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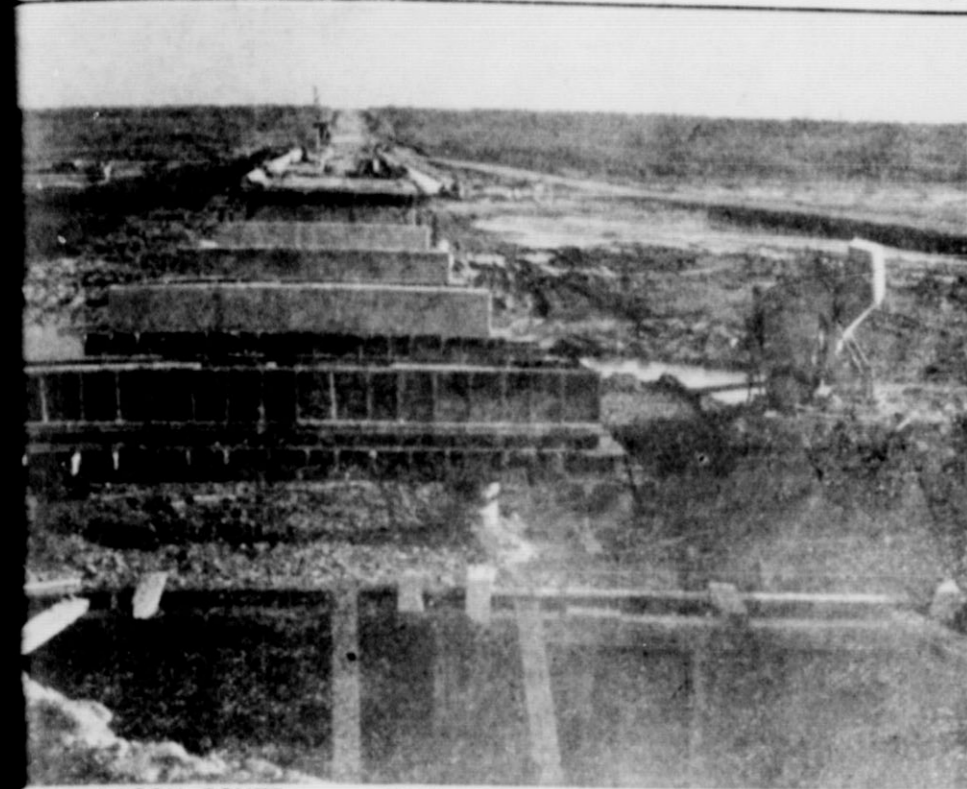

## Mayor Returned In Close City Election

### McWilliams Winner By 10-Vote Margin

**TEN IS LUCKY** for Mayor W. L. McWilliams. He was re-elected for a third term Tuesday by a margin of ten votes over his nearest opponent, Forrest Campbell. It was exactly the same number of votes by which he defeated Douglas Meador in 1956. McWilliams received 145 votes and Campbell 135. Floyd Bradley received 44 votes for mayor.

Matador turned out 333 votes for the first election of the year, only eight votes less than were polled in 1956.

Wade (Mutt) Berryman received the largest number of votes in Tuesday election. He received 284 to elect him as a new member of the council. Warren Clements received 213 votes to elect him as a new council member. Jack Norman, veteran council member was defeated with 109 votes.

Jack Lancaster won the city marshal place with a margin of four votes (164) over A. L. Calk (160).

**Mayor Gets Raise**  
Mayor McWilliams not only won his election against two opponents, but he received a \$10 per month raise to start his new administration. His salary was set at \$90 per month, veteran council member, veteran council member was defeated with 109 votes.

**Rates To Go Up**  
The city granted the telephone company an increase in rates which, according to a member of the council will amount to between 10 and 11%.

Matador telephone users will pay 75c more per month for residence phones and \$1.50 more per month for business telephones. The company had asked

for \$2.50 more per month for residence and \$4 more per month for business. The increased rates go into effect the first of July, which will be three years since the last rate increase.

Matador's city election vote surprised many who believed that it might be in the neighborhood of 250. In 1956 a total of 341 votes were polled. The record vote here was in 1952 when 380 votes were polled.

## Matador Students Win 5 First Class Awards

**FIVE** of a possible 11 literary events first place award ribbons were won by students from Matador high school in the district interscholastic league meet held Friday in Silverton. MHS students also won two 2nd place awards, three 3rd place awards and two 4th place awards.

Students receiving first place awards were, Charlotte Campbell in ready writing, Kay Norman in poetry reading, Jan Barton in declamation, and Mike Groves in typing and poetry reading.

Second places went to Carolyn Pohl in extemporaneous speaking, and Bobby Cross in slide rule. Third places went to Verna Watkins and Charlotte Campbell in spelling, Tommy Scaff in slide rule and Mike Groves in number sense. Fourth place winners were Johnny McNeely in typing and Mike Groves in slide rule.

Other schools competing in the district meet were Turkey, Silvestone, Quitaque, Lakeview, Estelina, Kirkland, Carey and Flomot.

