## McMurry Band to Present Concert

McMurry College (Abilene) Indian Band will present a concert here Monday at 10 A.M. in the high school auditorium. The band is directed by Raymond T. Bynum. The program will be open to the public, school officials announced.

The concert here will be one of the best which the band will give on a four-day winter tour of West Texas cities. Traveling in two Flexible buses owned by McMurry College, the 54-piece band will also play in Hamlin, Spur, Lockrey, Abernathy, Littlefield, Levelland, Lamesa and Snyder.

Bynum said that some of the numbers to be played by the band are the same as those used last spring on its 16-day concert and eight-city tour of five European capital cities.

The concert will get underway with a brass fanfare by the band's six herald trumpets. After this, the musical program will open with the march, "Emblem of Unity," and the overture "The Beautiful Galatea."

Several instrumental soloists will be featured on the band's winter tour, including Bob New, cornetist; Stella Bergen, alto saxophone; Don Davis, trombone; Audrey Carver, marimba; and Peggy Campbell, vibraphone.

Additional variety is supplied by a cornet trio playing "The Three Modernaires," a piccolo bassoon duet on "The Cricket and the Bullfrog," and numerous sambas, mambos, and other Latin-American rhythms.

Dorothy King, soprano, a featured vocalist on the band's European tour, will sing "Sweethearts," from the operetta "Maytime."

Holiday flavors of the Christmas season will be added to the program with a vocal trio rendition of "Winter Wonderland" by the Campbell sisters, band members from Lamesa.

Bynum has been a professor of instrumental music and director of the band at McMurry College since 1946. Prior to that he served 20 years in the Abilene Public School system, directing the Abilene High School Eagle Band, all-girls' band, orchestra, and conducting the instrumental music program of the city's entire school system.

During that period, some 2,000 different pupils received musical training under his baton.

## MOTLEY PIONEER MRS. J. W. CHALKE DIES IN DALLAS

Mrs. Mary E. Chalke, 86, Motley County pioneer, died Sunday Dec. 4, in a Dallas hospital following a long illness. She was the widow of the late John W. Chalke, pioneer West Texas rancher and ex-U. S. Marshal, who died Sept. 29, 1929.

Mrs. Chalke, whose residence was at 3629 Overbrook Drive, was born in Dallas County, March 25, 1869. She was married to the late Mr. Chalke in Roby, Texas, in 1889, and they lived in Motley County, Texas, where he operated a ranch. He later founded the town of Roaring Springs, 8 miles south of here.

The couple moved to Dallas in 1921, where Mr. Chalke served as deputy marshal during the tenure of the late Sam Gross. Services for Mrs. Chalke were held at 1 p. m. Monday at the S. Park man-Bran and Funeral Chapel, with the Very Rev. Dean Gerald G. Moore of St. Matthew's Episcopal Cathedral officiating. Burial was in Restland Memorial Park.

Survivors include four daughters, Mrs. T. M. Cullum Jr., Mrs. Knox Ramsey and Mrs. Russell Allen, all of Dallas, and Mrs. Frank R. Ramsey of Port Arthur; two sons, Victor M. Chalke of Dallas, and Walter A. Chalke of Lubbock; 14 grandchildren, and 11 great-grandchildren.

Pallbearers were C. C. Renfro, W. S. Skiles, Knox Ramsey, A. W. Cullum III, Joel Sandoz, and Dr. John R. Chalke.

## Santa Rides The Skies To Alaska Lions' Gifts On Way To Remote Eskimo Village

SANTA is on his way to the far north to make a special delivery of Christmas presents to children in an Eskimo village almost in the shadow of the North Pole. He is being sponsored on the trip by the Matador Lions Club, the First Baptist Church and some women members of the church.

For several years a "bush pilot" flying in the area of Elm, Alaska had provided Christmas presents for the children of the impoverished little fishing community. Last year he was killed in a plane accident. Mrs. Mary White, former teacher here, is teaching a school of about 40 pupils in Elm, on the Bering Sea almost within sight of Soviet Russia. She was aware of the bleak Christmas which the children faced, and wrote friends here.

