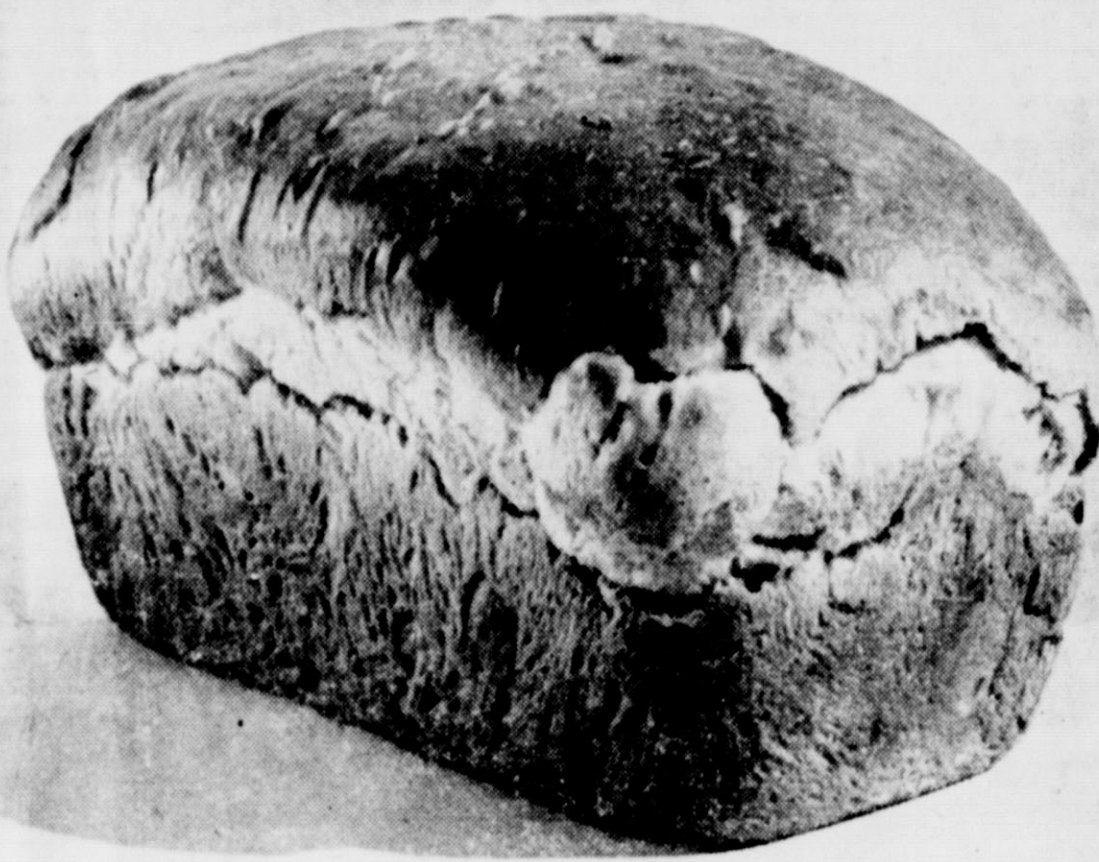

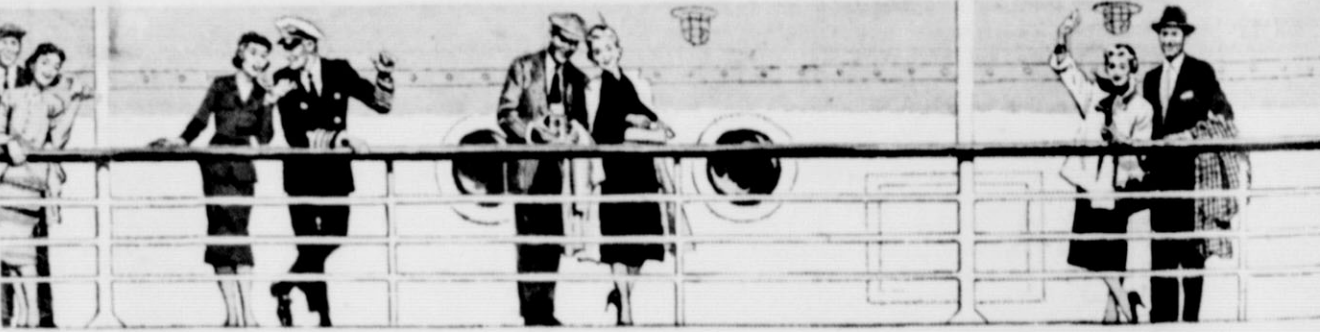

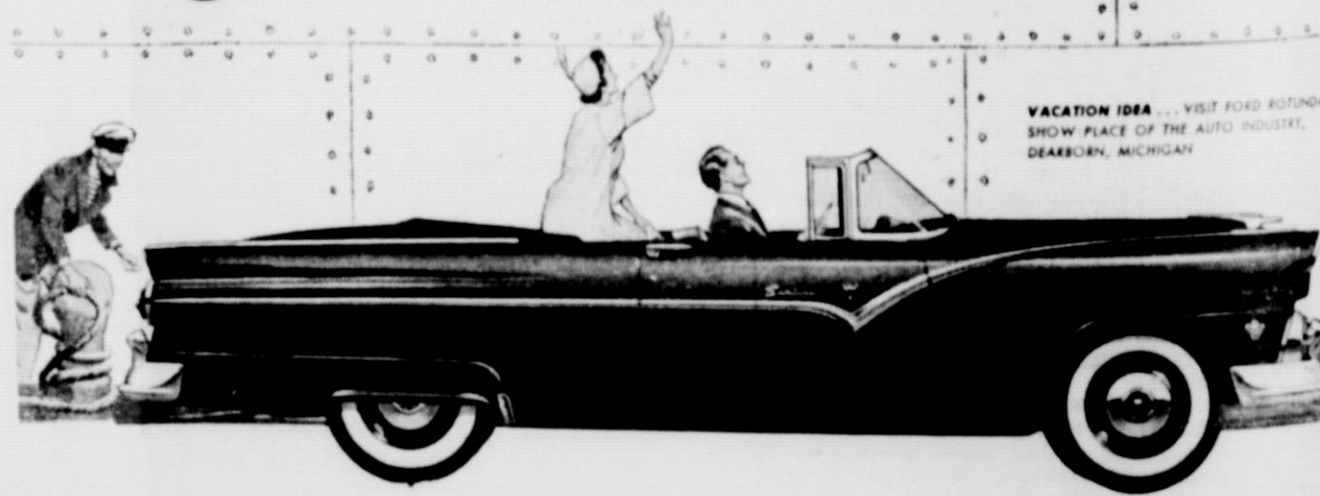

Season Here Again  
Farmers can deal even Texans of misery. Although it is not practical to control all summer, entomologists say that 50 to 75 cents of toxaphene or chloroform will kill the red bugs on average home lawn for seven days.  
A scheme is suggested to planning an occasional party or other out-of-door activity. Or apply the insecticides to areas where the kids or plays in the yard.  
A pound of five percent

dust of either of the insecticides applied to 1,000 square feet of lawn area is recommended. The dusts are available from most feed, drug and grocery stores.

**Cottonseed Products Cause Off-Colored Yolks In Eggs**

Eggs having off-colored yolks usually can be traced to hens fed cottonseed products. Such eggs appearing in Texas retail markets in recent weeks are objectionable to consumers.  
No more than five per cent cottonseed meal in a hen's ration may cause yolk discoloration, particularly if the eggs are stored. Discolored yolks appear motley, olive to greenish-brown or even black in color.  
Most cases of such yolks are traced to hens having access to cattle or hog feeding operations where a cottonseed product is being fed. In other instances, the hens are eating cottonseed hulls used as nesting litter.  
