Bond Election Set May 13

Bond election for issuance of bonds in the amount of \$284,000 has been set for Tuesday May 13.

The bonds will aid in funding a new water supply source for the City of Matador.

Oaths of office were officially administered to members of the Board of Directors for the Matador Water District by Mayor Kirby Campbell in a meeting of the Board held April 21, at the Motley County Court-

house. Freddie Welling, president; Larry Hoyle, vice-president; Nell Brotherton, secretary; Ronnie Christian, Billy Wason, and John McCandless, members, took oaths as officers and members of the Board.

The Matador Water District was established by legislation passed earlier this month.

Members and officers on the Board of Directors had been previously appointed by the governor as instruments to execute the necessary actions to aid in the formation of the Matador Water District.

In discussion of the upcoming bond election on May 13, it was stated that all persons who are registered voters and residents within the city limits are eligible to vote in the bond election.

Election officers appointed by the Board are Mrs. Pat Sheridan, presiding judge and Mrs. R. E. Donovan, alternate presiding judge.

Mrs. Nell Brotherton, assisted by Bob Davis, of Amarillo, representing Columbian Securities Corporation of Texas, read a written resolution calling the bond election. The resolution was voted on and approved.

Voting will be held on Tuesday, May 13, in the lobby of the County Courthouse. Absentee voting will be conducted at the City Hall from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Last day for absentee voting will be May 9.

Public Hearing Reviews City Water Situation

Possible severe water shortages, high mineral content in city water and needs for development of additional water sources were reviewed briefly by L. B. Campbell in a second public hearing held Monday, April 21, in the Motley County Courthouse.

Following an engineer's survey of the water needs and possibilities for Matador, total cost of the development of a new water supply source was estimated at \$384,000. Bonds to be voted on in the May 13 election were set at \$284,000, with the remaining \$100,000 to be possibly funded by the Community Development Block Grant.

The bond issue of \$284,000 must be voted on and passed prior to May 15 to be eligible for the \$100,000 Community Development Block Grant.

Matador Water District, created by legislation passed earlier this month, will serve as agent in supplying water to the city. The city will obtain its water from the Water District.

The Water District is a separate government entity

from the city. Senator Ray Farabee, a sponsor of the bill creating the Matador Water District, previously explained that, "The Matador Water District can enter into contracts for the purchase or sale of water... the District can acquire or construct a reservoir, wells or other water works and facilities."

L. B. Campbell pointed out that the Block Grant and bond election were only concerned with the water situation. The housing survey is a requirement for the water program, but is not included in the grant or bonds being discussed now.

With the development of a new water source, the minimum water bill will probably be raised from the present \$5.50 to about \$7 to \$7.50. Bob Davis of Amarillo, representing Columbian Securities Corporation of Texas, pointed out that some towns have minimums of \$10 to \$25. Matador has one of the lowest rates and will remain among the lowest even after an increase.

Springs Area Soon To Have New Look

The spring-fed swimming pool at Roaring Springs is undergoing some drastic changes these days, as is much of the land around the pool.

The old bathhouse is giving way to a modern, bi-level structure which will house the concession, dressing areas, and pumphouse.

What was once just pastureland will someday be a front yard, or the ninth hole of a golf course.

Red Canyon will become a 15 acre lake.

All of this, and more, is happening because Mrs. Marion Jones and Mrs. Jean Bassett had an idea.

"We are both military widows and we bought the springs and 1,425 acres with the purpose in mind of

developing a recreational second home area," said Mrs. Jones.

Mrs. Jones, a native of Roaring Springs, has worked with land development in Washington and California.

"But this land is primarily a working ranch and it will stay that," Mrs. Jones said.

The pool and facilities were built in 1929 by the Matador Land and Cattle Company.

"The affection for this place (among West Texans) and the sentiment toward it is like the old swimming hole syndrome," said Mrs. Jones. "A 98-year-old man came not long ago to see the springs one more time. The drinking fountain has been a landmark here for years."

Future plans call for a golf course, homesites, townhouses, and patio homes surrounding five small lakes, the largest being 15 acres, according to Mrs. Jones.

"Most of the houses will be second homes. We want this to be an escape area as well as for retirement," she said.

Phase I of the development will include about 500 acres.

"Springs Ranch (the new name of the development area) will be more of a cultural place. We hope to have art exhibits and booths," said Mrs. Jones.

Springs Ranch will be geared to all ages with a family area, a place for teenagers, and an area specifically for retired persons.

"There will be live entertainment for the teenagers. This is something they haven't had in the past," Mrs. Jones said.

The springs, two miles south of Roaring Springs, are said to have been a lookout point for the Comanche Indians under Chief Quanah Parker.

There is much beauty at the old springs as well as heritage. The springs are still in their natural state, undisturbed by the progress going on around them.