### Lions Rollicking "Show Boat" Declared Among Top Programs; Plays Full House

**VAUDEVILLE** may have been set back 50 years Tuesday night when the Matador Lions Club presented its Show Boat Minstrels and variety show in the high school auditorium, but the audience had a good time. So did the Lions, although some of the actors are still wearing traces of the black-face makeup. The gross box office take was over \$500, including the candy sale. Officials said the club may net in the neighborhood of \$400.

Jan Barton was selected queen among the 20 beautiful high school girls, to represent the club at the district meeting in Dalhart, April 24-25-26. Miss Barton (she is the daughter of Lion and Mrs. C. M. Barton) will receive an all-expense trip to the convention city.

Several girls rated high in the voting according to Lion John Stevens, who was in charge of the contest. One contestant needed only a single vote to tie the winner.

The Lions candy sales during the intermission was a success.

**Not Enough Candy**  
Although but few brave souls dared to eat it, Chorus girls (Lions) did not have enough candy to supply the demand, although the stock was about 700 boxes.

Local talent provided the musical acts which included several by school student groups (the Melodettes, Queenbees, Hepcats, a children's pantomime act, and a solo by Joe Harcrow); others not members of the civic organization, including Riley Rigby and his band composed of his two sons, Sherrill and Riley Jr., Joe Self and Bill Buchanan; and Lion Varner McWilliams with his banjo. The lower floor of the auditorium was filled to capacity and the balcony was about one-third filled.

Unusual feature of the show was that it was produced with little rehearsal. Only one full rehearsal was held before the opening. It was directed by Lion Forrest Campbell.

## Highway 70 Group Announces Annual Membership Drive

A group of Oklahoma businessmen who work without pay to promote U. S. Highway travel through the southwest, will conduct the annual membership drive here Tuesday. It was announced yesterday by Bob Stanley, local secretary.

Stanley attended a meeting held in Paducah Tuesday night at the Cattle Hotel Coffee Shop, which was attended by 18 civic-minded representatives from Crowell, Vernon, Floydada, Matador and Paducah.

The US Highway 70 Association was repressed by R. H. Bennett, director of public relations for the national association. He has been employed for three months and is the only paid member of the group.

**Average Tourist Spends \$27**  
The average tourist on US Highway 70 spends \$27 per day per person, Bennett said. US Highway 70 which is 2933 miles in length, is the shortest route from coast to coast and is constantly gaining in travel.

New Mexico has spent \$10,000,000 on the road and Arizona has spent \$4,500,000. Arkansas has recently completed a four-lane road (Highway 70) between Hot Springs and Little Rock. Oklahoma has recently made improvements in the vicinity of Ardmore.

Most of the associations funds are spent for road maps and signs directing traffic onto US Highway 70. At present the association has only \$278.06 in funds. Last year Matador had 11 members in the association. Annual membership dues are \$10.

## MATADOR STRUCK BY HAIL STORM

A violent little hail storm struck Matador shortly after dark Monday night and dumped tons of thunderous ice pellets in a matter of a few minutes. Drifts of small hail stones were soon piled against the curbs and buildings. Moisture in the hail and rain which accompanied it, amounted to 30-inch according to Bob Stanley's rain gauge. No damage was reported.

Severe storm warnings released all day yesterday failed to materialize into anything more than a sandstorm here.

## Cotton Acreage Program Boosted By \$128,000

**OVER \$128,000** additional funds have been allocated Motley county in the 1958 cotton acreage reserve program, according to an announcement made early this week by Tommy Moore, local ASC office manager. With the original allocation of \$255,731, the

county now has available \$354,731.

"The additional allocation now makes it possible for us to cover all requests for participation on our register," Moore said, "previously some farmers had been unable to sign agreements because our funds were exhausted."

Producers who had not previously signed agreements because of the shortage of funds, may now do so. First, however, they must establish proof to the satisfaction of the county committee that they had previously made an attempt to participate.

The two basic conditions which must be met are: the farmer must be able to clearly establish that he took positive action in an attempt to file an agreement (or register on Form CSS-823), and funds must be available after have covered all agreements that were timely filed and all requests that were properly registered by the applicable closing date.

A certification setting forth that the producer attempted to participate after the opening date of January 13 and before the closing date of February 20, shall be filed with the county committee not later than April 18.

In an East Texas jail male prisoners are segregated from females by a flimsy screen of canvas. A South Texas jail's sanitation facilities consists of a wash tub and a garden hose.

## COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

**STATE TB TEST FOR LIVESTOCK** Each six years, the Livestock Sanitary Commission requires that counties be checked for TB among cattle to determine if the county can be accredited or not. In accredited counties, livestock may be shipped out of the state with only a statement signed by a local veterinarian, but if the county is not accredited, a test must be made, thereby causing a 3 day delay and more expense to the cattle owner.

Ten percent of the cattle in the county must be tested, and approximately 10% of the cattle owners must be represented in the test. Work in Motley County will start the week of April 6th, and will be done by Dr. Robert Allison of Paducah. Those who are interested in the test are requested to notify County Agent Pallmeyer.

