Don't Look Now, That Man is Back

More Rate Hike Asked By General Telephone

IT DOESN'T SEEM POSSIBLE but it is true. The General Telephone Company of the Southwest is back knocking on city council desks for another rate increase. An application of "an upward adjustment in rates" was filed with the council, January 14. It seems the General Telephone Company is having the same trouble many other businesses (including newspapers) have faced in recent years—that of making ends meet. According to the company figures submitted by Dist. Manager E. I. Jenkins of Ralls, General Telephone cleared \$1,288.40 on its Matador operation, for the fiscal year which ended June 30, 1957. It was not enough. It was less than 2% (1.93%) on the Matador investment which at present fair value is listed at \$63,190.17, and General is paying about 6 1/2% interest.

In the prepared statement the company says that salaries of operators have increased from 232% since 1940. It does not say how much they have increased since the city granted the last rate raise. The statement also says that rates in Matador for the same period (1940 until now) have increased only 55% for some classes of service to 100% for others. Only 12% rate increase The news release blandly says "on a composite percentage increase basis, the rate which the city council has been asked to approve is only a 12% increase over rates that were in effect in 1940." The same paragraph says the company is paying more for labor, materials and equipment and has a 65% increase in the "per telephone" investment here since 1940.

One interesting figure comes out of the several page booklet prepared especially for the council. It is this: in the fiscal year cited the company paid \$933.19 Federal Income Tax on its Matador profits, that netted \$1,288.40.

At the proposed rates (which are not stated) the company proposes to collect \$29,574.83 as compared with last year's \$22,900.55, to yield a profit of \$4,380.84 which does not seem unreasonable on \$63,000 investment if the figures are all true (and they are sworn to figures). But the interesting figure: Uncle Sam will collect \$4,283.33 Federal Income Tax on the corporation profit, instead of \$933 paid last year, actually more than the company, considering other taxes.

Editorial Follows

Dist. Governor Visits R. Springs Lions Club

He listed a few of the major projects of Lionism including the White Canes for the blind, the Seeing Eye Dogs and the Cripple Children's Camp at Kerrville, valued at more than a million dollars, which Texas Lions have paid completely free of debt.

County At "Low Ebb" On Paid Poll Taxes

COMING EVENTS are casting fantastic shadows. Right now it appears that candidates may be running in circles looking for qualified voters in Motley County. Up until yesterday morning the total number of poll taxes paid was 458, with seven exemptions. Even during the "long drought" election years, the county has usually polled between 1100 and 1200 votes. Now it is election year again. Friday, January 31, is the last day to pay poll taxes. Voters (those who have paid poll taxes or are exempt) will elect a district judge, a county judge, a county clerk, county attorney, treasurer, two commissioners (Precincts 2 and 4) and refill all justice of the peace offices. In addition, residents of Matador and Roaring Springs can vote in city elections (Matador residents will elect a mayor and two councilmen). Also about nine school board members (throughout the county) are now serving terms that will expire in 1958. It looks like the 1.75 poll tax is about the cheapest and most effective instrument for defend-

Charlie Edwin Soderstrom, 84, long-time area resident, died Saturday morning at his residence in Floydada, and funeral services were held Sunday at 2 p. m. in the City Park Church of Christ there, with Minister Gordon L. Downing officiating. Burial was in Matador East Mound cemetery. Death was attributed to a brain clot. A retired farmer, Mr. Soderstrom fell about a week ago, and suffered injuries, and it was thought he might have suffered a stroke. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. C. E. Soderstrom, Floydada; a stepson, Harvey Wilson, with the armed forces in Germany, and three sisters: Mrs. Lee Clary, of Abilene, Mrs. Lillie Lee and Miss Emma Soderstrom, of Paducah; also two nephews, J. C. Clary and John Lee Clary, of Paducah. Mr. Soderstrom was born December 20, 1873 and died January 18, 1958, at the age of 84 years, 28 days. Mr. and Mrs. Soderstrom were former residents of Motley County, living east of Matador for many years. They had been living in Floydada the past 14 years.
