**Social Security Advance Scheduled**

The social security tax rate for persons whose work counts toward old-age and survivors insurance is scheduled to increase on the first of January, John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock social security office, reminded employers, employees, and self-employed people today.

This scheduled increase in tax contribution is in accordance with the 1950 amendments to the social security law, and was enacted by Congress in anticipation of future obligations of the program.

Employees in jobs covered by the law will have 2 percent instead of the present 1 1/2 percent deducted from their pay beginning with the first of January up to earnings of \$3600 a year; their employers will contribute an equal amount.

The new rates will apply to all taxable wages paid after December 31, 1953, regardless of when earned.

The social security tax for the self-employed is scheduled to increase from the present 2 1/2 percent to 3 percent, for the period commencing January 1, 1954. Since the self-employed whose work is covered by the law pay their tax just once yearly at the time of filing their Federal income tax return, they will pay the present 2 1/2 percent social security tax on their 1953 income that counts toward social security. This will be due not later than March 15, 1954. Their first payments at the increased rate of 3 percent will be due March 15, 1955, for the calendar year 1954.

In the meantime the Internal Revenue Service reports that employers will be furnished late this year with income tax withholding tables and Federal Insurance Contributions Act (social security taxes) tables reflecting rates applicable next year.

The next scheduled increase, six years from now, in 1960, will be to 2 1/2 percent each for employer and employee, and to 3 1/2 percent for the self-employed.

To assist in all matters pertaining to social security, a representative of the Lubbock office will be in Matador on November 12 at 11:30 a. m. at the First State Bank.

ico Cattle Growers' Association and the United Livestock Producers Association.

"We were all intent on doing something about the disintegrated cattle industry. One Washington newspaper feature writer said we were 'the best dressed and best behaved delegation that had ever descended on the nation's capital'."

**Discrimination Evident**  
"Personally, I wish all price supports and subsidies could be removed," Br. Birnie declared, "but I am convinced the nation's economy is so geared that it is impossible. I feel that the cattle producer is the object of discrimination since we are denied price supports while everything we buy (even to feed for our cattle) receives some kind of federal benefit. I do not farm a single acre of land, yet I must take any price I can get for cattle while every other vital part of the nation's economy is protected. We have never asked for anything more than a fair break with the other producers of the nation."

After the 350 ranchers and farmers met Benson in the Washington Agriculture auditorium at 11 a. m. Monday (October 26) and were dismissed about one hour later, they later held their own meeting in the American Legion hall.

**Spokesman Is Named**  
Here each group named a spokesman to meet in committee with Benson the following day (about 14 members were named to this committee). The Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Arkansas group named Noel McDade of Clayton, New Mexico.

Some excerpts from the Washington Post, issue of October 28, are as follows: "Bitter over failure in their two-day fight to obtain a promise of Government-guaranteed higher prices for

their cattle, the caravan of 350 Western and Southern cattlemen broke camp along the Potomac yesterday."

"They headed homeward with a variety of names for Agriculture Secretary Ezra T. Benson who virtually turned down their plea for price supports. 'I think we got a square peg in a round hole at the Agriculture Department' was the view expressed by Dennis Driscoll of Colorado Springs, Colorado, chief spokesman for the visitors."

"They gave us the old brush-off. I'm not a damned bit hopeful," said George Bader, Jr., of McClure, Ill.

"The visitors were glum, too, over the failure to get a hearing before President Eisenhower. The White House advised them the whole matter was in Benson's hands."

"Benson told the ranchers he has serious reservations about the 'feasibility of high, rigid price supports' but still has 'an open mind'."

"It is open," drawled one bronze-faced West Texan as he crawled on his homeward bus, "our pleas went right through it without registering at all."

"Sen. Robert S. Kerr (D-Okla.) got back to Washington in time to address the cattlemen. He told them that when President Eisenhower defended the Secretary recently 'he put his arm around Benson and turned his back on seven million farmers.'"
