

through a bar in the window he removed pipe from the plumbing and pried the bar until he was able to break it. Hoping to delay alarm of his escape he prepared an ingenious "dummy" to appear that he was sleeping in his bunk when his breakfast was delivered. Two rolled blankets made the legs while pillows were used to fashion the body. Smith, who had been convicted on several charges of forgery and worthless checks, plan ned his escape well. He tied lengths of the steel wire to two pieces of wood convenient to hold in his hands and by constant work was able to cut the soft iron bars according to assumption. He plaited strips cut from a mattress cover and tied the plaited extension to a chain removed from a cell bunk. He was brought here from Sweetwater about a month ago and had pled guilty to the charge of forging the name of J. C. Clark to a check .-- Photos by Douglas Meador
