

Prisoner Sees Way to Freedom

Thomas Jefferson Smith, 28, held in jail here awaiting sentence on a forgery charge, sawed his way out of the Motley county jail Saturday night. The jailbreak was discovered early Sunday by Dink Wilson, 10-year-old son of Deputy and Jailer Jinks Wilson, when he found the chain and plaited mattress strips dangling (third photo from left) from an east window of the jail. It was the county's first jailbreak since 1947. No report of the escaped prisoner had been received late yesterday, although peace officers throughout the state have been alerted to be on the lookout for him. Photo at right shows Sheriff Stotts measuring with his hand the hole through which Smith gained his freedom.

Smith was the jail's only prisoner. He is believed to have sawed his way to freedom with steel wire removed from a broom. After he had cut through a bar in the window he removed pipe from the plumbing and pried the bar until he was able to break it. Hoping to delay alarm of his escape he prepared an ingenious "dummy" to appear that he was sleeping in his bunk when his breakfast was delivered. Two rolled blankets made the legs while pillows were used to fashion the body. Smith, who had been convicted on several charges of forgery and worthless checks, planned his escape well. He tied lengths of the steel wire to two pieces of wood convenient to hold in his hands and by constant work was able to cut the soft iron bars according to assumption. He plaited strips cut from a mattress cover and tied the plaited extension to a chain removed from a cell bunk. He was brought here from Sweetwater about a month ago and had pled guilty to the charge of forging the name of J. C. Clark to a check.—Photos by Douglas Meador.

ANOTHER TROPHY has been added to the Tribune's collection of 1st place awards. In making the announcement that the Tribune had been awarded 1st place for advertising composition, Mr. Fox said one of the judges in the contest had written a letter in which he said: "The Matador Tribune stands head and shoulders above other papers in its class... this newspaper is produced in a community of approximately 1,300 while competing with other papers almost double its size."

Lions Keep 'Hands Off' On Closing

Matador stores and business places may close for Old Settlers one or both days or not at all. The Matador Lions Club will not make any suggestions. Closing for holidays and observances has in the past resulted in some controversy. Boss Lion John Stevens said Tuesday at the club's regular meeting. "It will be up to the manager of the business," Lion Stevens declared, "and we will maintain a strictly 'hands off' policy."

A brief survey Tuesday afternoon indicated that most places of business would probably close Thursday (Aug. 25) the first day of the two-day reunion, as has been the custom in past years. Memorial services for deceased pioneers are held at 11 a. m. Thursday, and the Old Settlers street parade is held on the morning of the first day.

District Governor Dub Nelson of Childress made the principal address at the Tuesday meeting. He was introduced by Lions Rep. Elbert Reeves and Deputy District Governor Forrest Campbell. Lion Farris Fish was program sponsor.

After paying tribute to the Matador club for its long record of community activities, Gov. Nelson declared his definition of Lionism as a fusion of the human and divine influences in a man's life. Visitors introduced included C. A. Thomas, Roscoe McWilliams of Washington, D. C.; O. F. Temple, Orvil Wells, Dallas, and Rev. Keith McCormick of Perryton.

Boss Lion Stevens announced that active club committees and other members would be invited to director breakfasts. He said the invited members would attend the breakfasts with full voting privileges of regular directors.

Grid Field To Get 2nd Grandstand

Work is scheduled to start this week on the 2nd grandstand for Burleson Field. The structure will be of steel and concrete with wood seats, almost identical to the new grandstand on the east side of the field.

Announcement was made Monday morning at Lions directors breakfast that sufficient funds had been raised (over \$1,800) to build the second grandstand on the west side of the field.

The funds were raised through subscription of \$10 each for reserve seat privileges for three years. The contribution did not include admission to any game but merely the right to a reserve seat.

The second grandstand will not be as large by 8 feet as the recently completed stand. It will be 72 feet in length as compared with 80 feet. Steel will be slightly lighter than that used in the first grandstand. It will have a seating capacity of approximately 500. The \$1,800 subscription did not include the total cost but made possible the letting of a contract.

Boss Lion John Stevens said that plans are being made for the construction of a press box, although details have not been worked out.

Pioneers Complete Plans

Two Hand-Made Saddles Top List In Attracting Rodeo Contestants

A PARADE starting in the business section of Roaring Springs at 10 o'clock Thursday (August 25) will begin the 32nd annual 2-day reunion of Motley-Dickens Counties Old Settlers Association. Wheels have been rolling in planning the meeting and a lot of wheels will roll early Thursday morning bringing the crowds to Pioneer Park for what promises to be the outstanding reunion in the organization's history.

Rep. Elbert Reeves, President of the pioneer group, told the Tribune late yesterday that with the exception of a few details, the program is complete. He said the directors will meet tonight at the Pavilion to iron out a few problems which always arise on the eve of the reunion. He said it would be the final meeting before the reunion opens.

