"There is no reason why industries can not operate in smaller communities, perhaps to manufacture components for larger products," she declared, "and the cities have problems that are increasingly difficult to remedy. These include air pollution, crowded schools, sewer and water problems, crime and general congestion. It seems logical that industry must now look to the smaller communities."

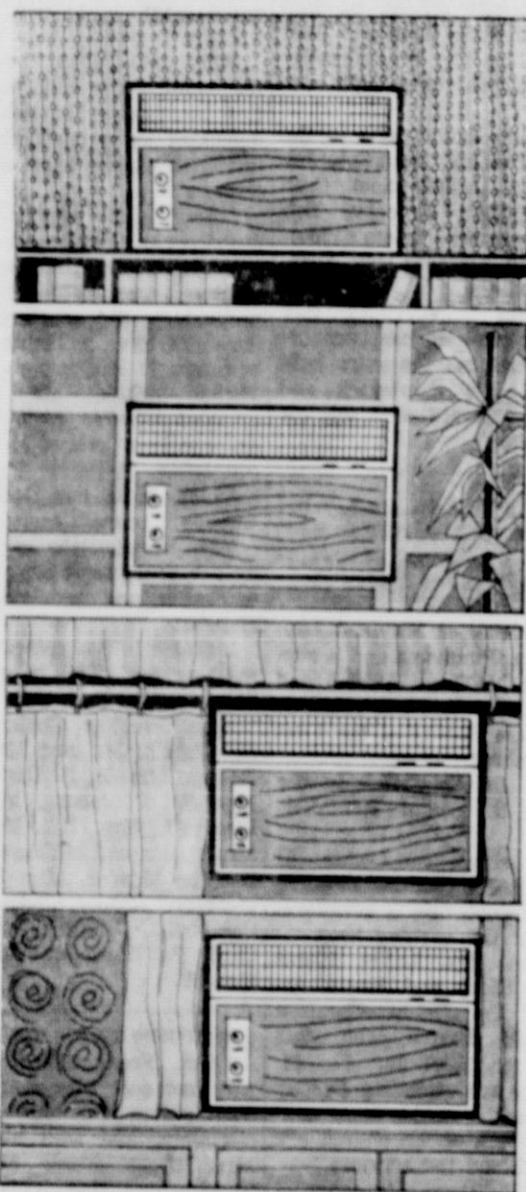

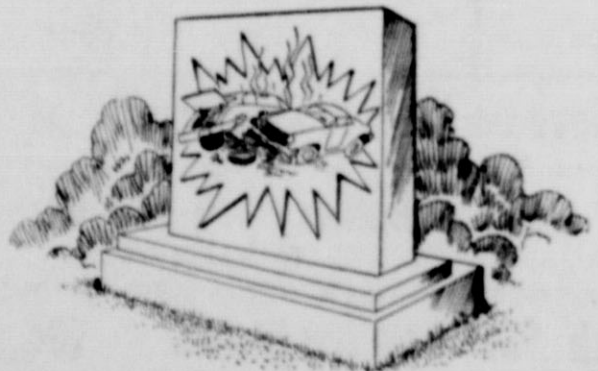
