A heart attack Friday, Jan. 23, claimed the life of Jack L. Huey, 59, of Krum, former superintendent of the Patton Springs school. He had suffered from a heart ailment the past six months.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Sunday at the First Baptist Church in Saint Jo, where he formerly lived. Officiating were Rev. Cecil Threadgill and Rev. Earl J. Patton. Burial was in Mountain Park Cemetery at Saint Jo.

Besides his wife he is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Glenn Lovett of Saint Jo, and Mrs. Norman Segler of Krum; one son, Jack L. Huey, Jr., of Guthrie; one sister, Mrs. Walter Walker of Denton; and 3 grandchildren.

**Bond Sales Total \$102,465 for 1958**

Motley County residents last year purchased a total of \$102,465 in United States Savings Bonds, according to Bill Seale, county chairman of the Savings Bond committee. The total equaled 94% of the county's 1958 goal. December sales were \$11,088.

"December sales in Texas were 15% greater than December 1957. Total state sales for 1958 were \$171,851,685. Or 98.2% of the year's goal. Sales in the nation last year were \$4,689 million. While sales increased 4% last year, redemptions of matured and unmatured bonds decreased 11%," Seale said.

"The United States Treasury Department is grateful to those who gave so much of their time and effort in promoting the sale of bonds. Bankers who sell bonds as a free service to both customer and nation, advising media who donate advertising, volunteers who are active on local committees and hundreds of others make this great thrift program possible," Seale concluded.

**Sanders Well Down To About 3,500 ft.**

P&M Drilling Company (Midland) No. 1 G. C. Sanders, offset to C. R. Brandon B. Roaring Springs West Field, was at approximately 3,500 feet yesterday afternoon.

The well is located 3 miles east of Roaring Springs. As the operation nears the average 4,200 feet pay zone area of the field, interest continues to increase here and in Roaring Springs.

Surface casing was being set yesterday at General Crude's Fish Estate wildcat well, 15 mi. northwest of Matador. The well has a projected depth of 9,500 feet.

**Farmers to Hear Explanation of A-B Allotments**

Purpose of a meeting scheduled in the District Court room here Thursday evening (Feb. 5th) is to explain A and B cotton allotment plans. All cotton growers will choose between the two plans during the current year. The meeting will begin at 7 p. m.

Tommy Moore, ASC Office Manager, will explain the rules governing the programs, restrictions options and deadlines, together with other features of the two programs.

County Agent Bill Palmeyer will show figures comparing the two plans where the average yield of cotton is 150 and 250 lbs. per acre. Hand pulled cotton and machined cotton figures will be shown, along with comparison of milo yields, which may or may not be grown in connection with plan A.

Roughly, Plan B allows the farmer to plant 40% more cotton than Plan A, but the support of parity is 15% less. Examples will also be shown of owner-operator and landlord-tenant operations.

The meeting (one week from tonight) will explain details of the two plans highly important to all interested in the production of cotton.

## KIRKLAND GRADUATE IN ARMORED DIVISION UNIT

3D ARMORED DIV., GERMANY (AHTNC) — Army Pvt. Harold G. Harris, son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl F. Harris, Northfield, Tex., recently participated with the 3d Armored Division's 27th Artillery in a river crossing exercise in Germany.

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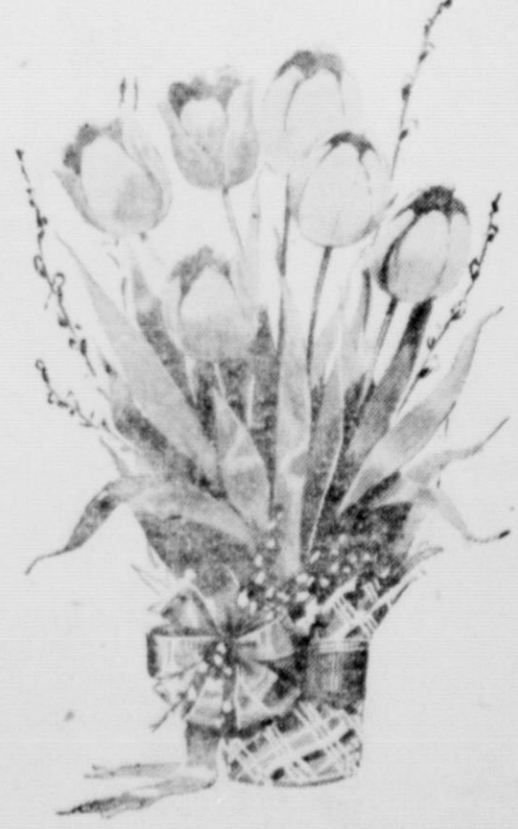

**Farmer's Income Tax Guide Now Available Here**

The popular Farmer's Tax Guide, informational booklet on farm and ranch income tax matters is available, and may be secured at County Agent Bill Palmeyer's office. Changes made in tax laws caused a delay in printing, thus explaining why the booklet is being distributed later this year than in the past.