Some farmers mix their own poultry laying rations and use cottonseed meal unaware of its influence on yolk color. Poultry scientists at Texas A&M College do not recommend its use in laying rations and advise shell egg producers to check any supply of cottonseed products that may lower egg quality by affecting yolk color.

**Loafing Hens Expensive**

A hen that lays 250 eggs a year eats only 25 to 26 pounds of feed more than one that doesn't lay an egg. A four pound non-laying hen will eat about 56

pounds of feed a year, while the same bird that lays 250 eggs yearly will consume about 81 pounds.

Feed costs make up 60 per cent or more of the total cost of producing eggs. By culling closely, producers can cut feed costs per dozen eggs and help maintain their profits, he adds.

Go along the roost at night with a flashlight and check the health signs of hens in production. Look for enlarged combs and wattles with a bright red color. They feel soft and waxy.

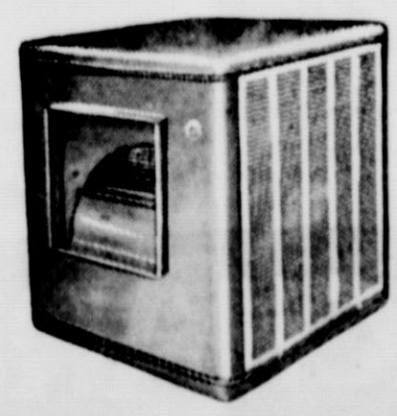

## Former Flomot Resident With Oklahoma Investigation Bureau On Hagler Case

(Editors Note: A former Flomot man, Ivan Gates of the Oklahoma Bureau of Investigation has had an active part in working on the still unsolved identity of murder victim in the David F. Hagler case. Following feature about Gates is by John Masterman, staff writer on the Amarillo Daily News.)

