## Sale of Cattle To Be Reported Within 30 Days

August 15 has been set as final date for reporting AAA compliance of conservation practices carried out between January 1, and August 1, to be eligible for payment, producers have been notified by Elbert Reeves, Administrative Officer. A large number of reports have been filed to date, and operators are advised against waiting until the last day to sign their compliance sheets. Final date for filing applications for beef cattle production subsidy has also been named, Mr. Reeves reports. For sales made from May 19, 1945 to June 30, inclusive, the application must be filed on or before August 31. For sales made on and after July 1, until the offer is withdrawn, the application must be filed within 60 days from date of sale, provided that not more than one application by an applicant may be filed in each calendar month. Applications shall be filed in the office of the county AAA committees or the county in which the feeder's farm, ranch, or feed lot is considered to be located for the purposes of the Agricultural Conservation Programs, Mr. Reeves said. The farm ranch, or feed lot will be the one where the cattle were located during the last 30 days or before sale as eligible cattle.

## Former Resident Receives Discharge

Pvt. Horace Jameson, who returned to the states April 19, for a convalescent period for wounds received in action in Germany, has been given Honorable Discharge, for disability, issued at Santa Barbara, California. Former resident of Motley County, Jameson is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Jameson now of Hale Center. Going overseas in January, he was wounded in his first enemy encounter. In addition to his Purple Heart award, he received his campaign ribbon with one combat star, and Expert Infantryman Badge.

## DAIRY SUBSIDY IS NEW AID TO LOCAL FARMERS

Although Motley County may not be classed as a dairy producing county, over two thousand dollars have been issued to producers in Dairy Payment sight drafts through the AAA office, according to data given Elbert Reeves, Administrative Officer by Mrs. Beth H. Clements, in charge of the dairy production payment program. Covering a pay period of three months, which ended June 30, payments since the 2nd of July received by producers, amounted to \$2,315.53. Subsidy payments were issued to producers for the April, May and June period in the amount of 17c per pound for butter fat on April sales and 10c per pound on sales during May and June while the whole milk rate for April was 70c per cwt., and May and June was 35c per cwt. Producers are subsidized with the above rates to off-set the increased cost of labor and feed, and at the same time keep the cost of living down about 1941 levels. Although very little has been done to improve the quality of dairy cattle, there are several good producing herds in the county, including a few herd sires with good pedigrees, selected from high producing herds, Mr. Reeves said, "Motley County has a large number of farms turned out because of Johnson grass, poor fertility and damaged by water and wind erosion," he pointed out, "and odd tracts of waste land which are being utilized for pasture for dairy cows. This practice may be termed 'new use of land on farm', paying good dividends with a minimum of expense."

## Joe B. Meador Is Home With New Rank And Uniform

With the rank of Mister, and attired in new regulation civilian uniform, Sgt. Joe B. Meador, formerly with the 4th Tank Bn. of the First Armored Division, reached Matador Sunday morning with an Honorable Discharge in his pocket, and 114 points to his credit. Flying from Italy, via South America, he picked up a pair of Brazilian boots enroute and landed at Miami, Florida about two weeks ago. From there he reported at Fort Sam Houston, Texas, separation center, and received his discharge, dated July 20. Veteran of African - European campaigns, he was in service 3 years, 11 months and 5 days, having been inducted August 16, 1941. Campaigns included Algeria, French Morocco, Po Valley, Tunisia, Naples - Foggia, Rome - Arno and North Apennines, and awards consist of EAME Campaign medal with 6 bronze stars and bronze arrowhead, Purple Heart, Good Conduct medal, and American Defense service medal. Sgt. Meador returned home from Italy, in December, 1944, for his first furlough visit with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Meador, since entering the service, and was returned to his company overseas, in January of this year. He was wounded in the right thigh, just above the knee. His wife, who met him on the west coast, returned here Tuesday, and was accompanied by his mother, Mrs. Oscar Vinson, to Okmulgee, Wednesday. The lieutenant's father, who has been in a serious condition since April, suffering a stomach ailment, is reported to be improving at his home near Flomot.

When present supplies of postage are exhausted, we shall be unable to accept further stamps or the money for the purchase of same. We shall, however, be glad to address air-mail envelopes for this purpose, that the families may mail the papers themselves. No charge is made for this service or for the paper which they may call for. In a number of instances failure to keep the supply of postage replenished has resulted in the Tribune's bearing this expense rather than remove a stencil from the air-mail tray. Since 12 cents and often 18 cents is required to mail a single issue, the cost has become prohibitive, and since we would be unable to send the paper air-mail to all members of the armed forces from this county, who are overseas, we deem it only fair not to send it air-mail to any.

