Due to the warmth in the ground, the snow melted rapidly on paving and did not pose a serious travel problem. While it was accompanied by some wind, it did not compare with the terrific winds of the preceding storm and only slight drifting resulted. The moisture content of the estimated 2 inches of snow amounted to .10-inch.

Irrigation Meeting Siated for Farmers

Motley County farmers interested in irrigation are urged to attend a meeting at the courthouse in Matador, Thursday night March 18, starting at 7:00 according to an announcement by County Agent Bill Pallmeyer.

Leon New, area Irrigation Specialist of the Extension Service, stationed at Lubbock will present information of vital importance to all irrigation farmers. Some of the subjects to be covered will include: water holding capacity of soils, how much to apply per application, and how often to water; water requirement of plants and critical times on need; irrigation methods and systems; and general irrigation information.

"Irrigation farmers who are not receiving returns expected from the use of irrigation water should attend and see if it is possible for them to increase their net returns by adopting proven practices," Pallmeyer said.

Father-Son Speaker Says Future Secure

YOUNG PEOPLE of today are equal to the challenges of the future, according to Spencer Guimarin of Austin, Director of Texas Hospital Association, who made the principal address Friday night at the 34th annual Father-Son Banquet.

A talented entertainer, Guimarin is in demand throughout the country and speaks to a quarter of a million young people yearly. He was introduced by Boss Lion Wayland Moore following the banquet held in the First Baptist Church basement. The room was filled almost to capacity with fathers and sons.

Church Of Christ To Hold Revival

"A completely open, sincere and earnest study of God's word is our goal," said Minister Pringle. "It is the only real solution to all our problems. Come and bring your Bibles and let us search the scriptures to prove all things. Bring your pencils and paper and take notes. We do most sincerely and humbly want to teach and learn the truth on every subject. Life is short, eternity has no end."

The meeting was concluded with the Scout benediction.

Ben Charles Grundy served well as Master of Ceremonies in the church auditorium before the banquet. Singing of "America" was led by Lion J. R. Whitworth and the invocation was by Lion Rev. Gene Joplin.

Starting the program with the singing of popular songs and accompanying himself on his guitar, Guimarin told a series of stories that produced resounding applause, before the serious portion of his address.

"Don't worry about the future," Guimarin said, "I work with young people every day, and they are equal to the challenges in front of them. They are by far the most intelligent young people the world has ever known. They are aware of the problems in the future but they are better equipped for meeting the situation than their fathers and grandfathers. They are serious youngsters, bent on educating themselves for the problems they will face... we hear only of the bad things young people do, but little of the great advances the vast majority is making..."

"I tell you boys listening to me tonight that you are living in the greatest age man has ever known... remember that the greatest threat to your future will come from within and that you will make the new frontier."

"I believe that God is the God of the Universe and not merely of the world and that space is the new frontier... I am convinced that other planets have people, perhaps with greater intelligence than we have attained... radio messages have been received in this country and in Russia that scientists have not been able to decode, but justify this statement..."

The meeting was concluded with the Scout benediction.

Final Rites Today for Mrs. Marvin Patton

NATIVE of Motley County, Mrs. Marvin S. Patton, 71, died at her home early Tuesday morning apparently of a heart attack. She had spent her entire life here. Her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. D. C. Keith was the first couple married in Motley County. Her grandparents, the late Mr. and Mrs. P. A. Cribbs were among the first families to come to this area.

Funeral services will be held at 11 a.m. today in the First Baptist Church, with the pastor, Rev. Gene Joplin, officiating. Burial will be in East Mound Cemetery. Seigler Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements.

Possessed of a unique sense of humor, Mrs. Patton gave laughter to her friends, often while in the course of conversation. She gave herself in service for many, and especially the senior citizens of the community.

She volunteered her services to the Tribune during World War II to assist in getting the hometown news to over 800 boys and men

from Motley County who were in uniform, often working through the night on Wednesdays in order to get the Tribune in the mail. She termed this her work in the war effort. In addition, she spent many hours writing to the servicemen, most of whom she had known since they were small boys.

