Former Legislator Wins 5 of 7 Boxes In County's Most Pronounced Contest

DEMOCRACY functioned in Motley County Saturday with deliberate candor as more than 1000 qualified voters went to the polls and quietly selected the candidates of their choice in the Democratic primary. In many instances the differences in opinions crossed friendship lines, family lines, and probably the lines in individual households, due to the freedom of choice made possible by the secret ballot. Based on countywide interest the race between former legislator Elbert Reeves and incumbent Vance Gilbreath for the office of county judge was the most spectacular. Reeves defeated Gilbreath by 101 votes (unofficial) and carried five of