The Lions Club decided to play Santa to the children of Elm, but transportation became the problem. Air express is 80c per pound. Finally the club was able to secure the cooperation of an air line flying between Seattle and Nome. The air line offered to fly the Christmas cargo free of charge.

The Lions, looking at their resources, realized they must raise some money to buy presents. At the Monday morning director's breakfast Lion Dr. Denney triggered the fund raising when he contributed \$50. The fund-raising was carried on into the regular Tuesday meeting, and with a contribution from the Baptist Church, a total of \$218 was deposited to a special Christmas account. The Alaskan Christmas gifts cost \$102. Socks, gloves, candy and nuts have been ordered from a Sears of Seattle to be delivered to the airline. In addition, a group of women members of the Baptist Church have purchased small toys for pre-school children and sent them by air mail to Elm.

The Lions will use the balance of the fund for local Christmas projects, a traditional custom with the civic club.

Unless they receive a bowl bid, it will be the Matadors' final game of the year. The Wilson team has played and won ten games this season. It will be the second time the Matadors have played against "Mustangs" (they defeated the Wheeler Mustangs 27-18).

Backing the Matadors in their final bid for top honors, local business firms are going to close at noon Friday. Except for the weather factor, it is probable that most of the town's adult population will see the game.

Wilson landed in the regional playoff by being ahead, 6-3, on penetrations after tying Kress 13-13 in their bi-district game, November 24.

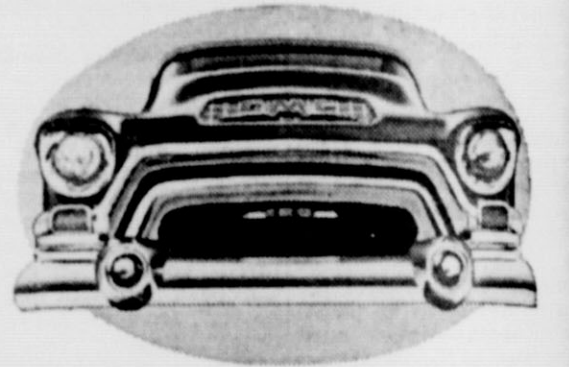

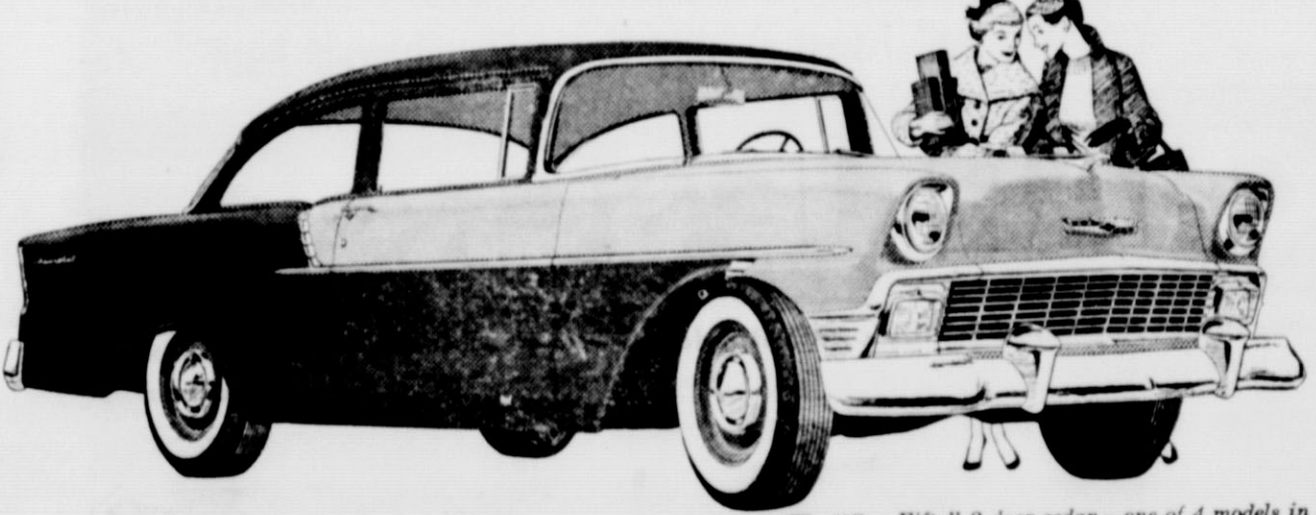

# Elementary Elim

The Diary of Mary White

August 8, 1955, Monday.  
Temperature 70 degrees.

