**Potatoes Make Bid For Place On Farm**

THIS year is the first time Irish potatoes have been planted on a commercial basis in Motley County. The Folley Community that has become wealthy in the peanut business is the site of the potato business. Only 190 acres were planted. Most of the harvest is over.

The contract for the potato venture was made by Harold Smith who has potato sheds at Hart, Texas. County Agent Bill Pallmeyer says the market was broken recently when California growers dumped their crop on the market.

The potatoes are dug by a giant two-row machine. They are then conveyed into a truck alongside. The potatoes are then taken to another location where they are again graded and more clods removed from the conveyers.

The idea behind the potato trial was to grow potatoes when they could be watered between waterings for the peanuts. The success of the venture is still to be determined.

The peanuts are in fields amidst fine homes in the community, with green lawns. The sandy roads are difficult to travel but the people of the community do not seem to mind them.

The sweet, pure water supplies many 6-in. and 6 1/2-in. wells. The land in the area once had little value until the water and peanuts made it a garden spot.

He planned and supervised a district building program that included a vocational facility, a new administration building, two cafeteria expansions and

**Students Adapt Slide to Life Saving Equipment**

Hundreds of adults may someday owe their lives to a University of Houston adaptation of the old kiddie sliding board.

U of H students, working to provide a safe means of evacuating people from burning high rise buildings, have sewn a flexible tubular slide from heavy-duty nylon.

The nylon tube is one of three projects U of H students introduced during competition with teams from 25 other universities May 1-4 in Marinette, Wis.

Ricky Yeates, a sophomore, says the slide probably is the most promising of the projects nine local students took to the competition.

Ricky and his wife, Molly reside in Stafford, Texas. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Yeates of Floydada and the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Yeates of Roaring Springs and Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Gage of Afton; and great-grandson of Mrs. D. W. Hughes of Roaring Springs. Miss Inez Sloan, Mrs. Lem Miller and Mrs. Alvin Stearns were his former teachers in the Roaring Springs School.

John Applegath, a junior, led a group of engineering students in designing the

slide, along with a chair and a cylindrical capsule for escape from burning buildings. He sewed 50 feet of Nomex nylon into the tube. It is attached at window level to a platform and at the other end to a hoop to hold it open.

The fabric may char or melt but will not flame, says Arthur N. Paul, professor of industrial and system engineering at U of H.

A person descends the slide, which slopes outward, at about one second per floor, Paul says. He says some 30 persons a minute could be evacuated from a burning building.

Yeates said the rapid evacuation of several people in succession is the advantage of the chute. The chair lift and capsule are "one shot deals," Yeates says.

He says the students, who studied current fire escape equipment before beginning their designs this year, would like to see the chutes attached to the baskets atop

A chair evacuation device, Paul says, can be used to carry the elderly, invalids and small children, all of whom can be held in the chair with the seat belt.

The students also exhibited a system that smothers gasoline flames during an auto wreck. The system, which students say can be installed in any car, includes a synthetic foam buffer around the central gas tank and a tank which sprays extinguishing foam around the gas tank on impact.

Research into these and other fire-related projects was sponsored by SCORE, Student Competitions on Relevant Engineering, a national organization.

SCORE provided \$2,000 for research and \$1,500 for travel to the national competition for U of H students. Local companies have donated materials.

More than 140 students in six U of H engineering classes designed projects relating to fire safety. Paul said the three most promising projects were chosen for the competition.

- TRASH COMPACTOR: Remove any accumulated trash.
- TELEVISION SETS: Unplug from electric outlet and disconnect the antenna lead-in cable.
- CLOCK RADIOS, ETC.: Check these and all other items with automatic "On-Off" controls. Disconnect the ones that won't be needed.
- LIGHTING: Be sure that all lights are off except those needed for security, such as: 1) yard light and/or other exterior lighting with automatic controls — on at dusk, off at dawn; 2) portable lamp in living area with automatic control; 3) hall or bathroom light.
- AIR CONDITIONING: Normally, air conditioning should be turned off completely while on summer vacation. However, if there is anything in your home that might suffer heat damage, the thermostat setting could be raised 5 to 10 degrees above normal operation and the unit left on. For comfort, you might have a friend or neighbor turn on the unit the day of your return.