Several important changes which have been made in the tax code are: an additional 20% first-year depreciation write-off is now allowed on new machinery and equipment with a limit of \$10,000 set for such purchases on an individual return or \$20,000 in case of a joint return, and casualty losses on uninsured business property are now deductible as ordinary losses.

In the past if a farmer lost a barn by fire or storm, the deduction for any uninsured loss was offset first by capital gains. The loss is now reportable on Schedule F the same as depreciation and other business expenses.

The law now permits a farmer to carry back an "operating

**License Plates Available Feb. 2**

AUSTIN, TEXAS — New License plates for 1959 will go on sale in all county courthouses February 2, State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer announced today. The plates will be the reverse of 1958's, and will have black letters and numerals on a white background.

Greer stated that four and one-half million motor vehicle registrations were bought by Texans in 1958. "Don't be at the end of that long line. Get your vehicle registered early," Greer urged. "The registration deadline is April 1, but we hope car and truck owners will put on the new plates as soon as possible."

Greer stressed the importance of registering all automobiles and trucks in the home county of the vehicle owner.

"Take your certificate of title and your last year's registration receipt to the tax collector in your home county. Penalty for improper registration of a vehicle can be as much as \$200.

**Don't risk an illegal registration.** Remember, too, that a portion of all registration fees stays in your home county to benefit your local community."

For questions not clearly covered in the booklet, consult a representative of the Internal Revenue Service, or consult a tax accountant.

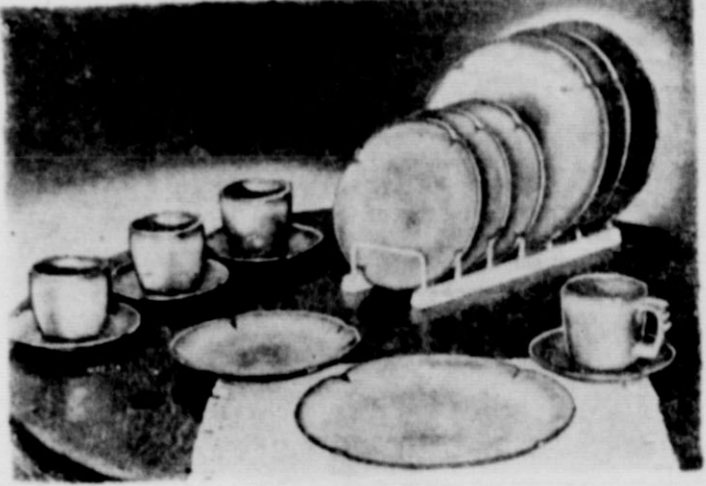

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## History of Motley County is Reflected In Roster of Judges During 68 Years

NEARING three score and ten years since it was organized, Motley County this month installed its 15th elected county judge when Elbert Reeves took the oath of office. Pioneer Henry H. Campbell, who formed the Matador Ranch empire, father of First State Bank president, Harry H. Campbell, was the first judge. He came into office January 1, 1891 and served four years.

In terms of years in office the late Judge W. R. Cammack who served a continuous 18 years, was far out in the lead. The nearest to him was the late Judge T. T. Bouldin who served 8 years.

At the time Judge Cammack went out of office (Jan. 1, 1949) he had served as judge more than one-third of time since the county was organized.

Much of the stirring early history of the county has escaped recording as related to judges who served previous to Judge Cammack. The nation was in the agony of the great depression when he took office. He was at the helm of the county's affairs when this nation entered World War II and remained in office for its duration. He was county judge when the courthouse burned in 1944 and met with his commissioners in an automobile in a special session to purchase the Luckett building on the corner of Main and Dundee streets, later to become Jackson Estate property and now occupied by Bob Stanley Pharmacy. The building served as a courthouse until the new structure was completed.

A. B. Crane was county judge when World War I started and records show he went into service and J. B. Foster was appointed to serve during his absence.

Whitten, came to office Jan. 1, 1913, served four years; A. B. Crane, came to office Jan. 1, 1917, served two years; S. W. Rhodes, came to office Jan. 1, 1919, served two years; C. L. Glenn, came to office Jan. 1, 1921, served six years; J. F. Jordon, came to office Jan. 1, 1927, served four

years; W. R. Cammack came to office Jan. 1, 1931, served 18 years; C. W. Giesecke, Jr., came to office Jan. 1, 1949, served four years; Vance Gilbreath, came to office Jan. 1, 1953, served six years; Elbert Reeves came to office Jan. 1, 1959.