The former Helen Keith was born April 2, 1899 at Rustler Camp on the Matador Ranch, her father being an early-day cowboy for the Matadors. She graduated from Matador High School in 1918. She was married to Marvin Patton, December 25, 1920, in Matador and they continued to make this their home. She passed away on March 2, 1971.

Survivors include her husband, a son, Keith of Matador; two brothers, D. P. Keith and Charles Keith, and a sister, Miss Mary Keith, all of Matador.

Pallbearers will be Mike Hoyle, Howard Edmondson, Clyde Gilbert, Melvin Meason, Algie Groves and Douglas Meador.

Message Lauds the 'Now Generation'

A MESSAGE directed to youth of the community, in union services Sunday night at the First United Methodist Church, paid tribute to the 'Now Generation.'

"Now" is the only time concept which our young people know and accept... and I agree with them," said Rev. Gene Joplin, pastor of the First Baptist Church and speaker for the occasion.

He pointed out that 'now' is important, and read from the scriptures, "... now is the accepted time; behold, now is the day of salvation."

Taking his text from II Corinthians, 6:1-2, Rev. Joplin stressed the urgency of the present, and the need to be conscious of ones responsibilities. He pursued the thought of the abundant life and warned his listeners that "Happiness is not found in the abundance of material things, but is gained only through seeking after spiritual things."

He admonished adults to help young people, and to encourage instead of criticizing them. "Youth are the hope of tomorrow. They will be our leaders, in the church,

The offering for the evening went to a fund for Boy Scout and Cub Scout activities. First service honoring youth of the community was held 34 years ago, when the late Lt. Paul Eubank was Scoutmaster.

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PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR 17) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows: "Section 49-d-1. (a) The Texas Water Development Board shall upon direction of the Texas Water Quality Board, or any successor agency designated by the Legislature, issue additional Texas Water Development Bonds up to an additional aggregate principal amount of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) to provide grants, loans, or any combination of grants and loans for water quality enhancement purposes as established by the Legislature. The Texas Water Quality Board or any successor agency designated by the Legislature may make such grants and loans to political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas, including municipal corporations, river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts, and districts created or organized or authorized to be created, or organized under Article XVI, Section 59, or Article III, Section 52, of this Constitu-

tion, State agencies, and interstate agencies and compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party, and upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may authorize by general law. The bonds shall be issued for such terms, in such denominations, form and installments, and upon such conditions as the Legislature may authorize. (b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund to be invested and administered as prescribed by law. (c) The bonds authorized in this Section 49-d-1 and all bonds authorized by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear interest at not more than 6% per annum and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe, subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature. (d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by, and subject to the limitations in Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-e; provided, however, that the financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of Sections 49-c, 49-d and 49-e subject only to the availability

of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-e that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982. (e) Texas Water Development Bonds are secured by the general credit of the State and shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas. (f) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on Tuesday, May 18, 1971, which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000) bonds to provide financial assistance to cities and other public agencies for water quality enhancement purposes, providing for the improvement and continuance of the water resources program, and establishing an interest ceiling on Water Development Bonds at 6% per annum."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR 21) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVII, Section 1, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 1. The Legislature by a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each House, to be entered by each House, in one weekly newspaper of each county, in which such a newspaper may be published; and it shall be the duty of the several returning officers of said election, to open a poll for, and make returns to the Secretary of State,

of the number of legal votes cast at said election for and against said amendments; and if more than one be proposed, then the number of votes cast for and against each of them; and if it shall appear from said return, that a majority of the voters cast, have been cast in favor of any amendment, the said amendment so receiving a majority of the votes cast, shall become a part of this Constitution, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Legislature may propose an amendment of the Constitution at any session of the Legislature."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 5) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-a, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, as may be by the Legislature deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services to or on behalf of: (1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or non-citizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years; (2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps; (3) Needy blind persons; (4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children. "The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation

in these programs as it deems appropriate. "The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of State funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of State funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of State funds paid for assistance grants for the needy aged, and needy dependent children and the caretakers of the children shall not exceed Fifty-Five Million Dollars (\$55,000,000) during any fiscal year. "Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to the State for these purposes, then and in that event the

Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons. "Nothing in this section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this State." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on May 18, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment removing the limitation on the total State appropriations for assistance grants for the needy aged, the needy disabled, and the needy blind, and setting a limitation on total State appropriations during any fiscal year for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 15) Special Election May 18, 1971

