HOSPITAL to OPEN

ROBERT E. OVERSTREET DIES IN AUTO CRASH; RITES HERE

An outstanding young agribusiness personality of this area, Robert E. Overstreet, 26, was killed about 7:15 p.m. Thursday in a two-car head-on crash on U. S. 28 about 14 miles east of Vernon.

He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Overstreet, well-known ranching family, who reside in the Hillcrest community between Matador and Floydada.

He was en route to Atlanta, Georgia, where he was to be associated with the Cotton Producers Association for the summer. To be orientated with their southern installations in marketing and financing.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Saturday in the First United Methodist Church of Matador, with the Rev. John Fitzgerrel, pastor, and Minister Walter Bostick of Lubbock Christian College, officiating.

Interment was in the City of Lubbock Cemetery beside his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Edgar Overstreet.

Also killed in the collision was Grover Charles Tiley, service station attendant from Harold, a small town near Vernon.

Highway Patrolman Gerald Howard of Vernon, who investigated the accident, reported that Tiley was heading west and Overstreet was going east when the mishap occurred. The cars collided in the eastbound lane, Howard reported.

Both men were alone in their vehicles at the time of the accident.

Born In Lubbock

Robert Edgar Overstreet was born September 25, 1943 in Lubbock, Texas, to the former Hannah Mae Keeter and Robert Winfield Overstreet. He resided with his parents in Lynn County for a period of years, attending schools at New Home and Tahoka, and participating in the Tahoka Junior High graduation, where he was an honor student.

After moving to his present home in Floyd County in 1957, Overstreet attended the Floydada schools, graduating in 1962. He attended Texas A&M University, where he held a Bachelor of Science degree in Agricultural Education and also in Animal Science. He was currently completing requirements toward a Master of Science degree in Animal Science, Feedlot Management.

The outstanding young man was a leader and organizer. He was an Eagle Scout, and had received his second degree in the Masonic Order, June 2, just two days prior to his death. He was a member

Open House is Set Sunday Afternoon

LONG-AWAITED opening of the Motley General Hospital is scheduled for Monday, June 15, it was announced Tuesday by Fred Wallace, administrator.

The hospital is fully equipped and a qualified staff is on stand-by, with the exception of a Registered nurse. Although it is essential that an RN be on the staff before the hospital can qualify for Medicare and Medicaid, it is also required that the hospital be in operation and all facilities checked, before approval by Medicare and Medicaid is made.

The Hospital Board, meeting until late Monday night, decided to open the facility on June 15. All laboratory and x-ray work formerly done by Dr. Albert Tra-week and Dr. J. S. Stanley, in their clinics, will be processed in the hospital. The two local physicians are Staff doctors of the hospital board, and must approve other doctors who may use the hospital.

The hospital is completely set up to comply with federal requirements. Books are to be audited by the CPA firm of LaRue, Lawrence, Wood and Kelley of Fort Worth.

All hospitalization insurance will be recognized with the exception of Medicare and Medicaid, when the facility is opened. Prices will be governed by the accepted rates of Blue Cross and Blue Shield.

Starting at 1 p.m. Sunday and continuing until 5 p.m. the public is invited to an open house at the hospital, where the Young Homemakers will serve as hostesses.

The tax payer and other interested citizens are invited to see one of the most modern and best equipped small hospitals in West Texas.

The hospital will then be open Monday to receive patients.