Mrs. Ivan Gates is not a nag, but readers of the woman's page would probably understand when she says to her husband, "Do you suppose we could sit down and have a meal without Hagler being with us?" (At this point, woman's page readers might beat move on. This is not a pretty story.)

**IVAN GATES** is an officer of the Oklahoma Bureau of Investigation, the Sooner state's counterpart of the Texas Rangers. He was born in Flomot and went to school in Matador on the South Plains of Texas before he went to Oklahoma.

Now, he is absorbed in the most fantastic murder mystery of his long career as a crime fighter. He has traveled 25,000 miles and talked with hundreds of people attempting to learn, not who killed, but who was killed.

Early last October, the station wagon owned by the former wife of David F. Hagler Jr., Ft. Worth asphalt company executive, burst into flames near Davis, Okla. Hagler had borrowed the car a week before.

**THE CHARED REMAINS** of a man were found inside. At first the dead man was believed to be Hagler—but there was one clue to indicate definitely that Hagler was not the man! A dental bridge. Later, Hagler turned up alive and with an abill.

This is the clue, as described by Gates.

"A nine-tooth, three-abutment unit, with two white gold cuspid crowns, with yellow gold shell crown molar, with steel golf-club backing, heavily reinforced with yellow gold solder, with gray true-bite facing."

Who wore a bridge like that? It is an obsession with Gates to find the answer. The knowledge, when he has it, will not be important to the murder trial of David F. Hagler Jr.

## A MAN IS DEAD

The victim of murder it will not be necessary for Oklahoma prosecutors to prove who the dead man was—they must show only that Hagler, or someone, killed him.

The Oklahomans are impatient to try the case. But Hagler has successfully fought extradition from Texas to Oklahoma to stand trial, and until he is remanded to the custody of Oklahoma authorities, he is free in Fort Worth on bail.

Trial or no trial, Agent Gates' work goes on.

"Really, the objective now is to alleviate the worry of families who have lost touch with their relatives. If you could see the number of letters that come in from people who say they're missing the murdered man was their son, or their husband..."

Gates wants to help these people.

**SEVERAL MONTHS AGO** he went to see an elderly mother and father in South Texas. After hours of conversation, Gates was able to persuade them that their missing son was not the murdered man. "The woman broke down in tears," Gates said, "and told me, 'I haven't been able to sleep since this happened.'"

But until Gates answers that question, an agonizing doubt will linger in the minds of many families.

Who was the man? He had to be under 35 or 36 years of age," Gates said. "He was not an alcoholic, he was not a narcotic. He had had tuberculosis at one time, but it apparently cleared up without medical attention. He had not been on an alcoholic binge."

**THESE AUTOPSY** findings do not mean he was not drunk before he was murdered. The Oklahoma officers believe he was wafted away from a Fort Worth tavern and burned to death while he lay in a drunken stupor.

Frank A. St. Clair, a used car dealer of Irving, described in detail planning that Hagler allegedly made for the murder which had, St. Clair said, an insurance swindle as the motive.

Much of what St. Clair revealed in a written statement has not been released by Oklahoma investigators. St. Clair himself is dead. He took his own life after he became involved in the case, but personally exonerated of guilt.

**ONE OF THE MOST** significant bits of evidence against Hagler, agents say, concerns the

way in which the victim was killed. The Oklahoma Bureau of Investigation learned these details.

The back seat of the station wagon had been removed. According to Gates, 23 five-gallon bottles containing white gasoline were shoved into the rear of the station wagon. Gates says the bureau knows that Hagler bought the gasoline, knows where he bought it, and has the sales slip to prove it.

This fuel turned the car into an incinerator. But not enough of one for the murderer's purposes, Gates said, if he had planned to destroy all evidence.

**THE HEAT** inside the car—1,300 degrees—melted the 23 bottles which contained the gasoline. But it was not enough to melt the dental bridge. For that, 2,200 degrees of heat would have been needed, according to Gates.

Gates carries the bridge in his pocket. He has checked hundreds of Southwestern dentists. Late last December he made a trip to Monterrey, Mexico, to check one lead. He has been in the Rio Grande from El Paso to the Gulf of Mexico.

"I show them to every dentist I meet," Gates said.

"We know that any dentist who has ever seen those teeth will never forget them. Part of the bridge is made of a metal used commonly by French dentists. Any dentist who has ever worked on this man would be able to help us."

"If we could only find that dentist..."

General Patrick Jay Hurley, U.S. Army retired, will deliver McMurry's commencement address at 10 a. m. Monday, May 23. The baccalaureate sermon will be delivered Sunday, May 22, at 8 a. m. by the Rev. Jordan Grooms, pastor of the First Methodist Church of Big Spring.