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 24, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 24. (1) The State Ethics Commission is created as an agency of the State. The commission consists of nine members. Three members shall be appointed by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas with the advice and consent of the Associate Justices serving on the Court, three members shall be appointed by the Presiding Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals of Texas with the advice and consent of the other Judges serving on the Court, and three members shall be appointed by the Chairman of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission with the advice and consent of the other members of the commission, of each group of three appointees no more than two shall be attorneys engaged in the active practice of law. In addition thereto there shall be two ex officio members, one from the House of Representatives and one from the Senate to be elected on the first day of each Regular Session of the Legislature by a majority of the membership of each House for a term ending on the first day of the next Regular Session. (2) With the exception of the initial appointees, each member shall hold office for a term of six (6) years and until his successor is appointed and has qualified. In making the initial appointments, each appointing officer shall designate one (1) appointee to serve a term of two (2) years, one (1) appointee to serve a term of four (4) years, and one (1) appointee to serve a term of six (6) years. Interim vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as vacancies due to expiration of a full term, but only for the unexpired portion of the term in question. The membership shall designate one of its members to serve as chairman for a period of two (2) years. (3) The members of the commission shall be reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses incurred in the performance of their duties. (4) The commission shall recommend the compensation, per diem, and mileage allowance of members of the Legislature, and may recommend the salary of the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the Lieutenant Governor

at an amount higher than that of other members notwithstanding any provisions to the contrary of Article IV, Section 17, of the Texas Constitution. (5) The commission shall promulgate rules of ethics to govern the conduct of all legislators, legislative officers and all officeholders, appointive or elective, of any office, department, district agency, commission, board or any governmental unit or branch established by or under the authority of the constitution and laws of the State of Texas and all persons who shall use any privilege of the floor in either House of the Legislature. The Texas State Ethics Commission shall further promulgate rules providing that each member of the Legislature and each of the hereinabove named officeholders upon election and any appointment to any of these offices shall file with the State Ethics Commission a statement under oath setting out a complete financial statement in detail within 10 days after being elected or receiving an appointment. This information shall be privileged information to the State Ethics Commission to be used only by them to determine if there exists a conflict of interests or if there is or has been a violation of any of the rules of ethics promulgated by the Texas State Ethics Commission or any laws of the State of Texas. The Legislature shall enact statutes dealing with unauthorized disclosure or misuse of said privileged information. (6) The commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet in Austin at least once each year to review existing rules of ethics, Legislative compensation rates, mileage allowances and per diem rates, and to make any changes deemed necessary. (7) All rules of ethics, compensation rates, mileage allowances or per diem rates currently in force, as well as all changes and recommendations by the State Ethics Commission shall be promulgated before the convening of any session of the Legislature by filing a certified copy of the proclamation with the Secretary of State. (a) Each rule of ethics or change thereof made by the commission shall take effect on the 15th day of the legislative session following the proclamation unless disap-

proved before that day by resolution of either House of the Legislature. (b) All rules of compensation, mileage allowances or per diem rates and all changes and recommendations made by the commission thereof shall not take effect until approved section by section by resolution of both Houses of the Legislature. "All votes on these resolutions of each House shall show the individual votes in the respective journals of both Houses. (8) The commission shall investigate any alleged violation of any rule of ethics promulgated by it and report its findings to the appropriate State agency or legislative body, grand jury or district attorney. (9) Until otherwise provided by the commission, each member of the Legislature shall receive from the public treasury an annual salary of Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and per diem not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first 120 days only of each Regular Session and for 30 days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than 140 days. In addition to the per diem, the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and fifty cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from the seat of government to each county seat now or hereafter established; no member to be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after adjournment of the Regular or Called session. (10) The commission is further authorized to recommend to each Legislature changes which will update, improve, and effect economy in the legislative process." Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 18th day of May, 1971, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to create a State Ethics Commission empowered to set rules of ethics for members of the Legislature, State officers and legislative officers, to investigate violations thereof, and to recommend compensation for members of the Legislature and the Lieutenant Governor and recommend improvements and economy in the legislative process."
