

# Conditions Improved After General Rainfall

WEEK the Tribune missed the story of the year. The rain fell in all areas of the county, and while the drought is not broken, conditions are vastly improved. Reports from Flomot indicate from one to two inches in most areas of the community.

Northfield (which had received some rain earlier) received varying amounts, estimated to two inches. Water gaps were washed out in the Teepee Creek area northeast of Matador with amounts as high as three inches reported.

Lightest registered rainfall was in Roaring Springs which reported less than an inch. Areas bordering the community reported more. With an estimated 2,000 bales of cotton ginned in Roaring Springs it is probably the only part of the county where the rainfall resulted in damage. A considerable amount of the crop remains in fields.

Paul Patton whose farm is located in the former Fairview community east of Matador said he registered 2.40 inches of rain.

Young grass and weeds, receiving moisture for the first time in months, are showing rapid growth. Cool nights are tarding growth to some extent.

Farmer in almost every county community are planting barley, wheat and rye for pasture. Demand for seed is booming.

Despite the barren harvest (except Roaring Springs and parts of Flomot) the rainfall has greatly improved the attitude of the farmer and rancher and business man. A more hopeful atmosphere prevails throughout the county and the traditional optimism of West Texas is reflected generally. One pioneer explains the present condition this way: "This is the most wonderful next year country in the world."

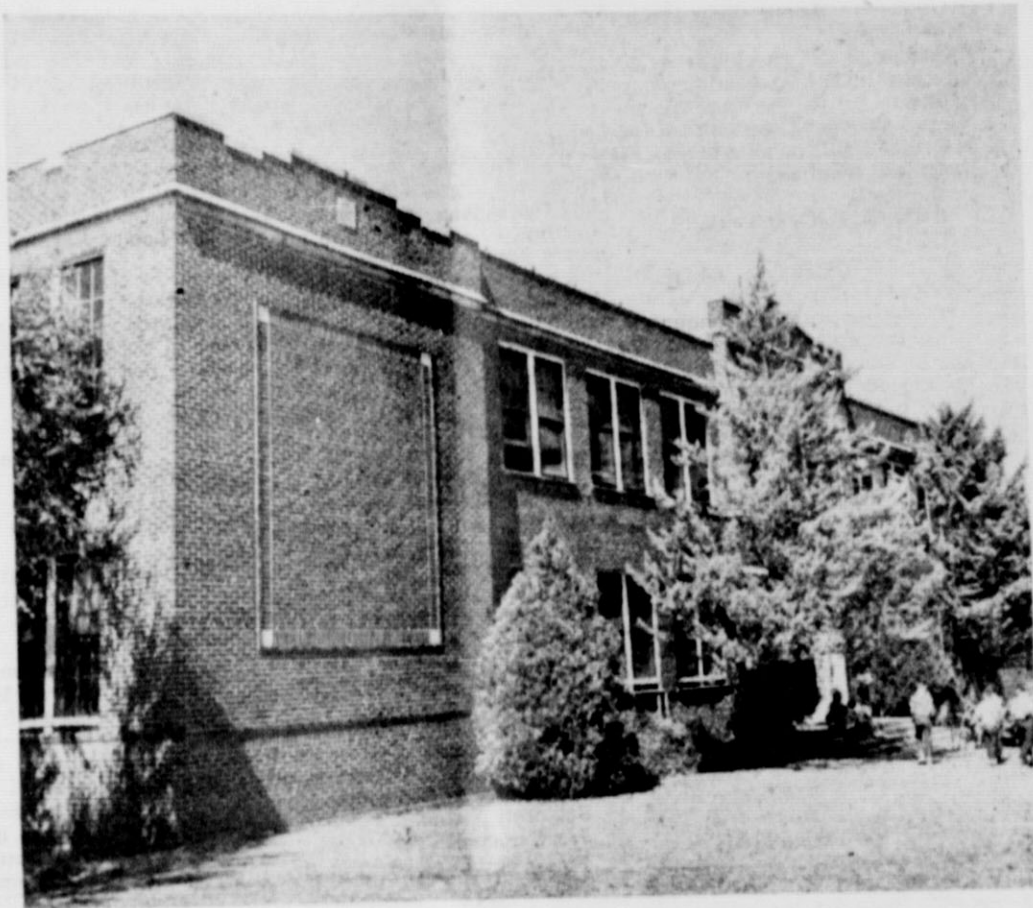

**FESTIVE FOWL GROWN HERE**—100,000 pounds of turkeys (estimated weight) have been produced this season by Manley Thompson, Matador feed store operator and grower. The above photo was made about two weeks ago on the turkey ranch two miles east of town where 4,500 head of select quality birds were being reared for market. Mr. Thompson has since disposed of part of the great flock and the remainder will go to market soon. He started with 5000, lost a few and sold some locally. The birds have been fed Purina Growing Chow, oats and other grain. Two weeks ago hens averaged about 15 pounds and toms 25 pounds. (Dressing loss in turkey is about 25%) Current price is around 25c on foot but has been as high as 55c since the war. This is Mr. Thompson's first venture in the turkey business. The young turkeys were delivered (age 8 weeks) June 6. Mr. Thompson has a large amount invested in the plant, including shelter, fences, feeding and watering facilities, etc. in addition to the turkeys' feed and labor. He said that market prices at the time of sale would determine whether or not his venture had been profitable.—Douglas Meador photo.