McMurry College will confer honorary doctor's degrees upon four Methodist ministers and two outstanding laymen at the commencement ceremonies.

Hollowell, San Antonio, and the Rev. Earl Nowlin, bad, New Mexico.

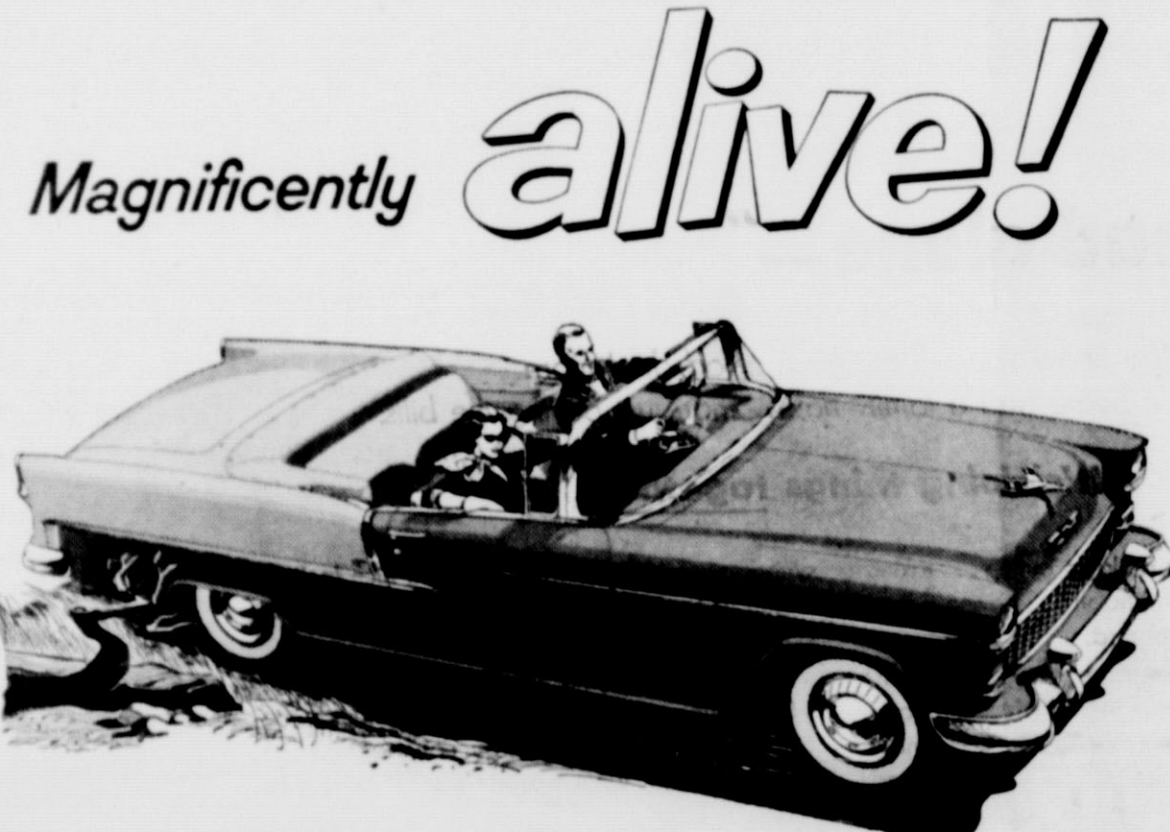

mother cows left young calves. **Make Examinations** Bill Moss, vocational agriculture teacher here, took his class to the Henderson ranch to make investigations. He said the cattle had died of poison but that it was impossible to determine what had caused the poison. He said he believed the green cockleburrs had caused the deaths.

Mr. Henderson said three or four causes might have resulted in the death of his cattle. He said there was some young Johnson grass, green cockleburrs in abundance and a new shipment of hay he had bought for his cattle. He considered the possibility that something in the hay might have brought about the deaths, altho he was inclined to believe the green cockleburrs were responsible.

County Agent Palmeyer said in some instances there was a possibility that green shinnery scrub oak might have killed the cattle but that he believed the cockleburrs responsible.

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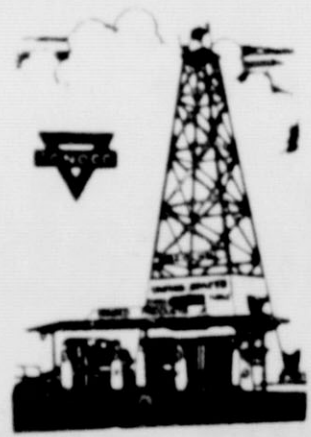
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