Another bright and shining day. Spent most of the day looking through the files. Finally caught on to this cataloguing system. Now perhaps I can search intelligently for what I want. There are so many forms I have to keep that I need a course in how to fill out government form number so-and-so. I must get some of the papers that have come since the other teacher left, filed but I'm afraid I'll do it wrong, so am putting it off until I have time to study some more. The only one I'm sure of is the time sheet to send to the payroll clerk. Ha!

About nine o'clock this evening an Eskimo woman knocked on my door and said her sister was sick. Then she proceeded to stand there and see what I was going to do about it. I felt like the little boy with the red wag, on who said, "O Dod, what do I do now?" I soon discovered that her sister was Mrs. David Sauchs, the postmaster's wife. I asked if she had fever—the woman didn't know. Did she have a sore throat—didn't know. I finally gave her a fever thermometer and told her to take the sick woman's fever. The woman couldn't read the thermometer, so she brought it back to me. Jumpin' Jimminy—her fever was 104. I decided she must have something besides a cold. The transmitter on our set is out and I couldn't call the nurse so I did all that I knew to do. I gave

her two aspirins with instructions to take them every three hours until morning, then we would see. By this time it was 9:20 p. m. so Dr. White closed her clinic and went to bed.

R. W. played with the radio for a while. It will receive but not send. He heard Jack Jenkins our boss in Nome, but couldn't make him hear us. Such luck!

August 9, 1955, Tuesday.  
Temp. 50; cloudy and windy.

As I was helping the bucket brigade up the hill this morning about 9:00 o'clock that woman (can't pronounce her name) intercepted me. I gave her the thermometer and the reading was 102 degrees. At 12:00 it was 104 again. My guess (can hardly give it the dignity of a name like diagnosis) was pneumonia. I was worried because I could see that they expected me to do something. There was penicillin in the clinic but printed on the box was "WARNING: Against the law to administer without a doctor's order". Moses Point is a C. A. station twelve miles up the way David agreed to walk there and have them send my message in. I was surprised he did not go by motor boat for I knew that he had one. Then he pointed to the white caps on the waves and said the water was too rough. Finally, however, he decided to try the boat because it was so much faster. I watched him while he went around the cliffs out of sight and that little Eskimo man is a very brave and skilled boatsman. Those waves were tossing that canoe-sized craft around like a match stem.

At times it seemed to be standing straight on end. I saw the spray completely cover him several times. Boy, when I start across that I want a submarine. However he made it and got my message through and one back to me. He walked back and got here with the instructions to give the penicillin. I gave the shot about 9:30 p. m. Nurse Jane Fuzzy Wuzzy could have done better and would not have been half as scared. There will be other shots before she is well so I'll just grit my teeth and pretend I like it.

As a side light, this pup we have is doing the usual pup way—crying all the time. I kept calling him cry baby and "that woman" told us how to say it in Eskimo. She couldn't spell it, so I'm guessing. It is Kitoole (long i and toole rhymes with coolie). That is his official name now, so when you read of Kitoole just remember the pup.

August 10 and 11, 1955:  
Wednesday and Thursday  
Nothing except routine work on these two days.

