Legend under the photo read as follows: "PLENTY OF ROARING SPRINGS, TEXAS, BEING EXAMINED BY DR. WEDENBERGER OF BAYONNE, N. J. FOR A BULLET WOUND RECEIVED AS U. S. MARINES FIGHTED ON CHANGJIN RESERVOIR IN KOREA. MITCHELL WALKED TO THE AIR STATION 11 HOURS AFTER BEING WOUNDED IN THE EARLY PART OF THE WAR."

Intestinal "Flu" Epidemic Starts Poisoning Scare

An epidemic of intestinal "flu" which is sweeping West Texas has caused a "food poisoning" scare in Matador. A check of the two hospitals here yesterday tends to place the responsibility on intestinal "flu".

Dr. Albert Traweck, City Health Officer, said the number of cases being treated for intestinal disorder (bacillary dysentery) was reaching epidemic proportions, with patients from distant areas. He said the symptoms were identical to those of patients who first believed they suffered from food poisoning.

"We don't know the disorders are being caused from food contamination," Dr. Traweck declared.

Carried on the wings of rumor here over the week-end, people were reported stricken with food poisoning and meeting with fatal results. Most of the reports were baseless, except that a number of people were suffering with stomach disorder at the same time.

"It is unfair to say that any public eating place might be the point of origin for the cases," Dr. Traweck said. "I am convinced Matador cafes are above the average with regard to cleanliness and general sanitation."

"In most instances when a patient is stricken with intestinal 'flu' or other disorder it is natural to associate his condition with the last public eating place he visited. We have, however, several cases that have not visited any public eating places."

Dr. J. S. Stanley said he had treated several cases of stomach disorder and four or five required hospitalization.

CLAUD MARTIN IS VICTIM OF HEART ATTACK

Conference Minutes Reveal Much Progress Organization of Methodist Church

EDITORS NOTE: Following the minutes of the local conference of the Matador Methodist Church was prepared by E. Hamilton and published in the Pioneer Edition of the Tribune August 31, 1939. Several members mentioned then, have since passed away.)

The minutes of an old Quarterly conference record found in the archives of the local pastor of the Guthrie Vernon district, reported to the 4th Quarterly conference held at Dickens on October 13, 1892, that during the quarter he took into church by letter:

Mr. Morris held a revival during the summer of 1892, under a group of cotton-trees on Ballard creek near the Wason home. At that time the persons named were organized into the church. Three of the six charter members, Mrs. F. M. Jenkins (Edmondson), Mrs. C. D. (Ida Edmondson), and Melbie T. Wason are yet in members of this church after 47 years, 30 per cent of the charter members are still living. (Editors Note: Mrs. Wason passed away June 25, 1948). Church Building

At that time Matador was only

bridges or even culverts spanning the streams, we naturally assume that this worthy servant of the Gospel obtained his hire by boarding with his family around among the faithful.

At the fourth conference, Wm. Wason was elected Sunday School superintendent. Tradition tells us he organized the first Sunday School at Matador and guided its destinies for many years, but whether it was conducted as a strictly Methodist school or not, this writer has been unable to learn.

In 1899 Mr. Wason was still superintendent, and non-sectarian literature was being used in the Sunday School. People of all denominations attended, and officers and teachers were members of both the Baptist and Methodist churches. Everything was harmonious, although the school would run on for two or three hours sometimes before the spirit would move us to break up. Several times we recall that we were forcibly reminded of that good old song, "How Tedious and Tasteless the Hours."

Church Is Built

In 1900 a new church was built under the supervision of T. N. Edmondson, with Rev. C. A. Clark as pastor. It was a frame structure about 30x50 feet and in later years a shed room was added, running entirely across the west end, which was utilized as a Sunday School room.

Although this building was built as a Methodist church, all denominations contributed liberally to it, especially our Baptist friends. It was the first, and for several years the only house of worship in town, and was used a year or two by the Baptists, Rev. W. H. Rattan being their pastor at that time.

The Sunday School remained non-sectarian until 1901, when Brother A. Kansler, a German blacksmith, was elected Methodist superintendent by the conference. He began organizing the Sunday School into a strictly Methodist institution, with Teutonic thoroughness, very much as the Kaiser would have re-organized his army—without loss of time.

Brick Building Erected

Many grumblings and considerable criticism met his efforts, but he paid them no mind. The Baptists soon withdrew and organized their own school at the schoolhouse. The old Methodist church was used until 1926, when it was sold, and the present brick building was erected.

Much credit is due the efforts of Mr. Edmondson, who was the moving spirit in the building of the first church building; the people generally over the county were liberal in subscribing both money and labor towards its construction.

Since Quarterly conference records have not been preserved we are indebted to the late F. M. Jenkins and his wife, Mrs. Wason, and others for much information bearing on early church activities here.

The imposing brick structure that is now the Methodist church is a monument to the integrity and courage of those pioneer citizens who organized the church so many years ago.
