"No Takers" have appeared for the nine jobs as trustees in Motley County school systems. Deadline for filing is March 5.

Information from the office of County Judge and Ex-Officio County Superintendent Vance H. Gilbreath shows that the terms of nine trustees will expire this year, including two on the county board.

Members of the county board whose terms will expire are A. B. Simpson (Pct. No. 3) and J. P. Cooper (Pct. No. 4). Terms expire for three members of the Matador Independent School board. They are Frank Pohl, Curtis Graham and Clovis Murphy.

Two terms expire on the Flomott Independent School board. They are D. M. Gilbert and A. D. Moseley.

Two terms will expire on the Roaring Springs Independent Schoolboard. They are John Meason and Avery Payne.

Ronnie Ragland, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Ragland, won the Grand Championship in the fat calf division, but only one jump ahead of his sister, Sharon, who was awarded second place and the Reserve Championship. Approximately 40 head of swine, 21 sheep and five calves were shown. Judges were: Odie Holly, VA teacher of the Friendship School (near Lubbock), livestock; Harley Ragland and Robert Forbis, showmanship. FFA Sweetheart Voda Tarrent presented the awards.

In the open gilt division Jerry Clements was awarded first place; Oscar Hughes 2nd; and J. W. Joplin 3rd. In the bred gilt division Tommy Lawson took the first place award; second went to Jim Hobson and third to Stanley Bateman.

In the fat barrow division Rita Hawley won first place and the Grand Championship award. Second place and Reserve award went to Jerry Clements. Jimmy Swan was awarded third place.

In the breeding swine division the Grand Championship award went to Tommy Lawson. Jerry Clements received the Reserve Championship award.

Max Edwards showed the Grand Champion fat lamb and received first place in the breeding sheep division. Timmy Baxter won 2nd and 3rd places in the fat lamb division and received the Reserve Championship award.

Showmanship awards went to Larry Wade Roberts in the calf division and Jerry Clements in the swine division.

The Patton Springs FFA Chapter expresses appreciation for all contributions to the prize fund, and to everyone who helped make the show a success.

## Rites are Held For Henry Ford

ONE OF MOTLEY COUNTY'S best known citizens is dead. Henry Ford, 61, died Saturday morning about 5:45 in Quanh Memorial Hospital. He had been in ill health since September and underwent brain surgery in Baylor Hospital, Dallas, in December.

Funeral services were held at 3:30 Sunday in the Methodist Church with Rev. W. B. Vaughn, retired Methodist minister, officiating, assisted by the pastor, Rev. Woodrow Williams, and by the Rev. Ray Manning, Throckmorton, former Matador Baptist pastor.

Graveside Masonic rites were held in East Mound Cemetery where burial was conducted under the direction of Eudy-Seaje Funeral Home. Pallbearers were: John Barnhill, Glen Brotherton, Douglas Pitts Jr., Billy Wason, R. E. Campbell Jr., Wade Berryman, L. M. Cox and Leon Smallwood.

Henry Kenton Ford was born near Jacksboro, Texas December 20, 1896. He came to Motley County the following year with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. H. N. Ford pioneers of this section. He had lived here since. He was married at Matador, July 18, 1917, to Miss Lucy Lambert.

Mr. Ford was a veteran of World War I. Following the war he was cashier of the former First National Bank of Matador for three years. Later he was engaged in cotton-buying and for a time was in the insurance business with the late Roy Burleson. He had been manager of Higginbotham-Bartlett Co., here since 1933.

**Masonic Leader**  
Mr. Ford had held principal offices in all Matador Masonic Lodges. He was a Shriner, a 32nd degree Mason and Scottish Knight Commander of the Court of Honor. He was a steward of the Methodist Church and a member of the I. O. O. F. Lodge.

A graduate of Matador High School, Class of 1913, Mr. Ford attended Wayland College, Plainview. He was past president of the Ex-Students Association and past-president of the Matador Lions Club.

Besides his wife, he is survived by several nephews and nieces.

### CITY ELECTION GATHERS STEAM

Steam is gathering in Matador city election scheduled for Tuesday, April 1, when the citizens will elect a mayor and two councilmen. Two candidates are in the race for mayor, incumbent for four years W. L. McWilliams and Forrest Campbell.

This week a third candidate filed for a place on the ballot as councilman. The three candidates for the two places are Jack Norman (reelection) Wade (Mutt) Berryman and W. W. Clements. Present council Billy Wason will not be a candidate for re-election.

Deadline for filing to have a name placed on the ballot is March 1, or 30 days before the election.

The number of candidates assure the community of a large vote. At one time about the beginning of the war, Matador polled only 17 votes in a city election. The present probable full voting strength in the neighborhood of 400 (considering loss of poll taxes paid this year).

TEXAS SCHOOLS are scheduled for top billing on the stage of community interest next week, when citizens will take a closer look at the institutions of learning during Texas Public School Week. The Matador Lions Club will hold the regular luncheon meeting Tuesday in the school auditorium following the noon meal served in the lunch room.

Annual High School Carnival is scheduled here for Thursday night. It will include a variety program as in past years (talent contest, Queen's contest, games pie walk and many other features). Supt. Bert Ezzell said yesterday that he assumed the PTA would serve evening meals Thursday as in past years.

The carnival was originally scheduled for Hollowe'en but because of conflict with other events, it was postponed.

Friday will be visitation day when friends and patrons of the school are invited to be served at the noon meal in the lunch room and visit the various departments of the school system (They are welcome any day, Mr. Ezzell said, but Friday has been set aside as visitation day).

A group of high school students will present a variety show at Northfield school house Friday night during community night. Northfield citizens meet once each month for a program and association.

The plan has gained wide popularity in the community. Programs are planned and the community meets as a large family gathering.

The Matador Lions, after concluding their meeting Tuesday, will tour the school plant here.

## House Votes New Funds For Soil Bank Reserve

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25 — After hearing the farm soil bank program denounced as "unsound," "outlandish" and a hoax, the House voted an additional \$250,000,000 for it Tuesday.

By a standing 120-57, the House approved an amendment to a general appropriations bill increasing from \$500,000,000 to \$750,000,000 the amount farmers may claim in 1958 for retiring surplus cropland to an acreage reserve.

It also added an amendment limiting payments to individual

or corporate farm participants to \$3,000 on all land withdrawals. The vote was 137-17.

The limitation, proposed by Representative Laird of Wisconsin, applies only to the additional \$250,000,000 in the original law, a \$3,000 limitation applies to each "farm" but does not limit the number of farms.

The standing vote on both provisions is subject to possible reversal on a rollcall vote when the appropriation bill comes up for final passage Wednesday.