The swimming pool is scheduled to open May 15 or shortly thereafter according to the owners, with other construction projects continuing throughout the summer.

Beautiful hand painted china and many other hand-made objects and paintings were on exhibit.

County Kills Amendments

Motley County Tuesday defeated two proposed amendments to the Texas State Constitution in a balloting of 227 votes.

One hundred and Four voted for Amendment No. 1 calling for increased benefits for retired teachers and public employes, but 122 votes were cast against the amendment.

The vote for Amendment No. 2 to raise the pay for state legislators was 103 for and 118 against.

By boxes the voting was: Matador, Whiteflat and Absentees combined, No. 1,

78 for and 73 against; No. 2, 75 for and 73 against. This was the only box in the county in which both amendments carried.

Flomot: 25 votes. Eight for No. 1 and 16 against; three for No. 2 and 21 against.

Northfield: 10 votes. No. 1, one for and 9 against; No. 2, two for and 8 against.

Roaring Springs, 41 votes. No. 1, 17 for and 24 against; No. 2, 23 for and 16 against.

For the death that He died, He died to sin, once for all; but the life that He lives, He lives to God. Even so consider yourselves to be dead to sin, but alive to God in Christ Jesus. Ro. 6:5-11.

Paul gave us the above conclusions just after having explained the new birth in the first four verses of the chapter. Now our love for sin should be discarded and replaced by our love for Christ. To be born again is to become a child of God.

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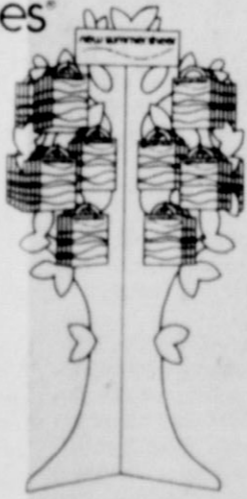

3. That absentee voting shall be conducted at the Office of the City Secretary, City Hall, Matador, Texas, and during the period absentee voting is required or permitted by law, the hours designated for absentee voting by personal appearance shall be from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on each day except Saturdays, Sundays, and official state holidays; and the absentee voting clerk shall keep said absentee voting place open during such hours for absentee voting by personal appearance. The absentee voting clerk for said election shall be Mrs. Neil Brotherton.

4. That said election shall be held and conducted in effect as two separate but simultaneous elections, to-wit: one election at which only the resident, qualified electors who own taxable property in the District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be entitled to vote, and another election at which all other resident, qualified electors of the District shall be entitled to vote. The votes


cast at each of said separate but simultaneous elections shall be recorded, returned, and canvassed separately. had a store "on The Lane." This part of the early-day settlement was later moved to the present location of main street.

School days were remembered and incidents shared, followed by the events of both World War I and II. The days when beer was sold wholesale at the ice house, and at the cafe; the sad days of the depression and happier days which followed were told in reminiscence.

As each phase of the narration unfolded, a quartet composed of Mesdames Boyd Long, L. A. Mullins, Brown Hinson and Charlie Long sang songs of that era. They opened with "Memories," and followed with "Working on the Railroad," "School Days," "Over There," "Roll Out the Barrel," and "Tavern in the Town."

Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Rigby were recognized as the first couple married at Roaring Springs and the oldest couple present. They were married December 23, 1919. Their granddaughter, Mrs. Shirley Long sang "Always" as a tribute to them.

Miss Freda Keahey was recognized as the only person still living in the original family home; and also recognized were two three-generation families still living in the community — the M. S. Thacker and the Jack Davis families.

Predictee Club members sang "America The Beautiful," to conclude the program, and the crowd stood at attention in tribute to the American flag, and in singing "God Bless America."

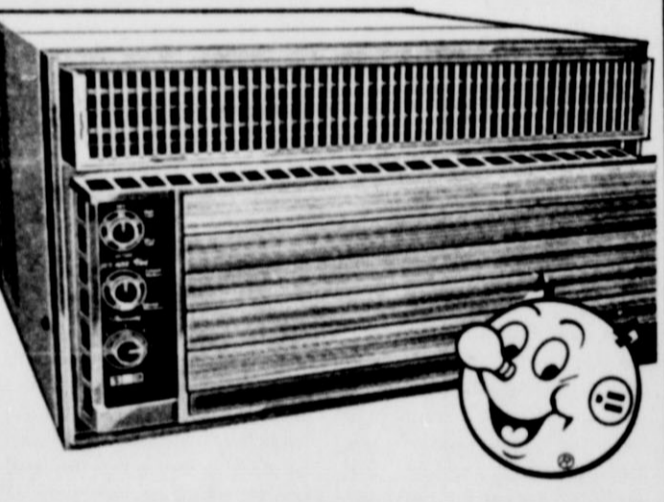
