# Home Economically Speaking

## SWEETENERS NOT LINKED TO HYPERACTIVITY

Blaming sweet foods and beverages as the cause of children's "wild behavior" is unfounded according to a new study published in the *New England Journal of Medicine*.

The popular belief that sugar or aspartame, also known as NutraSweet or Equal, may cause childhood hyperactivity simply didn't hold up.

"No evidence existed to support the hypothesis that either sugar or aspartame adversely affected the behavior or learning of children," said Mark L. Wolraich, M.D., professor of pediatrics at Vanderbilt University Medical Center and lead investigator.

Subjects were 25 normal 3-to-5 year old children and 23 children between 6 and 10 years of age believed to be sugar sensitive. The kids and their families followed three special diets for three consecutive weeks. Sweet foods in the diets consisted primarily of either sugar (sucrose), aspartame or saccharin, which served as the placebo. Sweet foods were carefully prepared so that subjects could not identify the sweetener being used.

Weekly, the children's behavior and learning ability were monitored by parents, caregivers, teachers and researchers on attention, hyperactivity, aggression, learning ability, motor activity and mood.

Children in the study consumed higher levels of sugar and aspartame than typical intake levels. However, neither the sugar nor the aspartame affected their behavior or cognitive function. Among those children described as sugar sensitive, there was no difference between the three diets of the 39 variables tested. Among the normal preschool children, only four of 31 variables differed slightly but failed to show any consistent pattern.

"This excellent study confirms other controlled studies of food additives, none of which have shown any relationship between hyperactivity and sugar or aspartame," said Ronald Kleinman, M.D., chief of the Pediatric Gastrointestinal and Nutrition Unit at Massachusetts General

Hospital. Kleinman, past chairman of the Children's Nutrition Committee of the American Academy of Pediatrics, hopes the study will help change public misperception and make people realize that eating sweets does not cause hyperactivity in children.

## Food Allergies Nothing to Sneeze About

During spring and summer with awakening of trees and grasses, comes more evidence of allergies - rhinitis, wheezing, asthma as well as food allergies. Food allergies are a severe problem and should be diagnosed by a board certified allergist. Once diagnosed, then avoid the offending food. So select wisely from the USDA Food Guide Pyramid by avoiding all foods that provoke allergic reactions.

## A Look At Women's Health Issues

For the 1990's, a major emphasis on women's health issues is being promoted by the American Dietetic Association. Presently, one out of eight women can expect to develop breast cancer. Cardiovascular disease is the leading cause of death in American women today. Out of the 25 million Americans currently suffering from osteoporosis, most are women. About half this number can suffer a fracture related to osteoporosis, a disease which weakens bones. Eating healthfully - less fat, more complex carbohydrates, less sugar, less sodium, and selecting the recommended number of servings from the USDA food guide Pyramid is best for both women and men as well as for all age groups.

"I've worked on a commission. I liked it that way. If I wanted to eat, I had to work."

"The first year we were married that commission was a little slim, but we made it because my mother-in-law made a lot of plum preserves."

Floyd didn't say this was his most embarrassing moment but it has got to be close:

He went out to sell his first vacuum cleaner. He knew nothing about vacuum cleaners and gave a demonstration.

"There was a lot of dust coming out of the machine and the lady remarked about it," he said.

Floyd explained that the machine worked and eventually it would get the floor clean.

And she bought it. When he came back he was asked if he sold the vacuum cleaner. He said that he did.

"Why didn't you take the bag along?" he was asked. "What and why a bag?" he asked. The answer was to "keep the dirt in

the cleaner."

"It wasn't easy but I went to the lady's house, put the bag in the vacuum cleaner and it really did a first class job."

"I think the lady liked the second demonstration much better," he said.

Floyd told about the time he was returning from selling air-conditioners near Flomot and ran into two cows near a building in which a revival meeting was being held.

He was banged up pretty good, had some broken ribs and other injuries when his pickup rolled over.

The revival came to a halt and those at the revival went outside to see what happened.

In the rollover, hundreds of advertising sheets scattered.

"Someone picked them up and asked what I wanted to do with them. I told him to give them to those at the meeting. Maybe someone will see something they want to buy."

Asked if he ever sold anything from the material, Floyd said he couldn't remember making a sale.

I have no idea just how well Floyd will do in the horse business. But I would hazard a guess that we'll be seeing more horses in the future in Childress than you have seen in a long, long time.

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