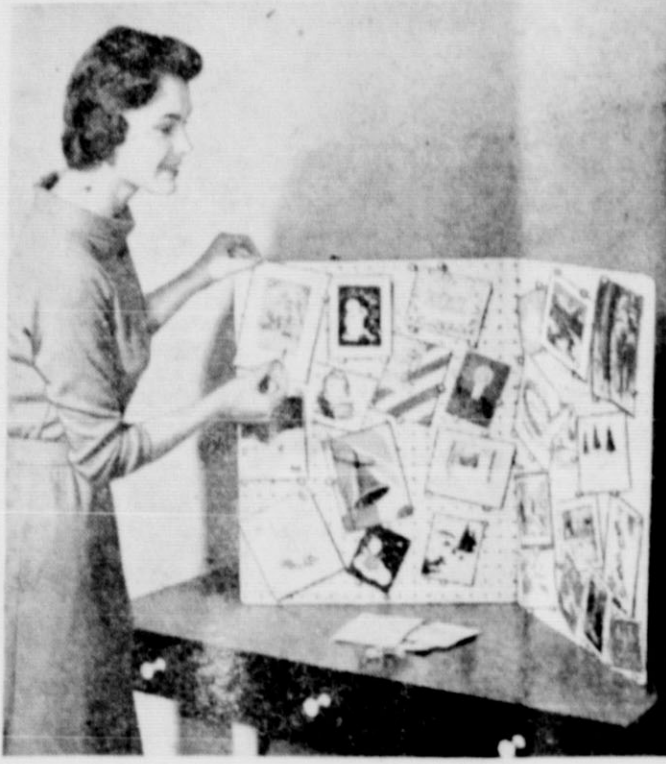
August 12, 1955, Friday A bright clear day. Temp. 63 degrees.  
I sincerely wish that I had the ability to describe our sensations on this day. The mail came about eleven o'clock. We devoured the letters, papers and our packages from Sears with the long handles and the home barber kit. Aha!

The sea was considered very calm but it hardly seems to me in a small boat. An Eskimo named Harry Moore took us across. About half-way across he yelled loudly and cut the motor on the boat. I nearly swallowed my tongue. He had seen a porpoise playing and wanted us to look off to the side of the boat. He didn't want to scalp us after all!

There are seven families from the states stationed at Moses Point and as we drew near I began to wonder just what kind of people we would meet.

Harry took us to the post office which is in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Raines, from Goodland, Kansas. Yes, you guessed it. They were acquainted with Fred and Helen Sanders from Flag Springs and Matador (Former Helen Simpson and her husband "Sandy" Sanders). Small world! Where would one go to get away?

Two families are from Fort Worth. The chief radio technician, Bob Priest, is from Portland, Oregon and his helper is a boy going to the University of

Washington and working each summer to help with expenses.

We ate supper with the Raines—fresh pork chops, bakery bread and all. We had a wonderful visit. Saw the movie "Robin Hood" starring Richard Todd. Came home about eleven with the light from the setting sun still glowing on the northwest side of the mountain and beginning to show the light of a rising sun on the northeast side of the mountain. Did you ever try riding across the waters of the Bering Sea at night in an Eskimo canoe? Try it sometime. The daylight is all up in the skies and as you ride the swells the water looks like black satin. Guess I should have been scared but I was never more at peace with the world.

August 13, 1955, Saturday.  
Cloudy; Temp. 55 degrees.

This was wash day and there is absolutely nothing new or exciting to tell about such a day in Eskimo land. The machine works, thank goodness, and there was water in the reservoir. August 14, 1955, Sunday; Hazy clouds; Gale blowing from east.

While sitting at the table eating a late Sunday breakfast, R. W. discovered two white men walking up the path. They were Bob Priest and Lee Cole, the technician and the engineering

student from Seattle. They spent the day, and what a hilarious day it was.

Their feet were wet from wading the creek so they proceeded to off with the footgear and go barefooted all day. Bob worked on this transmitter and radio. No tubes to replace ruined ones. Drat that man again—why didn't he keep a few spares on hand? He also led Marelda a dog's life with his teasing and gave Theretha a birthday spank before her birthday. The waves got too rough for them to hire a boat to take them back for the sea was fairly "frothing at the mouth" from that strong east wind, so they set out afoot to go around the shoreline. They left here about eight and got in about eleven thirty. Oh, my dogs!