Many a cowhand has looked at the two expensive hand-made saddles displayed for several weeks in the Moore building here in Matador. They are the top prizes in the amateur rodeo contests. One of the saddles was made by Carl Darr of Paducah and it will be given as first prize for the best time in the old men's (55 and over) break-away roping. The other saddle was made by Matador's own famous saddle-maker, H. H. Schweitzer, and it will be given for the prize in the regular cowboy roping contests. Both saddles are appropriately stamped for the event. Three handsome belt buckles, made of silver and gold are also embossed especially for the event. Other prizes include three pairs of spurs, three bridle bits and a Navajo saddle blanket. The matinee roping will be held daily at 2 p. m. with the main rodeo events starting both evenings at 7:30. Cash prizes up to \$60 will be paid in the roping contests each evening.

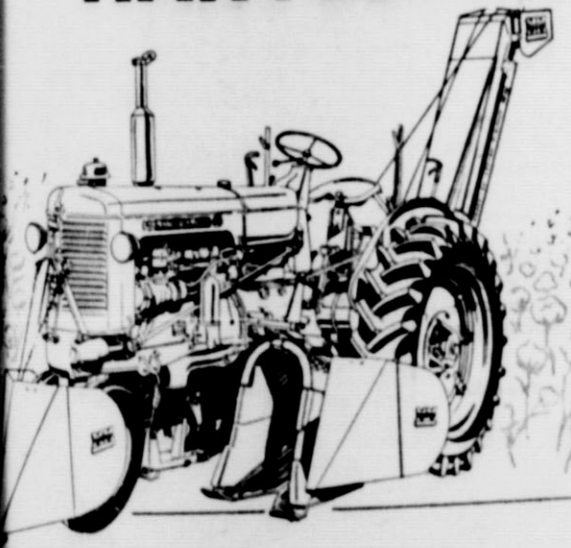

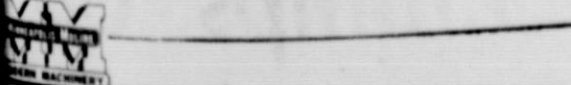

Two readers saved recipes for sourdough bread, from the Tribune pioneer issue of August 28, 1947, and have obligingly supplied us with these.

Mrs. Louis (Audie) Poteet called in, and Mrs. Wes (Susie) Hall brought her clipping by the office.

We had forgotten, but there was a time when people made their own yeast, using cornmeal and other home ingredients which they made into cakes that were allowed to sour and harden

SOUR DOUGH BISCUITS

The "Everlasting Yeast" which was published is as follows:

Take 2 cups of flour and 2 1/2 cups water and mix thoroughly and add 1 cake yeast. Cover and let stand (one or two days) until it starts rising. Then add 1 cup water and enough flour to make a stiff batter. Let stand two or three hours, or until mixture has doubled in size.

DOUGH: Take half of the sponge (leaving other half in original container for future use. For each successive use, add flour and water to retain sponge making a stiff batter as before) and add 1 teaspoon soda, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, 2 tablespoons sugar, 2 tablespoons shortening. Mix well and add enough flour to make a stiff dough. Knead thoroughly and make into biscuits. Place in greased pan and let rise 2 hours before baking in

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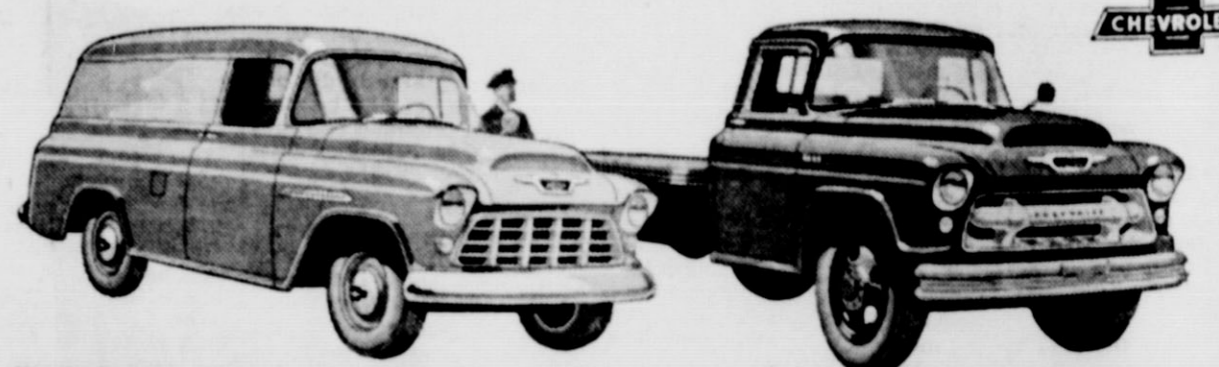
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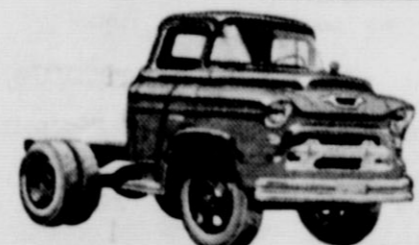
