## VOTER'S INNING NEAR IN SPECIAL ELECTION

### Candidates Closing Unusual Campaign

ELEVEN CANDIDATES are closing their campaigns in a grotesque race for the office of Congressman from the 18th Texas District. Saturday is V-Day for the voters.

Varied speculation is offered as to the number of ballots which may be polled. Potter county (Amarillo) reports that over 350 absentee ballots have been cast and other counties report heavy absentee balloting. With the wide field of candidates, few observers have dared make any forecast as to the outcome.

Unusual feature of the special election is that many candidates are expected to announce for the Democratic Primary in July. Mrs. Altavene Clark, the only woman candidate in the race, has already filed her name for the Primary ballot.

One lone Republican, Ben Gull of Gray county, is a candidate and is expected to make a showing if the vote is broken up by the ten Democrats.

Altho eleven candidates are announced, the Motley county ballot will contain only ten names. One candidate, Woody Montgomery, of Amarillo failed to get his application here in time to get his name on the ballot. Motley voters wishing to support him will write in his name.

Order in which names will appear on the Motley county ballot is as follows: Bill Pickel, LeRoy LaMaster, E. T. Burk, Walter Rogers, Ronald Davis, J. Blake Timmons, Ben Gull, Altavene Clark, Talma Smith and Hullett Bice.

One of the unusual features of the race is that the winner will start immediately to enter another campaign. The special election will assure a Congress office until the first of the year, or the unexpired term of former Congressman Eugene Worley.

The winner will be in four elections, altho "nomination in the second Democratic primary is tantamount to election in the November general election."

Much interest is being shown in the Saturday special election. Leaders throughout the district are adopting this slogan, "Vote as you please, but please vote."

### City Park Will Install Lights

Five or six street lights will be installed in the city park within the near future, it was announced Tuesday by the Matador Lions Club.

Three of the lights will be maintained by the Lions at a cost of \$1.25 per light per month. The VFW will pay for one light and the American Legion will pay for the operation of one light.

Installation of poles and maintenance of lights will be by the West Texas Utiliting Company and the operation will be on the same basis as the street lights.

Much improvement has been accomplished at the park and it is hoped the wading pool may be in operation for youngsters by the time extreme hot weather arrives. Abundant shade will provide ideal picnic grounds, while the installation of lights will make possible night picnic parties.

Plans are being considered for playground equipment to be installed in the scenic and conveniently located park. Beautifying and improving the park is being shared jointly by the Matador Garden Club and the Lions.

### Springs Nine In Playoff

Roaring Springs high school Yellowjackets Tuesday afternoon played their way into district playoff in defeating the Patton Springs nine in the final north-half district conference game.

The Yellowjackets took the north-half district by storm, winning all six conference games. In playing 14 games this season the Yellowjackets won 12 contests, losing 2 to the Crowell Wildcats. The team has crossed the plate 184 times to their opponents 84.

Roaring Springs will meet the south-half district winners in a best two out of three series, expected to get underway Friday, May 5th, in Girard. The return game will be played in Roaring Springs, Tuesday, May 9th. The series to decide the district championship is expected to provide unusual interest for baseball fans because of the extra enthusiasm present when the Yellowjackets cross bats with Girard.

Lion Dr. Marshall Harvey of Lubbock, Tuesday was elected governor of International District 2-T-1, near the conclusion of a successful three-day district meeting at Childress. Attendance of approximately 400 Lions and Lionesses was reported. Harvey succeeds Curtis Cryer of Borger who presided over all sessions of the convention, assisted by Cecil Pryor, president of the Childress Club.

Hereford was selected as the 1951 convention city, winning out over Borger.

Harvey defeated Boyd Meador of McLean in the race for District Governor.

She has had one year of Design and Arrangement at T.S. C.W. and four years of training at the Gilmore School of Design in the Rio Grande Valley. For five years, she was a designer at the Hagen Floral Company in Mineral Wells, Texas.

"In presenting these programs, I bring all my material with me except the flowers, and these would have to be furnished in order that they be the kind of flowers most generally used in your locality and in order that they be fresh," Mrs. Ord explained.

The course will be held in the Legion hall, and will begin at 1 p. m. and continue through the afternoon.

Tickets for the course will be on sale Saturday afternoon at both Stanley Pharmacy and Daniel's Drug Store. Price will be 50 cents per ticket. Supplies and materials for making corsages will be available at the Legion hall for those who wish to make one under Mrs. Ord's instruction, and cost for making one corsage is estimated at approximately 40 cents.

Flowers of any description contributed for the corsage clinic will be greatly appreciated, and should be cut and kept in water over-night, according to Mrs. Ord's suggestion.

### Rains Aid Prospects

Rains over the Panhandle and South Plains Monday afternoon, aided crop prospects, altho the precipitation was not enough to remove the drought conditions.

Rainfall registered in Matador was .17-inch altho some sections of the county reported as much as one-half inch. Heavy rains for a short time in Childress resulted in the District Lions parade being cancelled. Some hail was reported in that area as the cloud passed.

Reports from most sections of Motley county indicate that the light rains was general. Higher temperature and winds Tuesday yesterday brought some high clouds but little prospect of more needed moisture.

Farmers say that sufficient moisture for planting is available in most sections of the county.

### OIL DUMPED IN SEWER SYSTEM COSTLY TO CITY

Used lubricating oil being dumped into Matador sewer system is costing the city needless expense and threatens to destroy bacteria at the disposal plant which would result in a near "bankrupting" consequences.

Repeated warnings have been published in an effort to stop the use of the sewer, as a disposal for burned lube oil. Two recent "batches" of oil have been skimmed from the disposal plant and it is feared bacteria action may have been disrupted. A serious health menace is certain to result unless oil is kept out of the sewer lines.

City council in meeting Tuesday evening considered the grave problem and again decided to seek the cooperation of the public in helping to detect the source of the oil and prevent further pollution of the sewer system.

The council approved regular collection of used oil at the city's expense. A committee will make personal appeal to managers of Matador's seven service stations in an effort to prevent more oil going into the lines through negligence or indifference of employees.

A personal appeal is made to all residents to aid in any way possible to help curb further use of the sewer system for the disposal of oil, which is expensive to taxpayers and may jeopardize the health of the entire community.

### Health Department Issues Warning Of Fly Infestation

"Go in and out the window" is a line from a children's game which thousands of little youngsters have played for years. It may be used to describe something else, too, for flies like to go in and out windows. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer re-

ports that fly infestation will be heavy this year. So, now is the time to kill those early flies... before they have a chance to produce thousands more during the summer.

These pests love to buzz around in uncovered garbage pails, stables, old privies, and in homes around uncovered food. Do you have a metal garbage pail with a tight-fitting lid? Are screens on your windows and doors in good repair? Waste should be removed from stables often, for horse manure is one of the chief breeding places of flies. Children can help to keep flies out of the house by keeping screen doors closed, and swatting the flies that enter the house.

Flies carry germs on their fast-moving wings, in their tube-like mouths, and on their furry legs and feet. What are some of the diseases they spread? Typhoid fever, dysentery, and tuberculosis are spread by these insects who feed on germ-laden filth.

Clean-up campaigns, screening and spraying with insecticides are the best methods for getting rid of flies. Special care should be used in the use of DDT, or