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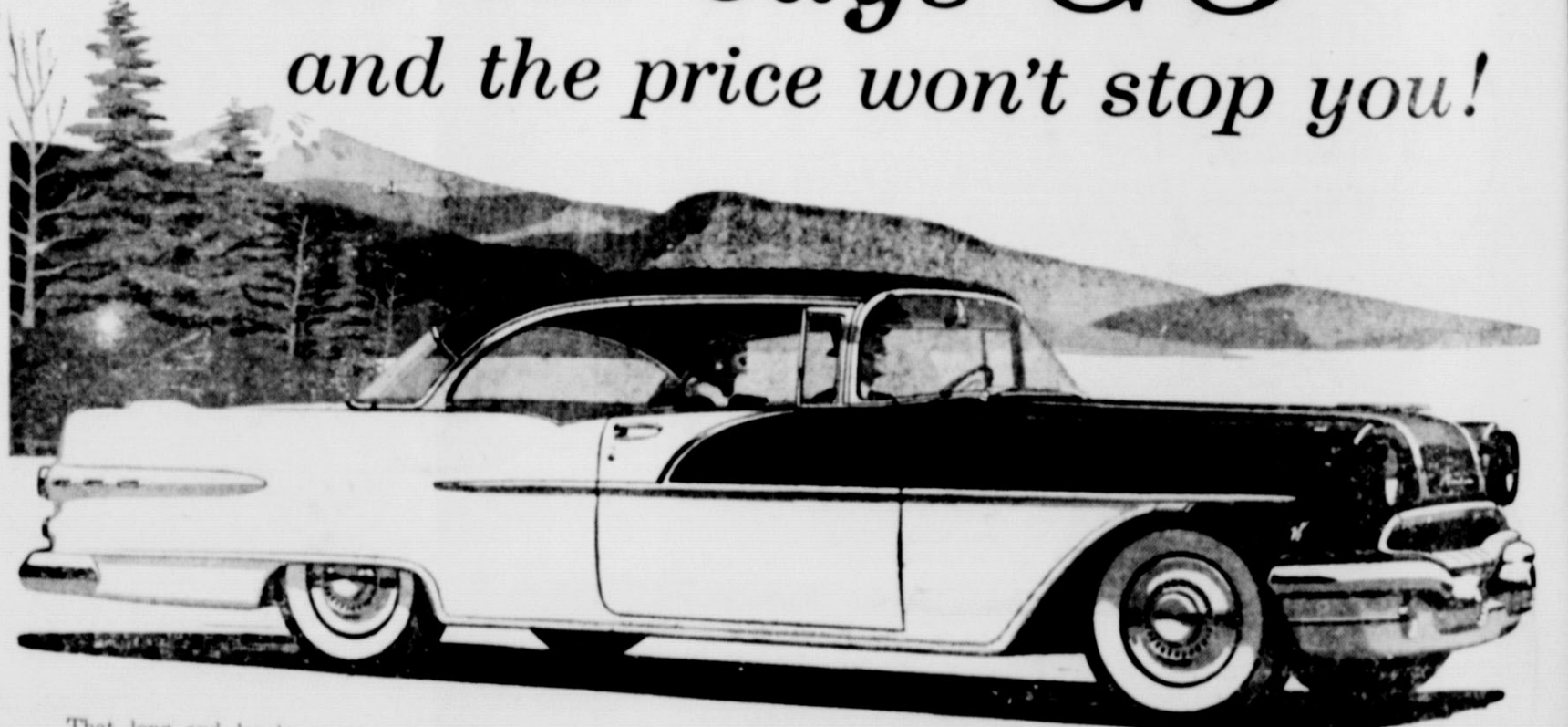

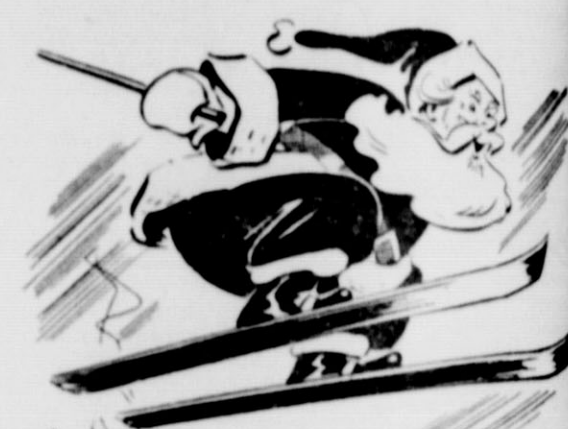
