known for their long record of work and achievements.

In closing, the visitor said: "Scouting provides activities for the youth which is essential. Empty minds offer as much of a breeding place for communism as does empty stomachs."

## Cottonwoods Shade First Meet of Old Settlers At Roaring Springs

### C. D. Bird Selected First President

HISTORY of the starting of the Motley-Dickens Counties Old Settlers Association, has in the past, produced some conflicting data, especially with regard to the first president. The Tribune has in its possession a copy of the Motley County News published Thursday, September 6, 1923 (H. O. Ward, editor and publisher) which gives an account of the first meeting of a century ago. The following is a verbatim reproduction of the news item.

### "OLD SETTLERS ORGANIZE"

"A rather informal Old Settlers meeting of the pioneer citizens of Motley and Dickens counties was held at Roaring Springs last Saturday which proved a most enjoyable affair.

There were about three hundred people assembled, and among them something like thirty who had been residents of one or both counties for more than twenty-five years, and some had been here over thirty years.

"A picnic dinner was served and to the enjoyment of the occasion the Matador (Silver Corral) Band and boosters for their Trade Day Barbecue and County Fair, appeared on the scene and contributed materially to the program.

### 3-Day Reunion May Break All Records

PIONEERS and a vast crowd of visitors are gathering in Roaring Springs this morning for the beginning of 33rd annual reunion of Motley - Dickens Counties Old Settlers. It is the first time that the reunion has been set for three days. It began with a one-day meeting, was changed to two days and now three days and nights.

With the opening day always falling on Thursday, the Tribune is, as it has been for 20 years, in the process of being printed and mailed.

President Elbert Reeves said, yesterday that final arrangements have been completed and that interest in the meeting in districts what may be the largest attendance in history. The weatherman last night promised "Old Settler" weather, fair and hot.

A carnival of rides and children amusements arrived Monday and will provide entertainment for youngsters. The Matador High School Orchestra, "The Hep Cats" will provide music at intervals today. No program has been planned for Friday and Saturday, except the afternoon dancing, rodeo features and visiting of friends.

### Chuck Wagon Meals

Range chuck wagons will serve meals (noon and supper) Thursday and Friday. It is probable, officials declared that meals will not be served at the chuck wagons Saturday. Meals will include choice of steak or barbecue and will be \$1.

After the parade at 10 a. m. this morning, memorial services will be held at the pavilion, beginning at 11 o'clock. The afternoon program will be concluded by a business session when new officers will be elected. S. J. Braselton will serve as nominating committee chairman.

Rodeo programs during afternoons and evenings are expected to attract larger crowds than ever before. Handmade saddles, silver-mounted bits and spurs, gold and silver belt buckles and cutting horse trophies are among the gifts. Two dances will be held each evening during the reunion.

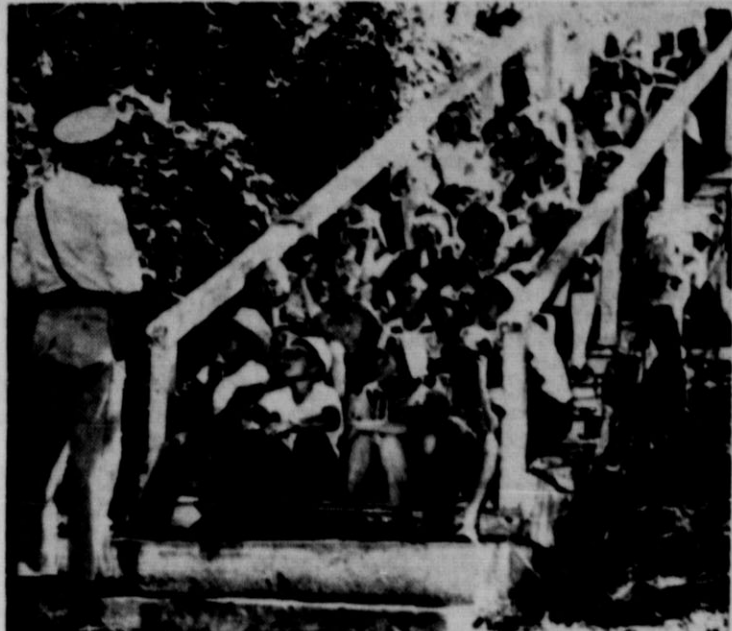

**Get Our First Bale**

From Motley County News Issue of Sept. 6, 1923

The first bale of the 1923 crop of cotton to be ginned in Matador, was brought in last Thursday, August 30th, by Ben Keltz of Whiteflat.

Ben could have had a bale on the market several days earlier, but the gin was not ready to receive it, or turn it out until that day.

The staple was ginned by West Texas Gin Company and weighed 480 pounds. It was not sold as Mr. Keltz belongs to the Farm Bureau and will market his cotton through that agency.

This is about the earliest that a bale has ever been seen in Matador, but this is due to the hot, dry weather, which has forced the product to an early and unnatural maturity. There will not be much of this, however, and the bulk of our crop will be gathered from late cotton, which is getting the benefit from the late rains and is going to make more than anticipated.

A premium of \$55 was given the producer.