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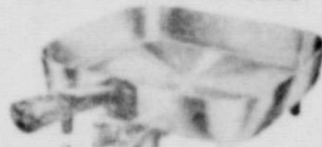

Although several weeks ago, this season of the far north, Mrs. R. W. White, released last fall and Mrs. White returned to their post at Elim, Alaska, on a vacation trip and the "states."

unusual effects. Villagers whom I do not see very often change to such an extent that I must look closely in order to recognize them, and I am forced to believe what I have heard. The Eskimo is a white man of early European background and with an unusual capacity for sunburn.

Under this onslaught of sunshine the crusts of snow soften and one must wear snow shoes or be prepared to flounder each time a foot breaks through Bare bits of ground are seen at long intervals around doorways.

On the well-trampled school yard that heralds of spring, the marble game, begins. A lone seagull is spotted and the first returning ducks bring excited plannings as shot guns and rifles undergo spring check-up.

Women band together in groups of twos and threes and establish camps in the hills. The spring trapping of squirrel skins for next year's parkas goes into full swing.

**Church Bell Rings**  
One morning in late May the church bell will ring, rifles will fire, and there will be running and shouting all over the place.

The excitement? The mighty heave of the early morning tide will have broken the ice from its shore moorings and as the tide recedes the ice will go to sea.

The race of men, old and young, to put a boat in the water and go for a spin on the open bay will rival the rush of children to a circus parade.

Activities will parallel the long hours of the sun and children and grown-ups alike will go to bed only when they are exhausted. Even then they will dream of the long, warm, wonderful days of June when this Arctic world seems to be under a magical spell and only good can happen.

It is a grand and glorious feeling when the human spirit rushes to be a witness to and a part of this renewal that we call spring. We, in the northland, offer no exceptions. The new hopes that come surging into our hearts are like the season—both universal and similar.

We do not bet on the horse races here, but we equal it with an ice pool. Bets are laid as to when the ice will break up and float away. At Nenana, on the mighty Yukon, some-

thing over \$100,000 is the usual pot.

Bets are so numerous that to accurately determine the winner, a pole is placed in the river each fall and kept there until freeze-up.

**Alarm Is Electric Clock**

A wire from this pole is attached to the alarm bell of an electric clock in some public place of business. When the ice shifts enough to move this pole a fraction, the alarm goes off and the clock stops on the split second.

Of course, there was no money in our little deal, there was only friendly rivalry as to who could guess nearest to the correct time.

Andrew, the native store manager, won last year.

R. W. and I had a ringside seat at the break-up. The moving ice caught two women and a man out fishing. As the cracks between shore and the floating ice began to widen, we watched Louisa Charles, our little five by five Eskimo grandmother, go in to "high gear." Her little sled with its load of fish must have decided that it was hooked to a runaway team.

After studying several cracks to see if she thought she could step across, she finally jumped off a floating cake and waded ashore, exclaiming emphatically as she came, mukluks, sled, and all, through the icy water.

I really would like to know what those Eskimo exclamations said. When I asked, a merry laugh was all the answer that I got.

### Farm Housing Loan Program Explained

An expanded farm housing loan program, designed to speed up farm building construction improvement as well as act as an additional anti-recession measure, was announced today by Walter T. McKay, Farmers Home Administration State Director, according to Jack Kassahn the agency's local County Supervisor.

Now an owner of a farm in agricultural production and on which the operator plans to produce at least \$400 worth of farm commodities for sale or home use may qualify for the 4 percent long-term housing loan provided that he meets other standard eligibility requirements.

Formerly an eligible applicant had to own a farm that produced a more substantial part of the operator's annual cash income.

Loans may be made to build, improve, or repair farm houses or other essential farm buildings, and to provide water for farmstead and household use.

Mr. Kassahn said that in addition to financing major construction, the loan funds can help meet many other needs for farm home modernization such as adding bathrooms, utility rooms, better kitchens, and many other improvements to the home as well as to farm service

buildings. While tenants and farm laborers are not eligible, the owner may borrow to do the construction work or make improvements for them.

The loans are made to farm owners who need credit to finance building improvements or repairs, but find that adequate credit is not available through banks or other regular credit channels. The interest rate is 4 percent and loans may be am-

ortized over periods up to 33 years.

Eligibility for loan assistance is determined by the three-member County Farmers Home Administration committee, and applications are now being accepted in FHA county offices.

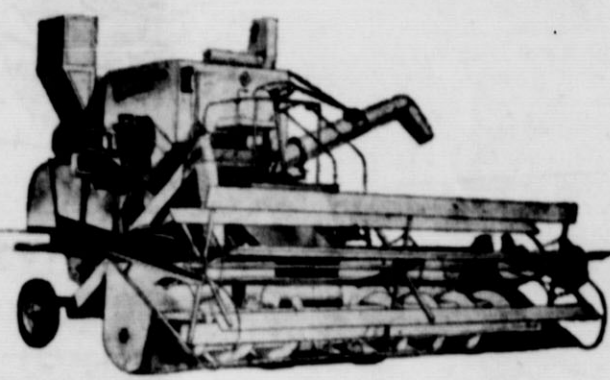