### NOTICE OF ELECTION

Pursuant to the Election Proclamation issued by the Governor of Texas, notice is hereby given that a SPECIAL ELECTION will be held on Saturday, the Twenty-fifth Day of August, 1945, in each and every voting precinct in the County of Motley, State of Texas for the purpose of voting for or against the adoption of four proposed amendments to the Constitution of the State of Texas as follows:

1. Proposing an Amendment to Article VI of the Constitution of Texas, providing that any person in the armed forces of the United States, or of any branch or component part thereof, or of the United States Maritime Service, or the United States Merchant Marine, or who has been a member of same within eighteen months prior to the holding of any election in this state authorized by law, and is otherwise a qualified voter, shall not be required to pay, or to hold any receipt for the payment of, a poll tax in order to vote at any such election, if same is held while the United States is at war or within a certain stated time thereafter.
2. Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas providing for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office.
3. Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas providing...

4. Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments of old age assistance to those above sixty-five (65) years of age; provided that monthly payments from State funds to any one person may be in valid amounts based on need, that the maximum payment per month per person from State funds shall not be more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments for the needy blind persons over twenty-one years of age; giving the Legislature the power to set up a system of payments to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; providing for the expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; limiting the total amount which may be expended or such assistance out of State funds; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to become eligible to receive assistance.

## Panzer Divisions March Into Poland To Start Real War

Early in the morning of September 1, 1939, Nazi panzer divisions crossed the border into Poland and "officially" started World War II. Hitler had already negotiated the controversial neutrality pact with Russia and had that protection against interference with his plans in the east. In the west, the French were entrenched behind the "impenetrable" Maginot line and thought they were safe no matter what happened.

Poland, weak and isolated, with a large army that was composed mostly of cavalry regiments and foot soldiers, was no match for the lightning-like thrusts of the mechanized divisions that Hitler sent into battle. The Poles, cut off from any possible aid from Great Britain and France, were doomed. Less than a month of fighting was all that the Germans needed to capture the country.

The "blitzkrieg" had won the first of its many battles.  
By October, the Germans could now turn their attention to France, crouched behind its walls of fortifications and oblivious to the threat of conquest from around the ends of the Maginot line.

**Occupation of Norway.**  
But before he could deal with France, Hitler had to attend to the possible threats from the north, where Great Britain might have been able to land troops in Norway or Sweden and sweep down on an unprotected flank. Therefore, the Germans occupied Denmark and then Norway, beating down the feeble resistance that those peace-loving countries were able to marshal. It was all so ridiculously easy.

By May, 1940, the battle plans of the Germans were set and the "blitzkrieg" moved again—this time striking the Netherlands and Belgium in quick succession, moving on to France, and just missing the British army of occupation at Dunkirk. Hitler's divisions attacked from all directions, his tanks and panzers blasting everything in their path after the Luftwaffe had prepared the way by blasting the enemy's airdromes and defenses.

Heavy and medium bombers ranged behind the front lines, where dive bombers "pin-pointed" the targets into destruction. Tanks roared through the holes cut in the enemy lines and then fanned out behind the front lines, cutting communications, and blasting strong points that were only meant to stop infantry and which couldn't stand up against cannon-bearing mechanical monsters.

**First Phase Ends.**  
Then the infantry followed the tanks, but it was motorized infantry that covered 50 to 60 miles a day and consolidated the tank's gains before the disorganized foot troops facing them could be rallied. Fresh waves of infantry followed and annihilated all resistance and set up a Nazi government in the conquered territory. In less time than it took to conquer Poland, the Germans had swept everything in northern Europe before them. The first phase of the war was over.

**ROARING SPRINGS SOLDIER RETURNS BY AIR TRANSPORT**  
Presque Isle, Me. (Special to the Tribune) Pfc. Joe B. Rice, 28, veteran of 22 months service as a rifleman in the European Theatre of Operations, arrived at the Presque Isle Army Air Field today (July 16) aboard an Air Transport Command plane of the North Atlantic Division's Snowball fleet. His parents and wife reside at Roaring Springs, Texas. Snowball is the name of an Army air transport which has been running to Europe since July, 1944. During the winter and spring, the outfit brought back over 7,000 litter patients from

Orly Field, Paris. Snowball fleet is carrying ex-servicemen home for redeployment. It also operates a line from Presque Isle, Maine, to Stockholm, Sweden.
